

A Little Halifax History ...

Long before any Europeans came to the region now known as Nova Scotia, the Micmac Indians lived in the area, trading with their native neighbours.

Later on the French set up a post to trade with the Micmac-furs and meat for cloth, ribbons and beads. Then there was the original British Invasion. The two imperial powers launched into a struggle over the territory, a struggle won by the British. Halifax's Citadel Fortress (Canada's most visited national historic site) is a reminder of these times.

The Brits' Earl of Halifax and Colonel Cornwallis founded Halifax, the first British city in what is now Canada. Halifax's excellent natural harbour was developed and in the years ahead it became a centre for commercial as well as military activity.


Modern day Halifax is a centre of student activity too, what with five universities and two colleges. Accordingly the town caters to an active student lifestyle. There are lots of entertaining things to do, everyday of the week, in historical Halifax.

MONDAY

It's the first of the week so you might want to take it easy. You can talk about what (or who) you did on the weekend, with friends, over coffee at *Perk's* -- It's got a great waterfront location and huge bowls of cafe au lait. And there's lots of window seats! Or try *Grabbajabba* on Spring Garden Road -- a good place for people watching.

TUESDAY

Tuesday, of course, is halfprice movie night. The *Empire 4* theatres on the Bedford High-



way are closest to the Mount. In Halifax, there's the Oxford. It has the comfiest seats in town and a balcony that's real swell for necking. Smack dab in the centre of town are the Park Lane Mall theatres. They're classy-looking and they usually provide the best selection.


WEDNESDAY

Get a head start on your weekend by getting your butt down to *Vinnies*. It's Pub Night -- it's fun, it's sweaty and it's gonna be a long line-up to get in (so get there early).

THURSDAY

Tonight's a great night to get downtown with students from all over Halifax. There's karaoke at Your Father's Moustache, large glasses of cheap draft at J.J.'s, and dirty dancing at Brandy's. The Seahorse -- Halifax's oldest tavern -- is always busy. It has pool tables, shuffleboard, and lots of atmosphere. You won't hear any dance shite there, just good old-fashioned working-folks' rock 'n' roll.


After the bars, it's pizza time. There are four different shops on the corner where Blowers and Grafton meet. For a more suave eating experience, go to La Cave for coffee, cheesecake and baked brie, at the same location.



FRIDAY

If you want, relax. Rent a movie. Go to Jumbo Video (Quinpool Road or Clayton Park) and eat some free popcorn while you browse. If you want to get out, why not check out the traditional maritime music and atmosphere of the Lower Deck, down

at the Historic Properties. Friday is a wonderful night for a romantic walk along the waterfront or for taking a ferry ride to Dartmouth and back.



SATURDAY:

Get down to the Brewery Market for farm fresh vegetables and other rustic goodies. Later in the morning, go shopping along Spring Garden Road.

You'll find some bizarre jewellery at *The Black Market*. And you can even have your Tarot cards read in the back room.

Beadworks is a neat little shop where you can pick and choose from hundreds of wooden, ceramic and plastic beads. It's make your own: necklaces, earrings, you name it. If you're looking for shops like Stefanel, Esprit or Benetton, Park Lane has what you want. The Body Shop is there as well.

If you're looking for the best shopping mall, go to the Halifax Shopping Centre. It's big with all the old faithfuls like Fairweather, Le Chateau and Thrifty's.

Stop by *Peddlers'* or *The Split* Crow for good pub food and drinks in the afternoon.

You can play some frisbee or football on the Commons or take a long walk through Point Pleasant Park.

Come night-time, you can be the king -- or queen -- of Saturday night, dancing into the A.M. at *Studio*. If you'd rather take in some live entertainment, *Pub* Flamingo hosts some good acts.

If it's food you're after, Alfredo, Weinstein & Ho is inexpensive and fun. Popular with students, it has a great atmosphere and yummy late-nite specials.

SUNDAY

Check out local flea markets and if you're hungry, there's nothing better than Halifax's Bud the Spud chip wagon. Make sure you stop for a bag of Bud's gloriously greasy french fries. Remember, the small size just won't be enough.




