STUDENTS PROPOSAL

The following article is best explained by itself. It is the revised residence proposal that has been sent to Sister Albertus for consideration. Complied by the Students' Council and the Residence Committee it does its best to define and describe the regulations for a programme for male visiting privileges in Assisi and Evaristus.

The first proposal was presented to Sister Albertus on Nov. 18th. It was little different from the following one, except that the University rejected the suggested hours of Friday 6pm-2am, Saturday noon-2am and Sunday 1 pm-6 pm. A number of poorly defined and vague areas in the original proposal have been clarified in this one.

This proposal is the result of a number of negotiations with the Administration with regards to this residence issue. If accepted, it will be instituted on an experimental basis after Christmas and its success will depend entirely upon the ability of the residents to maintain its rules and regulations.

UNION MANAGER

In November, the Students' Council hired for a trial period of three months, a part-time Student Union Manager. Ron Boutilier, who also has another job as partner in an Entertainment Agency called David West Sales will be helping Council and the Union manage their affairs more efficiently.

The Students' Council recognizes that there are many areas in which it is deficient. Often this deficiency is especially realized from one year to the next as there is such a tremendous turnover within the student body of student leaders within the Union. Hopefully if this new idea of a Union Manager proves satisfactory, then there will be a degree of continuity provided from one year to the next. The duties of the

Manager have as yet to be formally defined and regulated. They will consist largely of helping with the general maintenance of the daily affairs of the Union. The Manager will attend Council meetings in order to keep abreast of the current student concerns. He will be involved with the ordering of supplies and the booking of Entertainment. All files will pass through his hands to be kept in a General filing system. He will keep inventories of the property of the Union and assist with such organizations as the Student Store and Entertainment.

It is generally the case in most Unions that there be a Union Manager. The University has been in favour of such an addition to the Mount Student Union for some time. This present arrangement

has resulted in the relocation of the offices of the Union. Ron Boutilier now occupies the General Office and the Students' Council Office has been moved into the old Entertainment Office.

In February, Council plans to make a formal decision as to signing a contract with the new manager and launching the Mount Saint Vincent Student Union on its way to being an authentic business enterprise.

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RALLY NUMBER 2

Mount St. Vincent's Student Union staged its second rally for males in Residence on November 20, 1975. Although the enthusiasm was not quite as spirited as the first rally, Rosaria lounge was crowded with still-interested students.

The students Council began by explaining how far we had progressed by outlining the proposal which was presented Tues. November 18, to Sister Albertus, President of MSVU. The outlook expressed by Ann Derrick, Presid-

ent of the Students Council, was extremely favourable.

A residence committee has been instituted to coincide with this issue. It is to be run on per capita basis, according to the population of the residence.

Volunteers have already offered their services and are working towards the ideal of male visiting privileges.

The new regulations will be instituted on January 9, 1976 - the weekend after returning from-

Christmas break. It will be reassessed one month after it is started, as outlined in the proposal.

Based on the returns tabulated by Student Council, 83% in Assisi responded, 78% in Evaristus responded. In Assisi the results were as follows:

98% in favour

1% opposed

Evaristus results were as follows:

