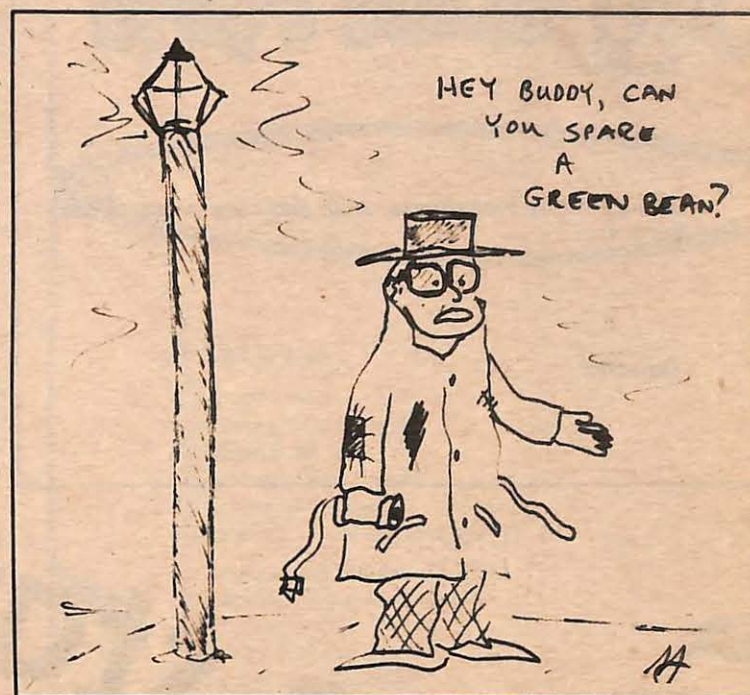

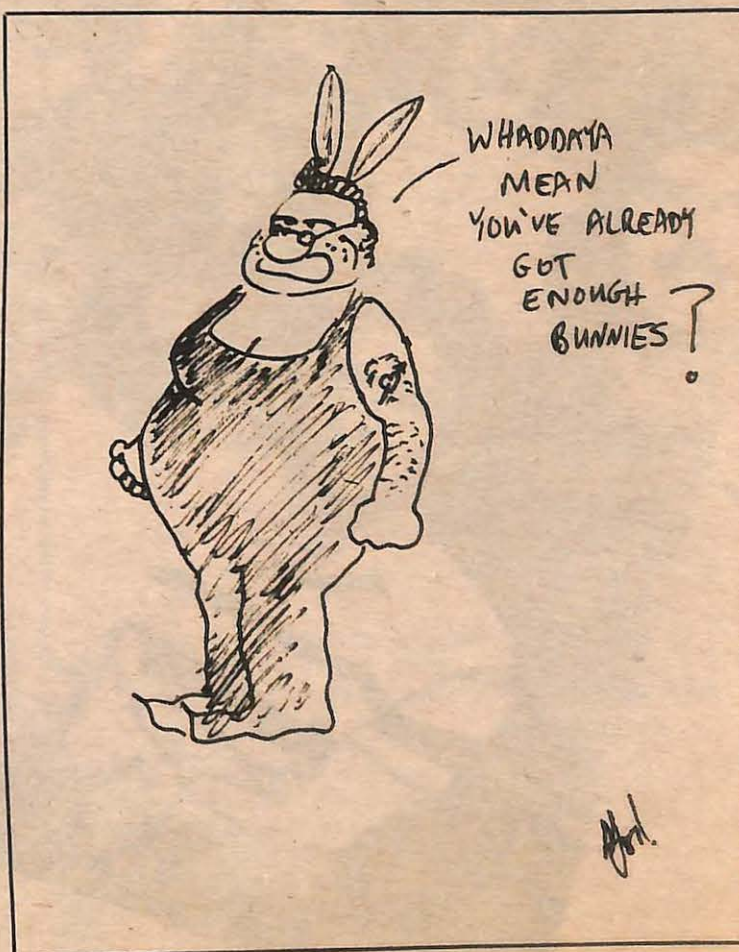

This finding comes after ten years of intensive research on a sample of 100 men and women.

