



As two time defending ACAA Champions, the Mount Saint Vincent University's Women's Volleyball team started and finished the season with a sense of purpose and conviction. Their goals were to be the best that they could be, win the ACAA title for a third consecutive year and do well at the CCAA Nationals.

The team kicked off the season with a solid showing at the ACAA Tip off winning 9 of 10 matches. Thanks to a committed team effort to fund raise all summer, the Mount travelled to Toronto in October to compete in the Humber Cup. The Mount played some great teams and placed 3<sup>rd</sup> overall in thetournament.

The Mount kicked off their season in early November and with hard work and training, continued to improve their team play both offensively and defensively. In early January, the team hit the road again and competed in the Coupe de L"Est at Limoilou College in Quebec City. The Mount won the tournament for the first time ever and came back to Halifax feeling more prepared and poised for the ACAA Championships.

The team went 18-0 in ACAA league play and were honoured at the ACAA Volleyball Banquet when Sydney Foy was named to the 2<sup>nd</sup> ACAA All Conference Team, Haley MacDonald, Christina Day and Meaghan MacDougall were named to the 1<sup>st</sup> ACAA All Conference team. Haley MacDonald was named ACAA Libero of the Year, Derrick Brooks was named ACAA Coach of the Year and Meaghan MacDougall was named ACAA Player of the Year.

The Mount defeated DALAC in semi final play 25-19, 25-16 and 25-13. Sydney Foy was named Player of the Game. The Mount faced a very talented UNBSJ squad in the ACAA Championships. The games highlighted the offensive and defensive excellence on both teams . The Mount persevered and showed great patience and skill as they went on to defeat UNBSJ 25-17, 25-22 and 25-22 and win the ACAA Championship title for the 3<sup>rd</sup> consecutive year.. Meaghan MacDougall was named Player of the Game.

The team travelled to Seneca College, Toronto Ont to compete in the CCAA National Championships. At the CCAA All Canadian Banquet Meaghan MacDougall was named to the CCAA All Canadian team and Head Coach Derrick Brooks won a huge award being named CCAA Coach of the Year. Ranked 7th going in the Mount faced a very talented Vancouver Island University squad and lost 3-1. The team regrouped and played Capilano College from Vancouver , BC and lost in a heart breaking 5 set match losing 15-13 in the final deciding set. The Mount were determined to leave the tournament with a win and went on to defeat 4th ranked Humber College 3 straight on their final day of play. A huge thank you goes out to the Mount's Volleyball families and friends who gave the team so much support.

Derrick Brooks, head coach of the Mount Saint Vincent Mystics, is the 2014 CCAA Women's Volleyball Coach of the Year. It's the first time since 2005 the award has gone to a coach competing in the Atlantic Collegiate Athletic Association. Congratulations Coach Brooks!

The Women's basketball team posted a 13-8 record and finished third overall in the ACAA. The team had several key injuries late in the second half of the season but the team's depth and determination helped them through the always challenging months of January and February. This year the team missed out on the top two spots in the ACAA and therefore did not have a first round bye going into the conference championships. Their first round matchup was against the Mounties from Mt. Allison University, a team they struggled with throughout the regular season but held a 2-1 win loss record with the loss coming two weeks prior to the championships. The game was close until the third quarter when the Mystics outscored the Mounties by 10 which was the difference in the game. This set up a semifinal match with the Holland College Hurricanes who finished second in the ACAA with a 19-2 record. The Mystics lost all three games to the Hurricanes during the regular season and were in tough against an incredibly talented and athletic team. The first half of the game the Hurricanes came out on fire and scored 48 points on a Mystic defense that is considered one of the best in the league. At half the team was down 23 points but still had some fight left in them. Using their strong defense and some great foul shooting the team pulled to 10 of the Hurricanes with eight minutes to play in the game. However Holland responded with two key steals and a three pointed and the lead went back to 17 points and the Mystics could not recover. The loss knocked them out of the championships and an opportunity to return to the National tournament. The Mystics team will return eleven players from this vear's team and look forward to a bright future as this young team develops and builds confidence together for future success.

Christina Brien and Jocelyn Moore played their last games in a mystic uniform and their leadership on and off the court will be dearly missed. Jocelyn was also named to the all-conference first team as a result of her consistent play throughout the season. The team would like to thank all those who supported them throughout the season.

Coach MacRae did an incredible job guiding the Men's team to a 17-4 record and the best defense in the league. The Mystic season did not start out very well as they struggled to find chemistry between the new systems and each other on the floor. With 1 win and 3 loses to start the team needed to find some answers to their inconsistent play. With a renewed focus on the defense and the exceptional play of Mac Ellis, Corey Hollett and Arnar Bjornsson the team hit its groove and was not going to be denied a top two finish in the league and proved it by posting a 16-1 record from that point on. With a first round bye in the conference championships the team awaited the quarter final results to determine the semifinal matchup on day two which turned out to be the Holland College Hurricanes. The semifinal game was very intense throughout and the Mystics found themselves up by four going into the half. In the third quarter was kind to Holland found their stroke from the three point line and as a result opened up a six point lead that they would not relinquish and at the end of the game the Hurricanes came out on top and the Mystics season came to an abrupt end.

The women earned two first team all- conference spots held by Danielle MacDonald and Jessica Partridge while Rebecca Savage and Katie Black earned second team all- conference status. Danielle Cyr was awarded the ACAA Gerry LeBlanc Award for the second year in a row.

With all but one player eligible to return next year, the team is looking to make a run at the National Championships next season. 5th year player Melissa McGee and 4th year players Nicole Power and Jaimee Dobson are wished well as they graduate from the program. The team thanks the hard work, talent and commitment they've contributed during their time at MSVU.