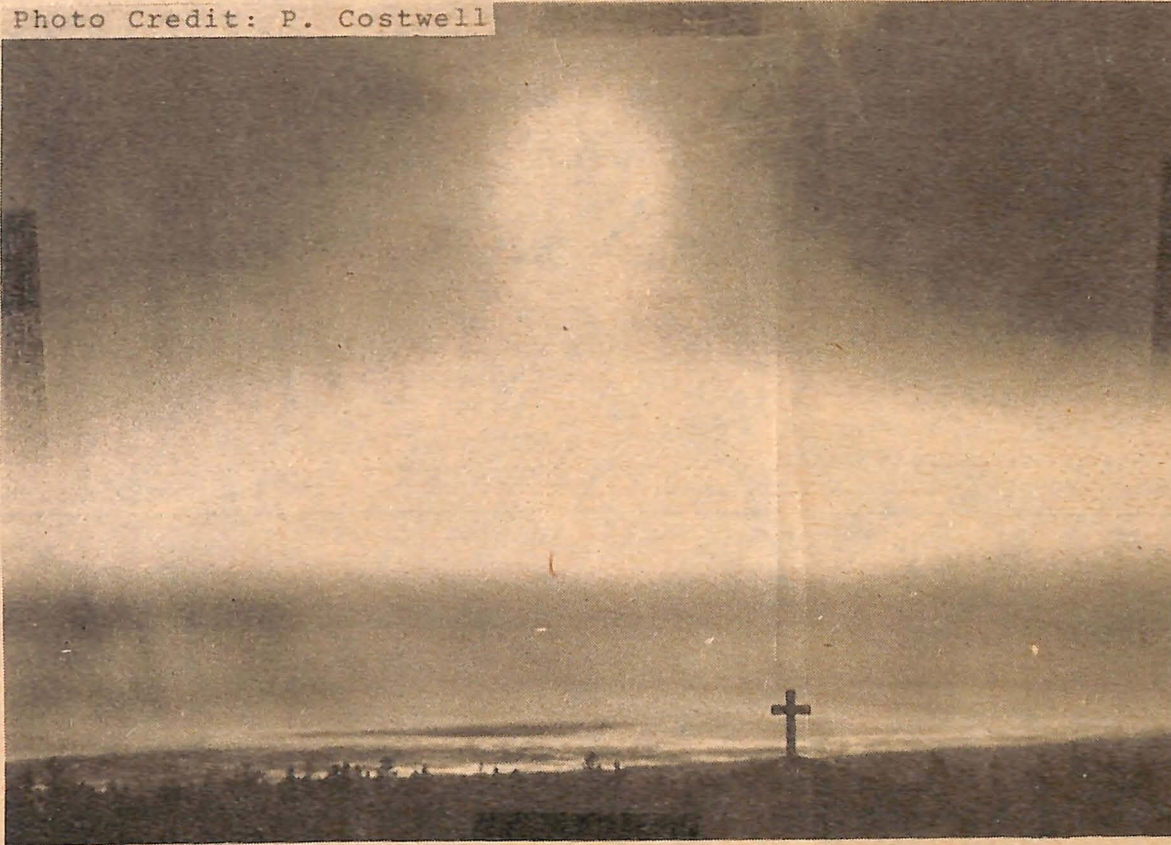
92% in favour

7% opposed

Anyone walking past King's gym around 7:30 November 22 may have been alarmed at the noise coming from within, but any screams were of delight and relief as the Mount St. Vincent volleyball team captured the Varsity "B" Inter-collegiate Championship for the second consecutive year!!

The tournament was held November 21 and 22 with teams MSVU, SMU, UNB, Acadia, St. Thomas, Dalhousie and King's participating. The Mount finished the tournament with a no loss record.

Friday night the Mount defeated UNBSJ in a close match, 17-15 and 15-13. Saturday, the team went on to defeat the St. Thomas

"Tommies" and SMU in regular round-robin play. After defeating the Acadia "Axettes" in semi-

final action, the Mount proceeded into the finals against Dal JV's who had defeated UNBSJ in the semi-finals by a narrow margin.

Losing the first game in this best 2 out of 3 final match did not dampen the spirits of the Mount team, as they fought back in the second "do or die" game, winning by a score of 15-13 forcing a third and deciding game. The Dal team was strong, but the determination and spirit of the Mount team prevailed as they went on, in an exciting game to win the game, match and championship. In awarding the trophy, Dal coach, Sandy Stalker commented on the well-disciplined Mount team and its ability to play together as a unit!!

The only disappointment of the tournament was that only a handful of Mount students were interested enough to attend Friday night and less than 3 saw the championship match on Saturday.

