












1. A complex, fascinating woman, Elizabeth Bayley Seton discovered her destiny as Mother Setor founder of the Sisters of Charity. Educator, healer, visionary and leader who became the first native-born American saint.

2. The Sisters of Charity established Mount Saint Vincent Academy to educate girls from the City of Halifax.

1914

3. The need for postsecondary education was becoming increasingly evident; a 25year agreement with Dalhousie University was signed. This allowed the Mount to give the first two years in a bachelor program, the final two years and degree to be given by Dalhousie.

1951

4. The entire plant of Mount Saint Vincent-Motherhouse and College was laid waste by fire. By September, 1951, the new college building, Evaristus Hall, was ready to receive students. Enrollment touched 172 full-time students.


The Nova Scotia legislature approved a revision of the college charter and the College became Mount Saint Vincent University.



Coat of Arms

The coat of arms for Mount Saint Vincent University is based on the arms of the Seton family in recognition of Saint Elizabeth Seton's role as foundress of the Sisters of Charity. The order founded, owns, and participates in the Administration of the University. The emblem's three silver crescents on a blue shield within a "treasure" is identical to that used by the province of Nova Scotia since 1625. Both the foundress of the order whose members operate the University and the province of Nova Scotia are represented. The three peaks on the shield signify the name of the University, "Mount Saint Vincent." On the upper portion of the shield is a book of learning, between the maple leaves — the emblem of Canada. The dove symbolizes the Holy Spirit, indicating that knowledge is the only means to wisdom, the highest gift of God. The colors of the shield are blue and gold — gold symbolizing the divinity of our Lord and the blue for our Blessed Lady. The periphery of the coat of arms is colors of royal blue and azure, the dual blues of Mount Saint Vincent University.

University Motto

The University motto is "Veritus ad deum ducit" which is translated as "Truth leads to God." The motto asserts the religious concerns which inspired the foundation of the University.

University Symbol

In January 1971, the Board of Governors approved the design of a new symbol for Mount Saint Vincent University that would replace the Heraldic Crest previously used to represent the university.

The design was the culmination of five months of work by Eagles and Radcliffe Ltd., of Dartmouth, Nova Scotia. The symbol combines the letters "M" and "V" and "U" to provide a distinctive pattern that is visually appealing and easily remembered. The addition of two circles above this pattern immediately adds warmth and the awareness that the symbol portrays people as well.






















MSYU Winter Carnival







Bids Farewell





















M.S.V.U. Choir




Campus Association For Part-Time University Students















































RESIDENCE LIFE
