Student Union Holds General Elections

Next week Mount students go to the polls to elect new representatives for the 1996-1997 academic year. Student Union General Elections will be held on March 12 and 13 to fill 26 positions.

According to Student Union President, Joe Strolz, the big election issues are likely to be university rationalization, the Canadian Federation of Students (CFS), and the future relationship between MANUS and the Student Union. Students are encouraged to speak out about issues of importance to them during the election week.

"It's important for voters to bring these and any other issues of concern up at candidate speeches," Strolz said.

Speeches are scheduled on March 4, 5 and 6 in Rosaria Centre, MANUS Lounge, and Seton Academic Centre, when students will have an opportunity to hear candidates' platforms and positions.

At least two polling stations will be open between 8 a.m. and 7 p.m. on election days, located on the main level of Seton Academic Centre, and in Rosaria Centre. In order to vote, students must present a valid student ID card.

Voter turn-out for Student Union elections has typically been small — between 12 and 15 per cent of the student body. Student Union regulations require a minimum number of ballots to be cast in order for election results to count.

"Ten per cent of the student population must vote in order to achieve a valid election." Strolz said.

The number of candidates running in general elections has also often been small, and this year seems to be no exception. Twelve candidates are running for eight positions. Positions that are not filled in next week's elections will be filled in a by-election next fall.

Little Publicity for S.U. Positions

Deadline for election nominations passes with little fanfare

Robert Batherson, a third year Public Relations student is a political animal. Actively involved with a national political party, Batherson, a former Chairperson of MSVU Student Council, also keeps on top on university issues such as Student Union and rationalization.


But he didn't know the deadline for Student Union election nominations was on Friday, March 1, until told two days before by a Picaro staff member.

"I was interested in running and I was aware of the March 12 and 13 election, but I didn't know about the deadline," Batherson says. "The whole problem with the lack of posters up is that it denies new people the chance to run for council."

This has Batherson and some other students questioning the Student Union elections process. To be able to run for a Student Union position, a student must pick up a nomination package from the SU office, gather 25 signatures and pass the signed sheet in by the deadline.

Last week, staff members of The Picaro counted only eight posters, put up on Tuesday, advertising the nominations on campus. The posters on 8 1/2 by 11 green paper, listed the 26 Student Union positions available, including President, Executive VP and Internal and External VP. The bottom line on the poster - "(Deadline is Friday, March 1, 1996, 4:00 pm)" is only 3 mm high.

Marina Harris, the Chairperson of Student Council and the
Chief Returning Officer, is the
head of the Elections Committee.
The Elections Committee, which
administers elections and referenda, held its first meeting Friday,
after the nominations deadline.
Harris refused to comment on the

Parr-Johnston to UNB - Consultative Search Process for New Mount President

On Fri., Feb. 23, Dr. Elizabeth Parr-Johnston, President and Vice-Chancellor of Mount Saint Vincent University announced that she was the unanimous choice of the Search Committee for the position of president at the University of New Brunswick (UNB).

Last week, the Board of Governors and the two Senates at UNB ratified the decision. Parr-Johnston will continue her role at the Mount until her new appointment begins on July 1, 1996. At a meeting on last Friday, Parr-Johnston said it was not an easy decision to make.

"I went through a divorce that was easier than this decision." She said the Mount is a strong community and functions as a team.

"I believe the Mount is in a strong position to deal with the

challenges of cuts in government funding and the Metro Universities Consortium...I am totally confident that the Mount will continue to play a leadership role," she said.

Carole Taylor, chair of the Mount's Board of Governors said the Board was expecting her to stay, and were surprised by the news.

"We don't like to lose a good person, but we have to see this as an opportunity," she said.

Many people are asking what happens next. Taylor says she has heard from a lot of people in the last few days. The two most frequent concerns are the need for stability in a time of change and the need to be consulted she said.

Taylor stressed that the Board isn't planning to make any decisions behind closed doors. The Board's executive has decided to hold a series of open fo-

rums with the university community for input on the process to recruit a new president.

"We want to provide a forum where people will feel comfortable speaking, and where their voice will be heard," Taylor said.

These forums will address questions like should an interim or acting president be appointed, and whether an internal or external search should be conducted. Last time the Mount recruited a new president, the search process took 18 months. But at last week's meeting, people in the audience said the Mount doesn't have that luxury this time.

Taylor addressed the tight time line and said the Board really wants to do what is right for the Mount. She spoke about the Mount's uniqueness.

publicity con't from pg. I publicity for the elections beyond saying: "There are posters up." She had originally agreed to a quick interview, but refused to speak once it began.

But Joe Strolz, President of the Student Union, feels students should know about the nominations and election. He says that besides placing posters on campus, SU requested councillors spread the word to students. Also, at the Senate meeting last Monday, SU asked the faculty members present to inform other professors and students about the SU nominations.