On November 18, 1975, Vincent Hall gym was the scene of an exciting and well-played basketball game as the Mount team was narrowly defeated by Bedford 47-43. The Mount held the lead throughout most of the game and it was not until the dying minutes that the Bedford team took and maintained the lead. Leg injuries have become an epidemic at the Mount this year, and the basketball court was no exception as injuries took a player from each team. High scorers for the Mount teams were: Colleen Myrick-18 pts; Carolyn MacLean-10 pts; Nancy Reid-6 pts.

abolish tuition ??

WATERLOO (CUP) - Only if tuition fees are abolished and students are given a living stipend will universities be accessible to students from all income groups.

That is the position taken by the University of Waterloo Student Federation and the Ontario Federation of Students, UW Student Federation President and the Chairperson of OFS John Shortall said November 19.

"Arguments on accessibility have been going on for a long time, but they are being dusted off and polished a little because the provincial government has a committee doing the university circuit and taking a "fresh look" at student aid, Shortall said.

The concern of OFS is that Universities are the domain of the middle and upper income groups and are financially out of reach of students from lower income families.

The class mix of students has

not changed in recent years, Shortall said recently. He believes it will only begin to change if the economic barriers are eliminated.

In the brief which the OFS will present to the committee, it is stated that the many investigations into students assistance "...while producing a plethora of possible schemes, did arrive at one overwhelming consensus: universal accessibility and equality of opportunity to post-secondary education in Ontario do not exist".

The brief cites seven studies to corroborate this case, the most recent of which is from a study entitled "does money matter" by Porter, Porter and Blisshen (September 1973).

The brief quotes from this book: "Throughout this volume we have emphasized the extent to which financial barriers might prevent children from lower income families from aspiring to-

to university".

The other recent study quoted in the brief is from the 1972 report of the commission on post secondary education in Ontario.

It reads, "At present our research confirms that (post secondary education) resources are accorded more generously or utilized more often by students from middle and upper income groups whatever their ability".

The latest figures on class mix of post-secondary students are due to be released by Statistics Canada this month. Shortall does not expect them to show any difference from previous studies.

He said, however, that although the committee knew the figures were expected in November, it set its deadline for submissions to be put on the agenda at Oct. 31. The committee may use the Statistics Canada in its report, but Shortall said the schedule made it impossible for student groups to use the material in their presentations.

Shortall believes the government is using the committee "as a buffer before implementing an already designed program."

He explained that in recent years the government has had reports on student aid "from everyone and his brother."

Student groups, organized labour and independent researchers have supplied a plethora of information, Shortall said. The government has had exhaustive reports on the subject, he said, and there is nothing new to be said.

Shortall fears the already designed plan is that the provincial government will adopt a contingency repayment plan. This would mean that students would repay their loans according to the income they earn after graduation.

Shortall also said the provincial government "has been steadily cutting back on the amount spent on student grants."

He expects that an all-loans plan will be gradually introduced.

There are signs of that already Shortall said. Last year, of the 50 percent of UW students who applied for and received money from the Ontario Student Awards Plan (OSAP), the average student received \$691.

Since the first \$800 of any OSAP award is loan it means that on the average students at UW are not receiving grants, Shortall explained.

