




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



This annual affair is always eagerly anticipated by the students, especially by the "freshies" who deserved a second glance from their older sister-students, so resplendent did they appear in their formals. A tiny miraculous medal inserted in each girl's corsage, and similar medals appearing on the lapels of their escorts' coats, gave that significant touch to the gala occasion. January 28 brought something new—"Discussion Week." Small groups were formed to discuss "The Role of the Woman's College." This was done in connection with the Mount's part in C. F. C. C. S. and everyone was enlightened. Sister Maura spoke on "Co-education" to bring the week to a close. Her talk was appreciated by everyone.

More snow and cold weather suggested a skating party. On the night of February 1, the pond behind the Mount welcomed adventurous skaters, and the woods rang with shouts and laughter. There was one tragedy which resulted in a lush black eye for one of our Post-Grads. She recuperated in time for the dance, however. Virginia reels and square sets topped off the evening to make it one we were not soon to forget.

During these weeks we were fortunate enough to have Father Malone of Saint Mary's University lecture on the Labor Encyclicals. Father Malone's lectures are of vast importance to us as future Catholic citizens. Father Czako's lectures on "The History and Meaning of Art" were most enlightening and at the same time entertaining. Both speakers showed vast knowledge of their subjects, making us realize how lucky we are to live in a democracy, and giving us a better opportunity of knowing the beauty of real art.

Debating came to the fore on February 8 with a series of interclass debates sponsored by the Dramatics Society. The first one between the Freshmen and the Sophomores: "Resolved that as women are largely the buyers for the family, they are responsible for the misleading commercial advertisements so common in the public press", resulted in a victory for the Freshmen, Maureen Mantin and Eleanor Lewis. The following Friday brought the Juniors and Seniors together with: "Resolved that intercollegiate athletics, as now conducted, are detrimental to the scholastic standing of the students." This time the Juniors, Mary MacLean and Bryde Warner, won. The finals took place on February 22 with the resolution: "Resolved that co-education in colleges is desirable." The Juniors bowed out to the Freshman Class, and we saw that the Freshmen were really a class to be reckoned with.

Still another debate was coming up! Friday, February 29, brought Dalhousie to challenge the Mount. And such a contest. Marion C. Clarke and Margaret Bonthron upheld the affirmative of the resolution: "Resolved that Germany should be rearmed." And they won, proving themselves to be good winners and the Dal girls to be equally good losers.

The Feast of Saint Thomas was observed by Pax Romana, as St. Thomas is their patron. In Halifax, it was fittingly observed by the celebration of solemn High Mass at St. Thomas Aquinas Church, which was attended by all the Catholic College students of the city. Phi Delta Phi sponsored a lecture "Saint Thomas and Education" given by Sister Frances Carmel, followed by a skit of Saint Thomas presented by Saint Mary's boys. Pertinent book displays were to be seen in the library and philosophy classrooms.

Sure 'n then it was Saint Patrick's Day and "Drama Night" was finally here. Four original and very entertaining plays were presented, accompanied by a skit of Father Lord's "The Road to Connaught" by the Post-Grads. The Seniors easily won with their dramatic presentation of an incident in the life of Saint Maria Goretti entitled "The Blood-Stained Lily." Runner-up was "Starbright", an adaptation of "Captain January" by the Sophomore Class. The Freshman Class presented "Happiness"—a morality play, while the Juniors turned whimsical with "Fit For a Prince." The dance afterwards was enlivened by comments on the plays by the Saint Mary's boys. One blond Irishman still insists that those Post-Grads don't know how to pronounce "Connaught." What do you say, girls? There was also a lottery conducted by the Post-Grads and Seniors. Everyone was glad to see that the floor polisher and satin bed puff went to two former Mount girls.

March 26: Wednesday and Retreat. The day hops came out for dinner and unpacked their clothes in bright comfortable rooms. From the beginning, Father Douglas Daly, S. J., impressed upon us that this was to be a "vacation with God." All the lectures helped us to know God better through His Sacraments, His Mercy and His Goodness. Many of the girls went for a "close-up" of Father, and found that he understood their problems. We regretted the close of the retreat, but all resolved to make our lives reflect better the goodness of God.

Now it was time for the Speech Class to take a bow. The Public Speaking Contest on April 17 revealed a group of potential lecturers. Top honors went to Maureen Mantin with Maureen Coyle not far behind.

The doors of Mount Saint Vincent College were opened wide on April 27 for the C.C.S.M.C. Mission Rally. Delegates attended from Saint Peter's, Saint Mary's, Mount Saint Vincent Academy, Saint Patrick's Girls and Boys High, Convent of the Sacred Heart, Saint Patrick's Veterans, and the Halifax Infirmary. Special speakers were Bishop Leverman and Monsignor Curran. More than three hundred crusaders attended solemn Benediction which was followed by an enjoyable social hour.

April came to a close with the basketball tournament sponsored by the Athletic Association. The games were exciting and everyone was glad to see the Oland Trophy go to the Sophomore Class.

It was May and music filled the air. Not the music of whispering trees and babbling brooks though, but violins, and pianos, and melodious voices. It was the night of the Spring Musicale! The performers could again be proud of themselves.

A great treat was in store for us on May 8 when Father Andrei Ourousoff of Fordham University spoke at Queen Elizabeth Auditorium. The lecture was sponsored by Phi Delta Phi as the second annual lecture of their promised series. Since Father Ourousoff is the only living Russian Jesuit he was well acquainted with Russian problems and presented them in a most captivating manner. We were doubly pleased to have him celebrate Mass the following morning in the beautiful Byzantine Rite. That was an event we would not soon forget!

May 14. The awful day was here at last. It was almost a relief to encounter the first examination paper. The days were refreshingly cool for the first part of the week and then the heat came. Tuesday was a glorious day to end writing and begin to enjoy living!

"Here comes the Navy" was the cry as the U.N.T.D.'s descended upon the Mount to attend the first of the Commencement week festivities. Many a cadet was selected to escort a fair young Mount girl to the Prom.

Wednesday, May 21, the graduates were guests of the Alumnae Executive at Ashburn Golf Club, and the following day, they were the center of attention again at the Class Day Exercises. Every year Class Day seems to become more beautiful . . . the daisy chain . . . the planting of a tree by the Senior Class . . . the prophecy and wills . . . all make one realize what it means to be a Mount girl.

Friday, not to be outdone by our Navy friends, we took to the sea. And such a wonderful Harbor cruise it was! The only worry was how to keep hair smooth for the big night, but somehow they did. Monday opened with solemn Baccalaureate Services celebrated by Most Reverend A. B. Leverman D. D. The sermon was given by Reverend William V. McCarthy, D.D. The Convocation exercises commenced at 3 p. m. Many proud parents were present to see their daughters receive their degrees, and there were a large number of post-graduates too. A very stirring address was made to the graduates by Peter J. O'Hearn, Q.C., deputy Crown Prosecutor. And then everything was over . . . the graduates were with their parents and friends . . . the halls were empty . . . we were going home and we were not so happy after all!

And share the pages of their books



Congratulations to Mr. and Mrs. James Willis (Marie Brennan) on the birth of a darling baby.





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
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
