### Mount students fight for rocks' rights

A small but determined group of Mount students jumped on the bandwagon last Sunday, and staged a protest to bring attention to the plight of imprisoned rocks in Halifax.

Shouting "Free the Rocks" and "Rocks have Rights" the placard-carrying students marched in front of a rock detention site in fashionable Clayton Park. A spokesperson for the group said they were alarmed by the amount of rocks, and even small stones, who were being held behind chickenwire without any charges.

"The people of Halifax should know about the gross injustice being done to these bits of stone and slate," she said. "It is not just happening in the seedier parts of the city, but in our better suburbs, and the people must know!"

Rock camps are situated along Lacewood Ave., Dunbrack St., and other areas close the Mount.

Insiders at the university hinted that the group of students may have some connection to the student newspaper. "I understand they support the PLO, the IRA, the FLQ, and other three-letter radical groups," commented a Council source, who asked to remain brainless. "This latest fiasco doesn't surprise me a bit. After all," he sneered, "it isn't like they are protesting anything *really* important, like the Royal Commission."

The students continued their protest until one of the rowdier ones was removed by the police, and the others were called home to lunch.

During the protest, the group were subjected to taunts, stares, and odd finger gestures by passing motorists. "Get a job!" one of the passing motorists yelled. But the group insisted that at least one of them was gainfully employed, and the man who insulted them was a "fascist, rock-suppressing, anti-intellectual middle manager."

### Mount becomes Marcos' second home

Ferdinand Marcos has been offered asylum at the Mount, said Mount President, Dr. Margaret Fulton, BA, MA, PhD, OhMy. Sources say the Marcos family has happily accepted. Mrs. Marcos was quoted as saying, "With all those girls at the University, there must be a shoe store on campus."

The Mount agreed to accept Marcos after U.S. president, Ronald Reagan made a personal call to Fulton. "I just loved him in *Bedtime for Bonzo*," said Fulton, "so when he called, I just couldn't refuse."

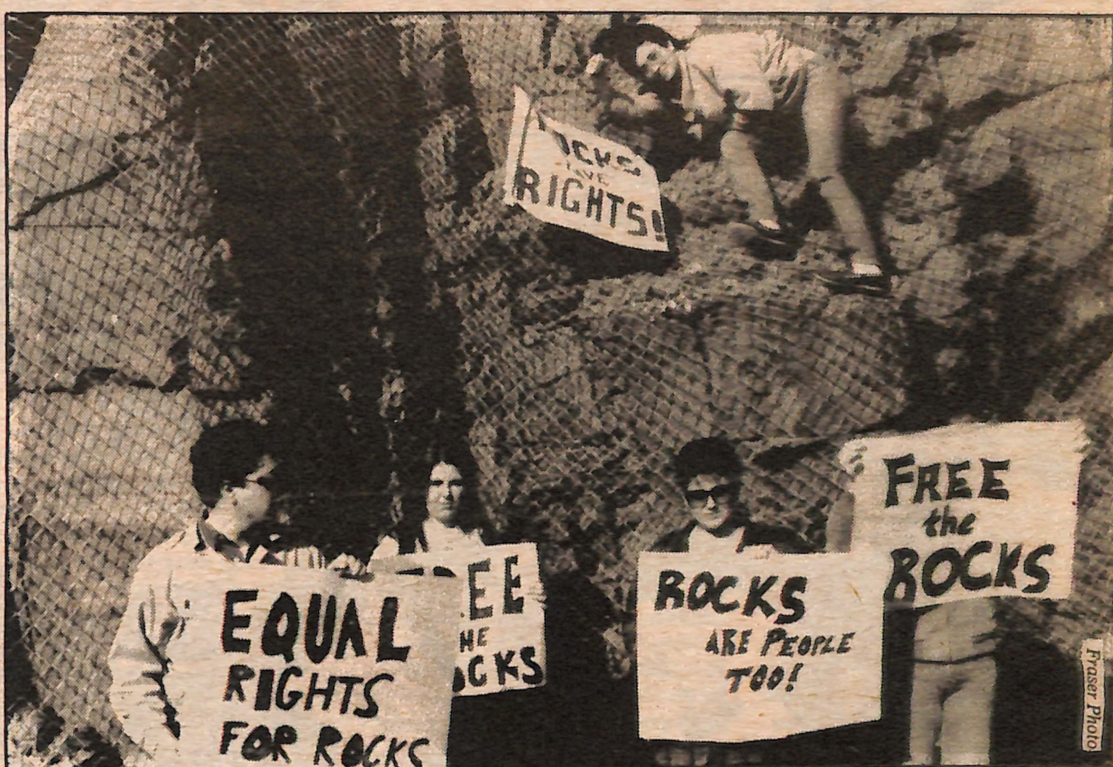
A suite, including sauna, whirlpool, and a 400-square foot

### Twelve votes that shook the world

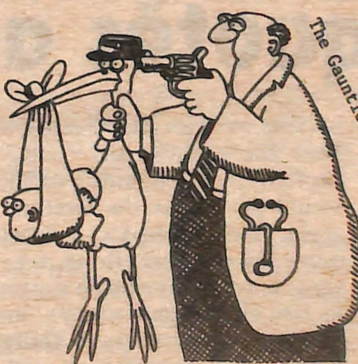

In a controversial move three weeks ago, American President Ronald Reagan attempted to get approval for provision of \$100 million worth of contraceptive aid for the rebels in Nicaragua.