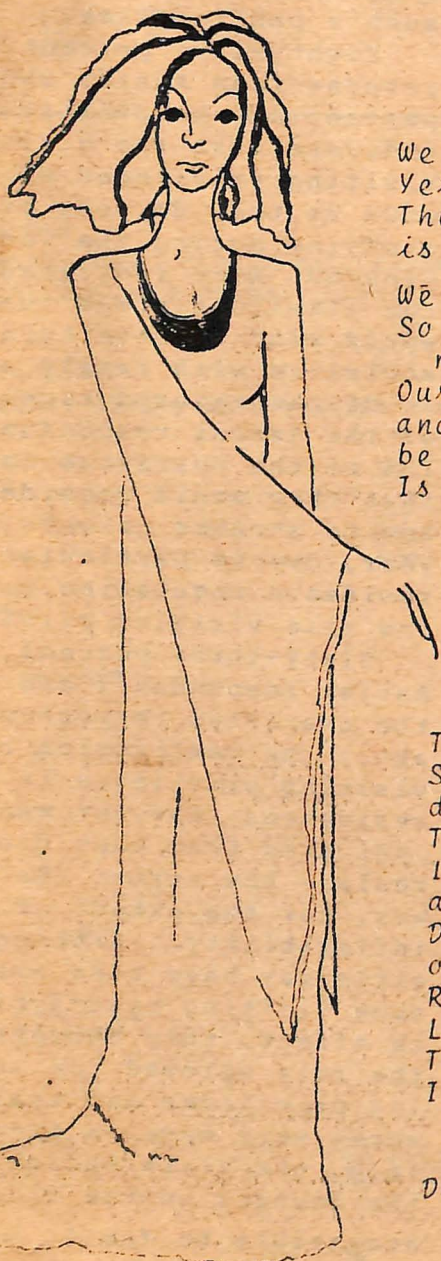

STUDENT UNION PROPOSAL

It has come to the attention of the Student's Council that, a major concern of the resident students is the university's regulation that prohibits men from visiting in the residences. Although the university proposed visiting hours on a trial basis on Sunday afternoon from 12 p.m. to 6 p.m., the Student's Council felt that as they were the official representatives of the students, they should deal with this concern themselves. A Student's Council questionnaire was sent out to the residences. It was designed to collect statistics about resident life at the Mount particularly in relation to the rule concerning no visiting privileges for males.

A rally held on Thursday, November 6, drew some 300 students indicating support on this issue.

In the following paper we have drawn up a detailed account of the statistics we have gathered and a comprehensive indication of the student's opinions of this matter.

One hundred and thirteen of one hundred and thirty six questionnaires (83%) sent to Assisi Hall were answered, of these 111 were in favour of visiting privileges in the residence and 2 were against them.

Sixty five of 83 questionnaires (78%) sent to Evaristus were returned; of these 60 were in favour of privileges and 5 were opposed.

Eighty two percent of the Assisi residents and 83 percent of the Evaristus residents indicate that they chose to live in residence because it was generally more convenient. They claimed that residence was conveniently located, close to classes and university activities. They find it more economical to live in residence as off-campus housing is expensive and scarce. Many students also said that they lived far

away from home and transportation would either prove impossible or at least very troublesome.

Seven percent of the Assisi residents and 8 percent of the Evaristus residents claim to have chosen residence because they enjoy the experience of meeting new people and living with others.

Nine percent of the Assisi returns and 8 percent of Evaristus did not answer their questionnaires.

Of the returns received from Assisi, 98 percent are in favour of visiting privileges for males. One percent are opposed.

Ninety two percent of the Evaristus returns indicated approval and 7 percent were opposed to visiting privileges for males.

To begin with we shall consider those survey returns that indicate a desire for visiting privileges. Ninety-nine percent of the Assisi returns and 79 percent of the Evaristus returns indicate that girls want to be allowed to have men in their rooms, as opposed to lounge areas.

The girls in both residences feel very strongly that as their rooms are literally their homes for the entire academic year, they should be afforded the same privileges that they are in their parents' homes. Having men in their rooms would be conducive to a healthier and more normal atmosphere in the residences. The girls feel that as they are old enough to go to university, they are old enough to entertain men in the same way as they would at home.

It is expressed in the survey that very often the girls want to spend a quiet evening with a male friend, boyfriend or male relative; they do not

always want, nor can they always afford to go out.

Many girls expressed the feeling that as their fathers' very often foot the bill, they have the right to see their daughter's living quarters when they come to visit. Many students are under the assumption that their fathers only have access to their rooms during the summer and when the girls move in and out of residence.

