


Picaro Causes Controversy - Again




her mouth. "rmf" Added Morisette. "Mmm, mrm fffmmmr."

Cousins Restaurant is 10cated in the North end of Halifax, on the corner of Lady Hammond Road and Robie Street. As we travelled from downtown Halifax to the North End, I thought we were completely lost, but as soon as I saw the Chebucto Inn, I found my bearings. The view of the road from our table was not much to look at, but I guess it's better than a brick wall, or no view at all! Maybe they want the people walking by to see us eating, get hungry and come in for a bite to eat (that could work).

Cousins' offers a variety of meals on their menu, ranging from sandwiches and fries to barbecued chicken dinners, at a very economical price. Great for students who have perhaps spent most of their hard-earned money, but still need to go out. I ordered - yes, you guessed it - a barbecued chicken dinner for only \$4.95; you get a lot on the plate, too - there is a quarter of a chicken, carrots, peas, potatoes and coleslaw. I couldn't break my track record for the year, so I just had to order the chicken! All the meals at Cousins are homecooked and taste great. Other meals include scallops, steak,

Cousins' serves a delicious milk shake, and it doesn't get shaken until you get your food (so you don't drink it all before hand). 



The following is an co-interview I did with Neil Fraser from the Gazette. We had the chance to sit down with Jake, Todd and Nick from local band Adrenaline and talk about music.

Gazette: How long has the band been in it's current form?

Todd: Thirteen, fourteen months?

Others: Yeah. Just over a year.

Picaro: Was it any better before? Was it ever better than it is now?

A: I think that it was better back when the Flamingo was having "Two Buck Tuesdays". And the weekend shows. The scene seemed more together. Alternative bands, metal bands, punk bands, hardcore bands, they all had to play together coz that was it, they had nowhere to play. But when the Deuce opened, all these bands went into this scene, and it segregated the audiences. Barely ever do you see, like, if we play with someone like Hardship Post for instance, maybe some of our people would come to see us and give Hardship Post a chance. It might

be the same the other way around. But they don't do that anymore. I don't know why.

Gazette: What were some of your influences?

Jake: When I was twelve, I heard Black Flag for the first time, and that started it all. And soon after that I heard Slayer, and then I got really evil (laughs). I didn't really start playing music until I was sixteen, seventeen. And then it was whatever, hardcore, metal, initially, but I liked a lot of really old school hip hop stuff. Anything in music where they felt like they had something to say, and felt was important.

Picaro: So is your sound much different now?

Todd: The song "Control" is our sound. And "Not My Problem". There is no more "Last Option."

Nick: "Last Option" was our ballad. It's not a bad song, but we would rather just play faster.

Gazette: What would you say to someone who wanted to start a band in Halifax?

Jake: Practice. Don't start playing (gigs) if your crappy. Practice and get good, and know that you're going to giving an effort at your music. 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
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



