Dr. Bennett constructs math designs with project funding

Dr. Frank Bennett of the math department is making a name for himself and the Mount through his breakthroughs in constructing Mendelsohn designs, a type of combinatorial block design used in scientific and statistical experiments. His work has drawn a great deal of interest world-wide. including collaboration with Distinguished Professor Zhu Lie, a mathematician at Suzhou University in the People's Republic of China, Dr. Bennett has been invited to speak in China twice - at Suzhou University for the Third Chinese Combinatorial Conference in April of 1987 and at the International Conference in Tunxi City in August of 1988.

Dr. Bennett's research, entitled "The spectrum of a variety of combinatorial designs, Latin squares and quasigroups", is funded through a Natural Sciences and Engineering Research Council of Canada (NSERC) grant, supplemented by a \$2,500 Mount internal award.

Now, professor Zhu is here on campus for two months, working with Dr. Bennett on a part of this project. They met in 1983 at a mathematics workshop at Simon Fraser University and began their collaboration following a mathematics conference in Baton Rouge in 1984. "We realized that we had enough in common that we should be working together," comments Dr. Bennett. "Collaboration is very important for the exchange of ideas," adds professor Zhu, who regards his research leave from Suzhou University as "an opportunity for us to really work, and discuss different and new ideas."

"I advocate that communication, collaboration and interaction are necessary in mathematics - and other fields," notes Dr. Bennett. "I don't know whether or how we would have come as far as we have, had we not met at the 1983 conference." He points out that funding from NSERC and the Mount has made travel to conferences and workshops possible. "It might not be possible without the grants to develop the kinds of combinatorial designs we investigate. If the research committee hadn't decided to supplement my NSERC grant I might be many years behind in my work."

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Sauvé visit postponed until spring '89

Governor General Jeanne Sauvé's visit to the Mount, originally scheduled for Oct. 27 and 28, has been postponed to early April. Rideau Hall has advised the Mount that the announcement of a general election on Nov. 21 has made it necessary for the Governor General to restrict public engagements during this period.

Her Excellency's rescheduled visit to

the Mount, the first week of April, will be highlighted by her national address to the Women of Canada and a black-tie dinner i her honor.

Madame Sauvé has agreed to lend her name to the Mount's new Initiative for Women in Science, that consists of the Jeanne Sauvé Chair for women in Science and a Women in Science Centre.

No Fall Convocation this year, but it's under study

One of the main discussion points at the October 3 Senate meeting was regarding the possibility of a Fall Convocation.

The following motions were carried:
1. In light of the existing financial constraint, and recognizing the desire of the university to properly celebrate the

awarding of degrees to its graduates, it is moved that the Senate not convene a special Fall Convocation this Fall; and 2. Moved that the question of establishing a regular Fall Convocation be referred to the Senate Executive Committee for submission of recommendations to Senate in January 1989.

Review deadline for NSERC postgraduate scholarships



Dr. Reginald Stuart, dean of humanities and sciences, has assumed responsibility for the review process for Natural Sciences and Engineering Research Council of Canada (NSERC) Postgraduate Scholarships. The scholarships, valued at \$12,500 and tenable for 12 months, are available to studen planning to undertake a program of study and research leading to a higher degree in one of the many fields supported by NSERC. In addition, award-holders undertaking their studies in the fields of engineering or computer science will receive a supplement of \$1,000 over a 12-month period.

Faculty are asked to identify eligible students and encourage them to pick up a form in Dr. Stuart's office, Seton Room 319. Completed applications must reach Dr. Stuart's office by Thursday, Nov. 10. A selection committee will, in turn, review applications to meet NSERC's deadline.



In 1982 Dr. Bennett completed the construction of Mendelsohn triple system (blocks made up of three elements). He and professor Zhu have completed construction of perfect Mendelsohn designs with block size four, and are currently working on block size five. In Mendelsohn designs, the blocks are ordered cyclically (i.e., in a block containing four elements - say, a,b,c and d - the elements would be ordered: ab,bc,cd and da). The designs have practical applications in several areas, including the design of experiments on antibiotics using a circular plate around which the specimens are placed.