Privacy is a major point also as the girls feel uncomfortable in the lounges and are reluctant to discuss private affairs with a male relative or friend in such a public place.

Eighty-five percent of the returns from Assisi and 75 percent of the Evaristus returns indicate that the girls want visiting privileges on the weekends as they do most of their studying during the weeknights. Weekends were indicated to be the likeliest times that girls would wish to entertain and socialize with family and friends.

Of the returns received, 18% of the Assisi respondents and 18% of the Evaristus indicated that they would consider changing to another university next year, due in particular to the residence regulation prohibiting male visiting privileges.

Sixty-three percent of the Assisi respondents and 77% of the Evaristus respondents knew about the restriction on male visiting privileges in the residences, however many of them indicated that they did not realize how strict the regulation was, nor the extent of its inflexibility. Although the girls may have been aware that some visiting restrictions were in effect, they thought that the rule allowed for some visiting privileges and that allowances were made in special cases. (e.g. the girls thought that the lounges on the floors were accessible to family members.)

36% of Assisi returns and 23% of the Evaristus returns had no previous knowledge of the rule before arriving in residence.

We are aware that the wishes of every single resident cannot be accomodated in any proposal we might make. We have made a concerted effort to analyze all opinions and present the consensus of the majority.

We wish the residents of Assisi and Evaristus to have the option of entertaining male visitors in their rooms on week-end nights:

Friday 6pm-12:30am
Saturday 6pm-12:30am
Sunday 1 pm-6 pm

Students' Council in accordance with the students' wishes does not see any reason for the residence fees to be increased. We realize that the inclusion of males in the residence life -

must be carefully controlled.

Students' Council believes that controls should be stringent at the start to impress upon the students the severity of their new responsibility.

GENERAL REGULATIONS:

Signing In Policy

- 1) When the male visitor comes to either switchboard, the girl shall be paged.
- 2) She comes down, shows her ID and signs her name.
- 3) Her ID is left at the switchboard and the time is recorded.
- 4) The male also signs his name.
- 5) No one may be signed in after 12 midnight on Friday and Saturday or 5:30 pm on Sunday.

Signing Out Policy

- 1) When the guest leaves, the -

girls signs him out and claims her ID.

- 2) If an infraction of the rules has been committed then the girl does not get her ID back until she pays the fine.

GENERAL RESTRICTIONS:

- 1) Each girl will be allowed 2 male visitors during the specified hours.
- 2) Each girl will be responsible for the actions of her visitor once he has been signed in.
- 3) Visitors must be accompanied by the resident at all times once past the switchboard.
- 4) Each floor will decide to its satisfaction the arrangement of the washroom facilities.

Regulation:

EVARISTUS:

- 1) Visitors to Evaristus shall enter by the main door and sign in at the switchboard.
- 2) The stairs, 1st and 2nd floors tunnel are out of bounds. A girl wanting to use the vending machines must go alone.
- 3) The visitors will use the elevator and proceed to residence floors.
- 4) In the case of the elevator breaking down, the visitor will be accompanied along the 2nd floor to the north stairway to go up to the residence floors. (This is if and only if, the elevator is not working.)
- 5) The guest must be signed out by the resident he is visiting.

ASSISI:

- 1) Visitors to Assisi will enter by the main door and sign in at the switchboard.
- 2) Guests will proceed up to the residence floors using the elevator.
- 3) The stairs and tunnel are out of bounds.
- 4) The guest must be signed out by the resident he is visiting.

METHOD OF CONTROL:

Each floor will draw up a list of girls each of whom will be assigned a weekend to monitor. A girl may switch a weekend with someone else but she is still responsible for whatever occurs that weekend. The individual floor will make arrangements for those girls not wishing to take duties.

RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE GIRL ON DUTY:

- 1) The girl is responsible for the entire weekend. i.e. Friday and Saturday and Sunday.
- 2) She must go to the switchboard at 12:05am on Friday and Saturday, and 5:35pm on Sunday to check the list to see who is still entertaining a guest on her floor.
- 3) She informs those still with guests of the time and the approaching end of visiting hours.
- 4) At 5 minutes before the end of the hours she does the same.

- 5) At the end of the visiting hours, she signs her name to the bottom of the list.
- 6) Any infractions she reports immediately to the switchboard and if necessary a Pinkerton will be summoned. She also informs the Residence Committee Representative on her floor of any infractions. Together it is their responsibility to report to the Judiciary Board.
- 7) If the girl on duty is entertaining a guest, she must sign him out at 12pm on Friday and Saturday and 5:30 on Sunday before she checks the list and starts her rounds.

INFRACTIONS:

- 1) SIGNING IN OF VISITORS BY ANYONE TO A FLOOR UNDER SUSPENSION.
- 2) ILLEGALLY ENTERTAINING A VISITOR. I.E. NOT SIGNING HIM IN.
- 3) A VISITOR BEING IN A RESTRICTED AREA. I.E. ONE THAT IS DESIGNATED OUT OF BOUNDS.
- 4) HAVING MORE THAN 2 VISITORS.
- 5) ROWDY DISTURBING BEHAVIOR.
- 6) FAILING TO GET A VISITOR OUT BY THE END OF VISITING HOURS.
- 7) DAMAGE TO UNIVERSITY PROPERTY DURING VISITING HOURS.
- 8) NEGLECTING TO SIGN OUT A VISITOR.
- 9) ALLOWING A VISITOR TO WALK AROUND UNACCOMPANIED.

Infractions will be reported to the Residence Committee Rep of that floor. She and the girl on duty are responsible for bringing the case to the Judiciary Board and informing the deviant that she has committed an offence.

PENALTIES:

- 1) 1st offense: a \$25 fine to the offender and suspension of privileges to that floor for the next weekend.
- 2) 2nd offense: \$25 fine to the offender and loss of her privileges for a month (four weekends)
- 3) 3rd offense: no fine, eight academic months suspension of privileges.

Any offenses that cannot be pinpointed to individuals will result in the floors suspension of privileges for a month. (four weekends)

Students' Council proposes that a Judiciary Board be established.

Its membership shall consist of: Executive Vice President, Matthew Pearce, Internal Vice President, Jose Tremblett, Residents' Rep., Rickola Withers, Non-Residents's Rep., Mike Greenwood, and Sister Marie Gillen.

The number of resident and non-resident students on the board will vary from year to year.

This particular year there will be 3 non-resident students on it. However 2 of these are Executive members of Council and therefore are elected by both resident and non-resident students. They therefore represent everyone in general and noone in particular.

The Judiciary Board will be responsible for hearing all cases concerning infractions of the rules and determining the penalties. The fines will be collected by them by Friday of the week that they meet. (They will meet every Monday.) The Board will also hold all ID's of offenders until the fines are paid. Failure to pay a fine will result in \$5 being added for every extra day after the Friday.

All cases before the Board will be open hearings. The chairman of the Board will see to it that only board members, the offender, the duty girl AND ANY DIRECTLY INVOLVED PARTIES have a voice. He will maintain order at these hearings.

The residence representative from the floor should also be in attendance.

An official report shall be made of all hearings and this shall be filed with the Students' Council and the Dean of Students.

SPECIFICS:

FINES:

The fines shall be deposited into a separate banking account of which the Executive Vice President and Sister Gillen will be signing officers. The fines will go to the improvement of the residences. e.g. the kitchen facilities etc.

The guest list shall be inaccessible and confidential to all except the girl on duty and the Judiciary Board.

Failure to appear before the Board without prior written acceptable excuse will result in an automatic suspension from visiting privileges for the rest of the academic year.

Further investigation has revealed that there are few students in residence who are opposed to this proposal. The opinion of those who are, will be taken into consideration during the February assessment period.