"I think the right wing rebels are adults, and contraception is an adult issue," he said in his speech to the House. "We believe that over 50 per cent of them are using it anyway, and we just want to make it economically feasible."

In an ironic parallel, the Mount student council initiated a referendum that would replace the present Campus Police with

a force of rebel Contras. "The Contras are freedom fighters, like the founding Sisters of Charity, and I am proud to call myself a freedom fighter too," said



a high-ranking Council member at the time of the announcement. "We intend to fight for our forces' right to bear arms and drop bombs on small dissident societies in the Student Union."

Both programs drew a great deal of criticism from their respective constituents. Many people felt that having fascist guerrillas at a university might take attention away from Royal Commission's recommendations, while American representatives were worried about the reputation of Nicaraguan people if the \$100 million free contraceptive aid plan were to pass.

It was a close race, but after two recounts, the most quoted person in the *Picaro* for 1985-86 was student union president Shari Wall. Wall beat external vice-president Peter Murtagh by only two votes, a newspaper source revealed yesterday.

The race for notoriety began in January, when the unusual amount of external activity was making Murtagh a strong favorite for mouthpiece of the Council; he had made several comments on the Royal Commission, SUNS, and South Africa, and was becoming a fixture at the newspaper office. To fight

his lead, Wall pressed Council to hold the controversial contraceptive referendum, which would put her in the forefront again. But Murtagh's political savvy thwarted her efforts, as he contributed comments to stories in two Halifax newspapers, including the prestigious *Daily News*. Wall fought back with television coverage, giving her the "audio-visual advantage" favoured by politicians. She also put herself on call 24 hours a day for comment to the *Picaro*, if necessary.

However, both the councilors' efforts on this front were disqualified, as *Sicaro* judges

felt only quotes in the student newspaper were worth counting.

Honourable mention in the competition went to Board of Governors rep Frank Demont, and academic vice-president Robyn Osgood, and SUNS chair James LeBlanc (who isn't on council, but talks a lot anyway).

In fairness to all candidates, content of the quotes were not considered.

After the results were announced, neither Wall nor Murtagh were available for comment.

But, hey, if we got any one in the process, that's life in the big city.



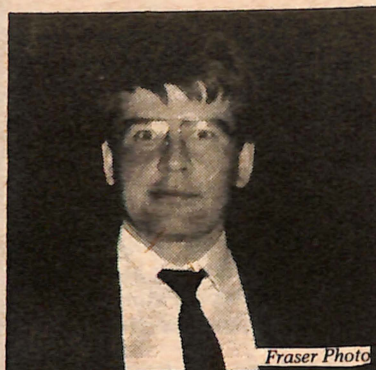
# Misztela masters impersonations: gleans megabucks

Question—is the above photograph one of Hon. Michael Wilson, actor Harrison Ford, or pop star Corey Hart's elder brother? These are questions which are very much on the minds of high-ranking RCMP officials this week. Travelling under the assumed name of Ted Misztela, and managing to hold down at least one job (as a security guard at Mount Saint Vincent University), while attempting to impersonate at least all of the above-mentioned famous people, capitalizing on a remarkable talent as an actor and penchant for authenticity of costume.

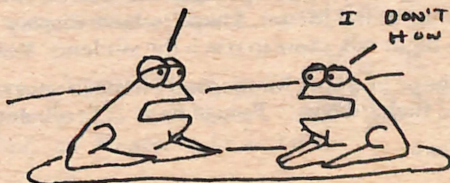

## Sagging bra industry to receive a lift

The sagging Canadian brassiere industry will be reviewed by the Canadian government. Parliament announced yesterday that a Royal Commission has been appointed to study the problems associated with the drooping industry.

Dr. William Lahey, an expert in the field of female-upper-body-dressing, has studied the industry for the past 21 years and will head the Royal Commission. "We hope to get a firm grip on the problems that have held this Canadian industry

back for so many years," said Lahey.

Foreign competitors have a tight squeeze on the market. Although Canadian manufacturers have tried to bounce back, they have failed to keep abreast of new technology. Canadian brassiere manufacturers face closure if they fail to make a protrusion in the market in 1986.

"It saddens me to see an industry so close to the hearts of Canadians plummet at the hands of foreign competition," said Lahey.

Dr. Mary Saunders, also a member of the Royal Commis-

sion, has conducted research on the depressed industry for five years now.

"Americans have the greatest cleavage in the market," said Saunders. "Foreign manufacturers have more styles and designs to appeal to consumers," she said.

Once all problems have been identified by the Royal Commission, manufacturers hope to develop a supportive marketing strategy in order to increase their bulge in sales.

It is hoped Dr. Lahey and his five-member commission can get to the heart of the problems and give the industry the lift it so desperately needs. . . .