"So it's a very open process and it's very geared towards filling council and having as many students participate as possible. It's not like if you miss the cut-off date, that's it," says Strolz. He points out that students can run in the fall by-elections for any positions still available. However, executive positions such as President and Executive VP are usually filled in the March elections.

Strolz denies the posters were inadequate. "The layout of the posters is immaterial as long as the information is out there."

But some students disagree. Steve Quinn, a part-time Business student heard about the election nominations Thursday after a friend asked him to sign her nomination form. He had never seen the posters.

"People who want the position will know about it and catch the deadline," he says. "But they should have put up more posters and fixed up the presentation. If they wanted to save paper, they could have advertised in The Picaro."

Although Student Union receives the second page of each

Picaro for free, they did not submit any information about the nomination deadlines.

Karri LeBlanc, a fifth year Arts student, also hadn't seen the posters on campus.

"They should have been put up sooner and there's certainly not enough. It's not fair for the people who want to run," says LeBlanc.

A former member of Student Council isn't surprised that students not already part of SU didn't know about the nomination deadlines.

Melanie Cunningham resigned from her position as Pub-

lic Relations Rep after she grew frustrated with the present SU set-

"I felt that I couldn't get anything done for the students I was representing," says Cunningham. "When I resigned from Council, I wrote them a vague letter explaining my reasons. I offered to meet with them and discuss my suggestions for making Council more friendly to members."

Cunningham received no response to her letter and it was never addressed at a Student Council meeting.

The next four to six weeks will be crucial. Facilitated, open forums will be held with various groups at the Mount like faculty, staff and students. At the same time, a committee will be formed to begin looking and considering options for the new president.

Bomb Squad" Leaves its Mark

The Mount campus was targeted by graffiti vandal(s) twice last week. There were etchings discovered in a few different areas Monday morning and then again on Friday morning.

Director of Physical Plant, Paul Reyno, said it's just a nuisance.

"It's plain vandalism—that's a crime," Reyno said. "They're getting their kicks out of doing this...they obviously did it very blatantly and have no regard for property."

The graffiti was found in front of the library doors of Seton near the cement steps, on a book depository at the back doors and along the wall by Vinnie's Pub. Some of the writings were slang, references to women in The Birches residences and their signature "Bomb Squad."

First year student Michelle Hebert said the act must have taken place during the night sometime after 10 p.m. but before 8 a.m.

"When I left the library Sunday night it was clean — there was nothing there," Hebert said. "Then early the next morning it was there."

She was very disturbed by this situation, however, she knew it wouldn't take long for it to be removed.

"I was so upset because the Mount is so emaculate and here someone wants to wreck it," Hebert said. "But I knew they'd have it cleaned up right away."

Apparently, those involved aren't out to stain only the Mount. Similar graffiti has been spotted in other locations around the city. It's been seen further along the Bedford Hwy., near Dunbrack St. and downtown.

Reyno said everything has been cleaned up around campus and that they're working with Halifax City Police on the matter.

He said he hopes this "awakens people's social conscience" and that as a community effort it can be resolved. The cooperation from everyone would be appreciated, Reyno said, and he urges anyone with any information to come forward.

UNIVERSITY APPLICA-TIONS DOWN IN ONTARIO (Source: The Varsity, University of Toronto) by Stacey Young

TORONTO (CUP) — University administrators deny that tuition fee increases are responsible fora drop in applications to Ontario's colleges and universities.

Applications this year are down 1.3 per cent from last year's numbers. But not all schools saw a drop in applications.

A little over 12 per cent more graduating high school students named the University of Toronto as their number one pick over last year's

figures. At the other end of the spectrum, almost 20 per cent fewer students expressed interest in attending Ottawa's Carleton University. The Council of Ontario Universities (COU) maintains that there is no relationship between tuition level and demand for university degrees, and have lobbied the province for substantial hikes in tuition for the last several years.

But Heather Bishop, chair of the Canadian Federation of Students Ontario component, disagrees with the council's stand.

"For the COU to try to cover up the figures means they are ignoring a lot of the problems," she said.

Applications to both the University of Ottawa and Ryerson Polytechnical University fell 5.5 per cent, and the University of Western Ontario experienced a decline of 2.8 per cent, including a drop of more than 20 per cent at its main campus, King College.

U.S. WANTS LESS CANA-DIAN MEDICAL STUDENTS (Source: The Varsity, University of Toronto) by Alan Hari-Singh

TORONTO (CUP) — Canadian medical students could be barred from training in the United States if the American government follows a recommendation to stop subsidizing the residencies of foreign medical students.

The recommendation was made after a panel concluded that the U.S. had enough doctors and the group concluded that stopping the subsidies would prevent a potential surplus of physicians in the country, he says.