We have included in this proposal a sheet to be signed by the residents indicating their understanding of the proposal. This does not necessarily imply that they are in full agreement of its principles.

We propose that this proposal be instituted on an experimental basis for 4 weekends starting

on January 9th. It will be reassessed by questionnaires from February 2nd - February 11th, 1976. This questionnaire will be drawn up by the residence committee with the help of Sister Gillen.

Students' Council is not responsible for anything that may occur during the visiting hours. The control of this privilege lies in the regulations and penalties herein described. Students' Council sees its responsibility as the assistance of the new programme and the representation of students concerns with regards to the proposal.

The Residence Committee working in conjunction with Council will be responsible for the maintenance of the programme, paperwork, suggestions and student representation.

Both groups are under the obligation to regard themselves as objective parties and to aid the girl on duty and the Judiciary Board if necessary.

We stress that the students will be represented to the University by the Council and the Residence Committee, but that the ultimate success of the programme rests with the residents themselves.

DATE: DECEMBER

WE THE UNDERSIGNED HAVE READ AND UNDERSTOOD THIS PROPOSAL REGARDING MALE VISITING PRIVILEGES AND ITS ENSUING REGULATIONS AND PENALTIES.

Penalties can also be extended to the entire floor if regulations are broken.

This proposal deals only with the resident students of Assisi and Evaristus. After discussions with the University we understand that the Sisters of Charity who rent out Vincent Hall to the Mount are not in-

favour of male visiting privileges in that residence. This being the case, the Students' Council suggests that the lounge hours could be extended in Vincent Hall and controlled in the same way as visiting privileges in Assisi and Evaristus.

Friday.....2 a.m.

Saturday.....2 a.m.

We do not feel that the Townhouses, Marywood and Marillac are affected by the restrictive regulation to the extent that Assisi and Evaristus are. Students in these residences are older and arrange their regulations according to the wishes of the entire house.

We propose that this entire proposal be initiated on January 9th, 1976, the first weekend after the Christmas holidays. It would be reassessed in a month in order that both the students and the administration may evaluate it. Further discussion would then be forthcoming with input from both groups.

We feel that this proposal must go through the correct channels. We wish to present it to the Administration Committee and receive a decision on it early in December in order that we may inform the students of the outcome and details.

In closing, we do not, under any circumstances wish for the residence fees to be increased. What we have proposed negates that necessity. Students are regarding this issue with a mature and responsible attitude. It is their concern that they be considered as adults as uni-

versity is supposedly an adult setting. They are willing to accept this responsibility in the same manner that they do at home. For most students this restriction makes their first experience of active segregation from males. Many students express incredulity at such a restrictive and archaic regulation. They do feel it is perfectly reasonable to enjoy some rights and privileges as do students in nearly all universities.

There is a strong feeling among students that much of the poor reputation Mount students receive outside the university is due to the impression of isolation and segregation that many people feel shrouds the Mount.

Many students express a feeling that they would enjoy the Mount much more if they had an option to entertain their male friends on the same basis that they entertain their female friends.

It should be noted that four of the seven students to male visitors did not indicate why they are opposed. Although two supported the issue initially, they later expressed concern over the prospect of residence fees being increased. One student expressed a concern about privacy.

For the future we have several comments. As there is little chance that Vincent Hall will receive visiting privileges, perhaps girls opposed to male visitors could live there.

Another alternative is that a floor in Assisi, for example 12th, could be specially set aside for girls not wishing to be involved in having male visitors.

It is also felt that in future the university should ensure that resident regulation are sent out to new students and also posted prominently in the residence. A concerted effort must be made to avoid misconceptions and misinterpretations.

NEW JOINERS

OTTAWA (CUP) - The three-year-old National Union of Students (NUS), which had 20 member campuses at the start of the academic year, now has 24 members as a result of referenda held this fall.