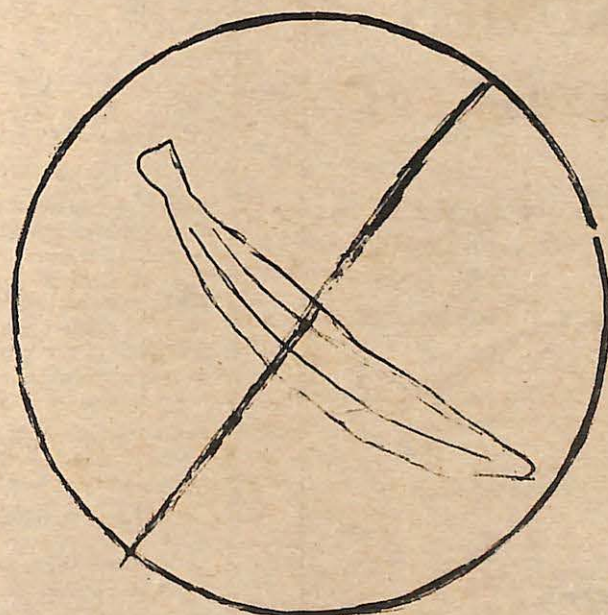

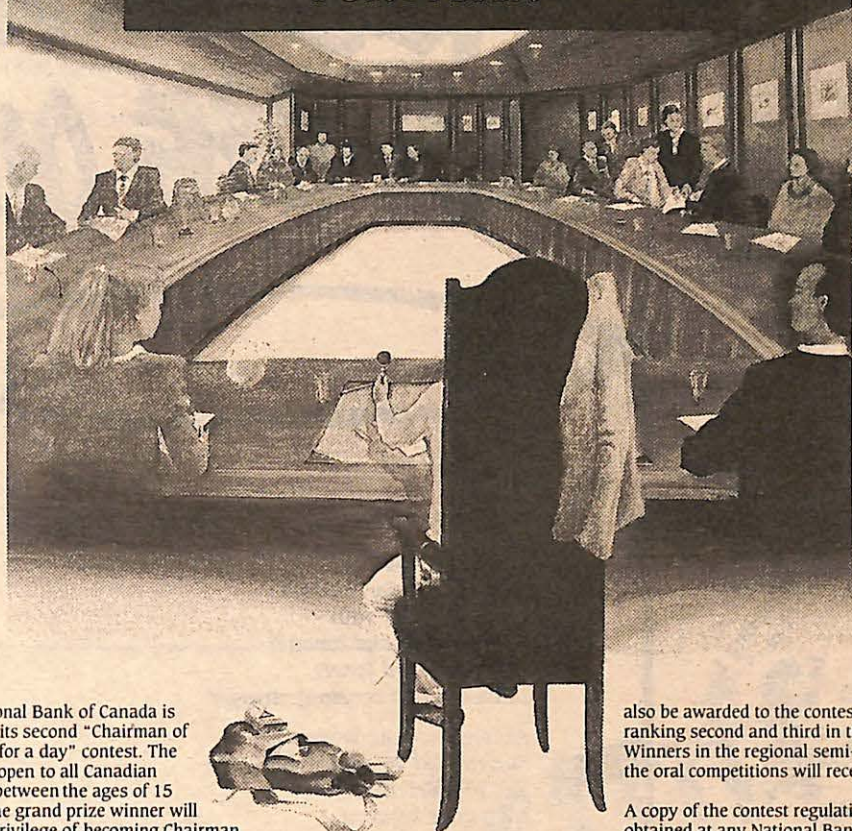

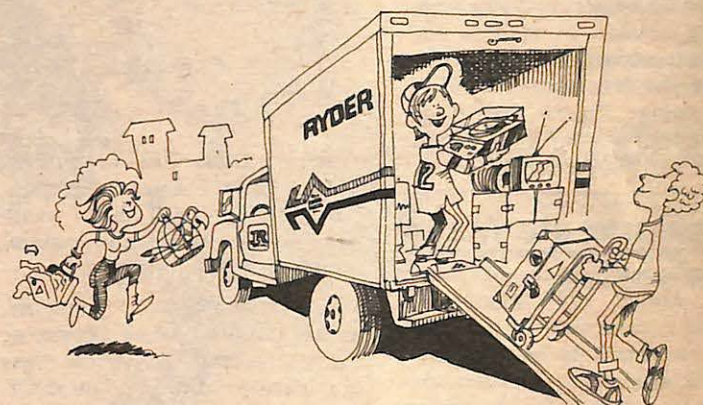
Organizers of the 1987 Awards Banquet are in a state of shock, following the kidnapping of popular campus amphibian Art.