"If there's an abundant supply of doctors now, and that's leading to an excess, then we should stop funding the education of graduate international students," he said.

Detmer says the influx of foreign medical residents into the U.S. has increased 80 percent since 1988 and 75 per cent of those have stayed in the U.S. to practice. About 250 Canadians are also currently training in the U.S., according to the American Association of Medical Colleges.

But according to Michelle Wise, externalvice-president of the University of Toronto's Medical Society, if this recommendation is passed the U.S. would lose talented andwell-trained doctors from other countries.

"I can't image that the [U.S.] government wouldwant to exclude bright, well-trained doctors from other countries," she said. "They would also lose the research talent that comes out of Canada" Detmer adds that competition amongst domestic students for residency positions is at an all-time high.

TOBACCO ADVERTISE.
MENTS TARGET MINORS

OTTAWA (CUP) —Plastered in bus shelters, billboards, and magazines across Ontario and Quebec, the ads display an invitingly open "smooth" cigarette pack being flanked by an electric and acoustic

guitar. "Either you like it or you don't," reads the ad.

But not everyone likes the RJR-Macdonald Inc. ad, including federal health minister David Dingwall, and anti-tobacco activists who say the ads target minors.

"I'm rather pissed off at these manufacturers in terms of what they've done," Dingwall told reporters on Feb 21. "It seems to me that

they've focused on young people."

Dingwall said he is considering introducing legislation to once again ban tobacco advertising.

In December Canada's tobacco corporations developed a volunteer code of ethics to police itself and make sure minors are not targeted.

But anti-tobacco activists say the code is nothing more than a public relations gimmick.

Heather Selin, policy consultant for the Non-Smokers Rights Association, says that the ads were developed with the youth market in

mind, and the locations picked were to maximize exposure to minors.


RJR-Macdonald violated their code of ethics by placing a smooth ad across the street from a school in Hull. The code strictly states that the ads shall not be placed within 200 metres of the entrance of any school.

Mary Trudelle, the spokesperson for RJR-Macdonald, said that it was an honest mistake.

"We're upset and very embarrassed about the whole incident," she said.





Have you ever replaced a meal with a chocolate bar with your busy schedule? Grabbing something on the run becomes increasingly more frequent among university students as exams approach.

The relationship between food and stress is one of two extremes. Some students do not eat enough while others "eat everything in sight," says Pam Lynch, lecturer with the department of Human Ecology at Mount Saint Vincent University and dietitian at Nutrition Counselling Services and Associates.

Some students tend to skip meals during stressful times of the semester. They do not think of themselves as not eating, says Lynch. They often have less energy because they skip meals and are, therefore, less able to

cope with stress.

Others eat foods they can grab quickly. These are often foods that do not have to be prepared and are easily accessible. Junk food is often eaten because it provides comfort at a time when stress is high. Lynch says that students who snack tend to eat more often. They do not think of the consequences at the time.

"Preparing a complete meal takes time and that is something we don't have to spare in the Public Relations program," says Melissa Watton MSVII student. "I sometimes eat on the run, but I don't consider it to be a problem."

While Watton does not consider it to be a problem, Lynch says that "becoming aware is the first step to a healthy lifestyle." She advises students to remember that nutrition is basic to their overall welfare. Students should

give more thought to meal planning when coming to a stressful time during the semester. The best fuel for our bodies is not always the food which is most convenient to grab.

Students pay the least amount of attention to their eating habits when they have busy schedules and exams. Ironically, this is the most important time, says Diane Tinkham, nurse and health educator at the Mount's health office.

Students are "under stress and overworked," says Tinkham. They must plan ahead to ensure that they will eat properly. Otherwise, long-term bad habits will

Students often feel that they cannot afford to eat properly. Trinkham says that the health office helps students work with their budgets in order to find the least costly combination of healthy foods.

"The first year of college is often a difficult one," says Christine Dunkel-Schetter and Marci Lobel authors of Stress among students. "Students leave support systems and form new friendships; there are high and often unclear academic demands and a large number of new distractions." Their research shows that stress can have various consequences for physical health and be a contributor to eating disorders such as bulimia and anorexia

Eating disorders can be avoided by keeping short-term bad habits under control. It is important to follow Canada's Food Guide. "A combination of eating well, appropriate exercise and enough sleep helps to relieve stress," says Lynch. She encourages students, when coming to a stressful time of their studies, to take it "one meal at a time."

Merrill's Cafe and Lounge

Merrill's is quite a remarkable place to eat. I have never seen anythingquite like it. It's rather stunning in a unique sort of way. Anyone who has been to Merrill's would know

The reason that it is so original is because it used to be a bank. When the Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce closed down, it was transformed into Merrill's Cafe and Lounge. The front doors are huge with brass handles, the ceiling inside is delicately detailed and is beautiful, I spent a lot of time looking up at the ceiling. There are also big windows overlooking George street (not much of a view, but hey). The whole place boasts the original wood panels. The brass railings used in the original bank line the upper section of the cafe.

