



### Our Identity



### University Logo

The design of a new symbol, to represent the University along with the Heraldic Crest, was approved in January, 1971. The symbol, created by Eagles and Radcliffe Ltd., skillfully combines the letters "M", "V", and "U" to provide a distinctive pattern that is visually appealing and easily remembered. The addition of two circles above this pattern immediately adds warmth and the awareness that the symbol portrays as well. This, it was felt, was the essence of a university; young people, alert people who are working together towards common objectives.

### Coat of Arms

The Coat of Arms of the University is based on the Coat of Arms of Venerable Elizabeth Seton, foundress of the Congregation of the Sisters of Charity. It bears three silver crescents within the "treasure". The same "treasure" is found on the Coat of Arms granted to Nova Scotia in 1625, so the Community Foundress and the Province are represented. The three peaks on the shield signify the name of the University, "Mount" Saint Vincent. The book, a symbol of learning, is positioned between two maple leaves the emblem of Canada. Above the book is a dove, symbolizing the Holy Spirit. and indicating that knowledge is only a means to Wisdom. the highest gift of God. The colors of the shield are blue and gold. Gold symbolizes the divinity of our Lord and blue is for our Blessed Lady. The periphery of the Coat of Arms is royal blue and azure, the dual blues of Mount Saint Vincent University.




### University Motto





# Back In Time

In 1873, the Sisters of Charity estab- special effort should be made to provide lished Mount Saint Vincent Academy in and encourage higher education for Rockingham. The Academy's original purpose was to train novices and young sisters as teachers, but from the beginning the academy was open to young wom-

women. In 1914, a 25-year agreement was signed with Dalhousie University. This agreement worked well for a number of years, but in 1925 Mount Saint en in Halifax. Sister Evaristus felt that a Vincent felt the need to step out on its

own. That same year an act was passed by the Nova Scotia Legislature which awarded Mount Saint Vincent the right to grant its own degrees, making it the only independent women's college in the British Commonwealth.



### E.M. Fulton Communications Centre Opens

On October 16, 1989 Dr. E. Margaret Fulton's dreams finally became a reality when Premier John Buchanan and a host of other dignitaries officially opened the E. Margaret Fulton Communications Centre. Dr. Fulton dreamed of a university and regional communications centre designed with state-of-the-art telecommunications and library technology capabilities. Her ideas have been put into action in the Communication Centre named in her honour.

The \$7.7 million building houses the Mount's library computer services, DUET (Distance University Education Via Television) and audiovisual facilities. It is one of the most sophisticated centres to accommodate the university's current and future needs in information storage and retrieval of data, and the production and broadcast communications technology. More than half the space in the Communications Centre is devoted to the library. Ours is the first library in Canada designed with systems furniture which allows greater flexibility to adapt to new technologies. The library boasts more than 300 individual study "carrels" which are height adjustable for wheelchair access, have three soundproof walls and individually controlled lighting. Many carrels are equipped with terminals connected to the university's mainframe computers or have microcomputers con-

nected to local networks. This is quite a jump from those big wooden tables in the middle of the room! The library offers a new home for the MacDonald Collection of 10,000 classic and rare books donated to the university by Cape Breton entrepreneur William MacDonald.

The Communications Centre also houses the facilities and operations of the Computing and Communications Technologies Department. The department has moved into the future with fibre optic technology. Data signals run through fibre optic cables between the new building and Seton Academic Centre much faster and with dramatically reduced errors. Also, fibre optic strands have the capacity to run many hundreds of times more terminal ports than the traditional copper cable.

DUET is bigger and better than ever. Moving to the Communications Centre from Seton Annex has given DUET more space and better facilities. Fibre optics technology makes teleconferencing and computer conferencing linkages relatively inexpensive. In terms of space, Duet now has a second broadcast classroom and two preparation rooms for reviewing course material, meeting with students and applying studio makeup. State-of-the-art lighting and computer graphics technology ensures high quality DUET broadcast. Many public relations

students probably remember long nights spent in the cramped, stuffy editing suite in Seton. The Communications Centre has brought the Mount into the 1990's with better facilities for audiovisual production. A sound room offers a fully equipped studio for producing audio tapes. A media production room comprises a graphics design station, with computer graphics software, and a post production 1/2 inch VHS editing suite. Another welcome feature is a project presentation room equipped with a video projector and a 35mm slide controller capable of synchronizing nine or more projects at once.

There are a dozen names for the structure connecting the Communications Centreto Seton Acadenic Cenre: the tunnel, the link, the pathway, and that long thing with the windows. Regardless of the name, the link has become the newest place to study or just talk with friends. A look inside the elevators of the Communications Centre shows that they have been marked for third, fourth, and fifth floors. The building has been designed to eventually accommodate up to five stories. With the passing of time, future generations will see the building become the dream it was meant to be.