The new members of the national organization, which was founded two years after the collapse of the Canadian Union of Students-

in 1969, are:

- Memorial University in St. John's Newfoundland
- the University of Calgary in Alberta
- the University of Winnipeg in Manitoba, and
- the University of New Brunswick.

As well as bringing in four new member institutions, refer-

enda were also held on two member campuses to increase the NUS fee from 30 cents per student per year to \$1.00.

These fee increase referenda, held as a result of an October 1974 decision to raise the NUS fee to increase revenues for the national organization, passed at the University of Saskatchewan in Saskatoon and at the University of Regina.

The only setback of the fall was the failure to pass a membership referendum at the large University of Alberta campus in

Edmonton. Students there defeated NUS by a 2 to 1 majority.

Another 9 referenda, 2 on NUS membership and 7 to authorize the \$1.00 fee, will be held during the upcoming winter semester.

Kelsey Institute of Applied Arts and Science in Saskatoon and McMaster University in Hamilton will vote on whether to join the national union.

Students at the University of British Columbia and the University of Lethbridge will hold referenda to approve the fee increase, as will students at Brock University in Ontario grads and undergrads at the University of Toronto, and those at King's College and St. Mary's University in Halifax.

According to NUS spokesperson Dan O'Connor, other campuses may also hold referenda but have not yet officially decided. These include Waterloo, Manitoba, Western and Simon Fraser University.

On December 3, at QEHS an excellent performance was given by Canada's own Valdy and Mitch Gill. Mr. Gill, who originates from Maine, sang for about 1/2 hour prior to valdy's appearance. Although not well known he have a very enjoyable warm-up to the main show.

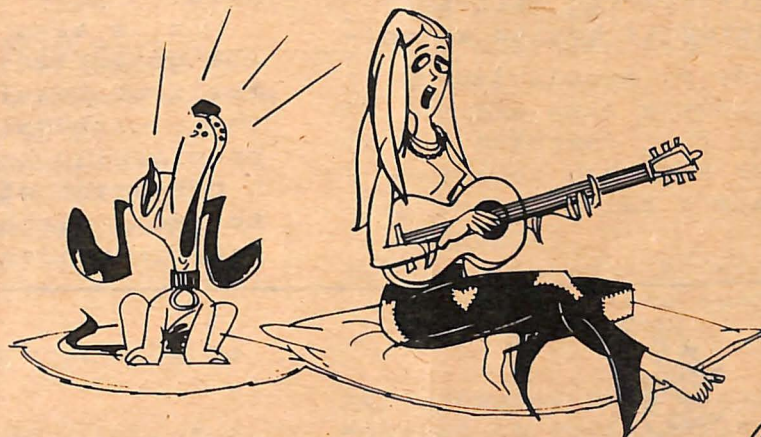
Valdy entering through a side door and squeezing by his speakers mounted the main stage to a roar of applause.

EXAMINATION RULES

Make sure that you know the time and place of your exam - it is your responsibility to do so. Most exams are in the SAC auditorium, but some have other locations shown on the exam timetable.

Wait outside the examination room until admitted by the proctors. If your exam is in the auditorium, wait on the fourth floor. Seating plans will be posted near the fourth floor doors showing which quadrant of the auditorium and which rows of that quadrant will contain your examination. You will have a desk top to write on, and students sit in alternate seats with vacant places along side.

No conversation is permitted inside the examination room. No books or papers may be taken inside, unless permitted by the professor. Do not take in coats, large purses, or briefcases.

You are reminded that smoking, eating and drinking are not permitted.

Once you have found a place which contains your examination, you may sit and begin immediately. No student is permitted to leave the examination area for the first twenty minutes. After this time, you may leave if you have finished. You must bring your book or paper down to the stage and place it on the appropriate table as you leave, and an attendance sheet must be signed at this time. You should have your student I.D. card available, and you may be asked by the proctor to show your card as you sign the sheet.

If you require assistance during the exam, raise your hand (do not leave your seat) and a proctor will come to you.