One can imagine what a prominent and busy spot this bank must have been in its day. The atmosphere was really nice and relaxing. There is so much to look at and enjoy. Just inside the entrance is a wall displaying framed pictures of old newspapers giving outlining details of the bank's opening way back when. Also included are some pictures.

Merrill's is located on the corner of George and Granville with its entrance at 5171 George Street; it is directly across from Province House. We had quite a time finding it, with all the one-way streets down town. We did find it and were lucky enough to find a place to park at the same time. I am not sure if it is on a bus route or not, but there are buses that go downtown. The number for Merrill's is 425-5249.

Merrill's has quite a selection on their menu, prices ranging from \$2.75 to \$5.75. The menu offers food like quiche, lasagna, grilled haddock, tender-

loin tips, and your basics like club house sandwiches. Every Wednesday and Thursday is loonie night - potato skins, nachos, poutine, and caesar salad are all \$1 each. Also on Wednesday and Thursday from 4:30 to 10 p.m. you can buy 10-cent wings. Tuesday is burger night, when you get two burgers for the price of one. Fridays from 4:30 to 9 p.m., appetizers and fingers are half price. On Saturday, you can have brunch from 11:30 to 3 p.m. And you get steak, eggs, home fries, salad and toast all for \$4.75. There are no desserts on the menu but everyday they have two house desserts that you can choose from.

Merrill's has an upper section and a lower section, to sit in the upper section you must purchase food; the lower section is more like a bar

where you can go in and order a drink. I ordered the special of the day which was pineapple chicken stir fry (yes, I still like chicken, the last restaurant didn't turn me off it!).


he's a superb lover...until Martha tells him she likes men who act like themselves. Then, all hell breaks loose and the humour begins.



Perhaps this was Moore's way of portraying the cold, calculating heart underneath Carmen's hot beauty. Call me sentimental, but I was hoping that




as a jaybird. Don Jose unwittingly falls for her every scheme, as she entices him back to her home in the woods.

Perry Como concert. This has no reflection on Marshall's performance. She was a true rock performer that night, belting out seven songs from her ten track C.D. and showing the diversity of her music.

Amanda Marshall strutted across the stage with confidence and never once let her unaffected audience diminish her energy. Marshall has been performin nightclubs in Toronto since was 17 and has also toured w Jeff Healy and Tom Cochrane before she even had a recording contract. Now at 23 she has come into her own with an album so mature in quality that it's hard to believe it is her debut.

She also announced during the show that she lived in a suburb of Halifa from the time she was 11 ur she was 14. I didn't stay for Cochrane because of previ bad experiences at his shows (he has a bad attitude with his audiences); every review I read said that he should take lessons from Amanda Marshall in energy because his show definitely lacked it. 



That is both the achievement and curse of Hubert Clements, one of the two characters Doug Innis skilfully and magically brings to life in the play he cowrote The Satchemo Suite. With co-writer Hans Boggild, Innis set out to expand on the interesting premise of an encounter between a classical cel-



list and Louis "Satchemo" Armstrong.

> **Hubert Clements** is a classical cellist who suddenly finds himself thrown into the spotlight of being first chair in his symphony. With the world as he perceives it falling apart around him, Hubert must excise the demons of his past and present; this he does with a little help from a spirit, that of Satchemo. Racist and derogatory remarks are made to

Despite continuous work, Hubert's hands repeatedly slur the passage. agonized frustration, Hubert broods on the comparison to

Satchemo; that's when Satchemo appears to defend his art. Through a number of poignant and colourful flashbacks into both Hubert's and Satchemo's pasts, sources of fear and hatred are confronted. Step by step, Hubert comes to terms with his true problems, guided by Satchemo's words of wisdom, "Hatin' somebody is just a way of blamin' other people for your own shortcomings"

The writing is a mix of poetic and philosophical images which border on brilliance. Although Satchemo's songs are interspersed with the narrative, they seem almost secondary to the

story line, which may prove a disappointment to some. The show is definitely not a musical, but rather an interesting blend of song and story. Innis, an accomplished cellist in real life, moves between characters seemlessly, yet it is immediately clear who is speaking.

Mulgrave Road Theatre's presentation of The Satchemo Suite has played in over 50 high

schools. Next stop for the play will be the Astor Theatre in Liverpool on March 6. The play is highly affordable - \$10 for students - and highly recommended. You'll laugh, you'll cry, you'll feel the whole gamete of emotions. Best of all, though, is that it's around an hour long, so it's ending just as your ass is falling asleep!