This year the Mount community was saddened by the deaths of faculty members Dr. Hugh Wallace, recently retired from the history department, and Dr. Ron Pearson, public relations department. At the November 27 Senate meeting, Dr. Ke Dewar, history department chair, and Dr. Bob Lake, public relations department, presented citations in memory of their colleagues. The following excerpts appear with their permission.

### Dr. Ron Pearson

Barely six months ago Ron Pearson came eagerly, amiably and with a hope of homecoming to the world of university teaching and scholarship. To his deep an abiding satisfaction he discovered here that to him teaching and scholarship were indeed home. Tragically his lease on that home was short, and cruelly terminated. In 1985 he proceeded to Ohio University for a doctorate. In his two years there and in the following year back at the Mount he accomplished much. He completed his doctorate with distinction. He was recognized as a good teacher on the road to excellence. He produced over a baker's dozen of scholarly pieces, some of which won awards. Three years of accomplishment seemingly guaranteeing further, richer, achievement. The accomplishment stands. Ironically, the day he died a book arrived in Halifax, just published, with a chapter by him. This year as cancer spread through his body, Ron was not stripped of his dignity and integrity. Though unable to come back to work, he demanded progress reports on students in his courses on co-op terms. He prepared his dissertation for review for book publication. Papers he worked on were given in California.) In short, he fought a gallant endgame. Not alone, of course. Amid great stress Janet Pearson moved herself, three children, and belongings to Toronto so Ron might have a home during leave from the hospital. Courage is contagious and Ron's bravery fed Janet's, as hers fed on the love of their children.Dr. Pearson asked that a library endowment be established in his name. In life he was a promising scholar and teacher. In death Ron abides as our good and amiable friend. In our new library stacks his publications and memory will find a lasting home.

### Dr. Hugh Wallace

Hugh Wallace died suddenly on October 19th. He had been a member of the Mount faculty from 1969 until his retirement in 1986. During that time he taught a wide variety of courses in the history department and served two terms as department chair. His chosen field was Canadian history, particularly the history of the Canadian North. His book, The Navy, The Company and Richard King: British Exploration in the Canadian Arctic, 18291860, received uniformly high praise when it was published in 1980 and has become something of a classic in its field. Hugh's interests and his knowledge ranged widely over the history of Western culture and beyond. He sought an integrated understanding of the past and present. This quest was especially apparent in the project that lay uncompleted at the time of his death, his response to George Grant's Lament for a Nation. This work, which he always referred to as his "letter" to Grant, amounted, in fact, to an extended and intricate statement of his own philosophy of history. Hugh combined a broad intellectual outlook with personal warmth and a wry sense of humour. he will be remembered by friends and colleagues with respect and af-

# Basketball Men




# Hockey


## MSVU YEAR IN REVIEW

INEXORABLE (inekserab'l), adj., that cannot be influenced by persuasion or entreaty; unrelenting.

The first time I heard the word inexorable it was used to describe clear human thoughts about impending death. It was at the funeral service of Dr. Ron Pearson, a very well respected and dedicated professor of public relations who past away in 1990 after a battle with cancer.

Two observations made during my convocation ceremony bring the word to mind as I reflect on Mount Saint Vincent and the class of 1990. The first observation was my own. I found it odd that Dr. Pearson's death was not noted during the ceremony. The second observation, made by my older (and wiser) sister, was that even though she was encouraged by the emphasis on women's issues during the ceremony, she found it odd that aside from their presence, the men of the Mount Saint Vincent community seemed to be excluded from the ceremony. (Now this is the same woman who made me aware that it was wrong for the men to sit around after dinner while the women cleaned up the same woman who suggested that I should look into attending Mount Saint Vincent.)

While these two observations may or may not be related, either those incidents or my faulty perception are symptoms of the larger problems Mount Saint Vincent must face in the 1990's. Strike fallout, disturbing vandalism, and malicious activism have been part of our experience at the Mount. However, our sensitivity to these wounds should not be allowed to blur our memories and what it means to carry a degree from Mount Saint Vincent University.

How a ceremony is carried out, who's names are mentioned or whether or not men should live in residences are important administrative issues which must be collectively resolved but these factors are merely hurdles. Please do not lose track of the noble vision that Mount Saint Vincent grads can take pride in.


Our university is special. Active social responsibility is intrinsic to it. It is good that we all have an education that includes an awareness of the undeniable injustices that women have faced and continue to face. Pride in this unique approach is what we must be inexorable about. Be active in your alumnae association. If you think you know of a way the Mount can be improved, let your thoughts be known. Wear your school ring.

When the word inexorable came up in the conversation between Ron Pearson and his minister, I am told that his eyes lit up. He said, "Inexorable that's a real communications word, isn't it!".
