the university would have opened its doors for a few male students. When the town houses are opened, does that not vacate approximately one wing of Vincent that could be rented?

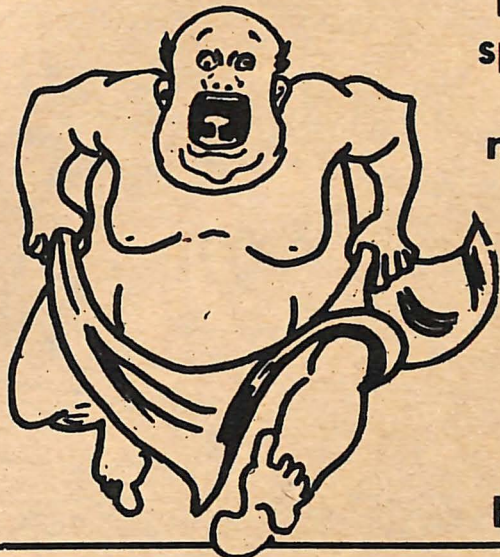
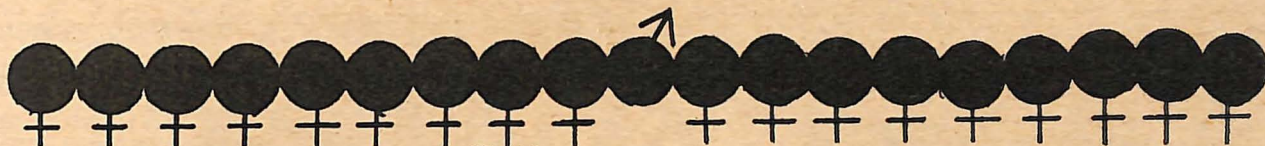
Nothing, not one

A NEW FACE AT THE MOUNT

On September 27, 1972, Sister Catherine Wallace, President of MSVU, announced the appointment of Dr. Mairi St. John MacDonald, as Assistant Dean-Director of Continuing Education and Summer School.

Dr. MacDonald was born in Montreal. She is the daughter of Col. Ronald St. John MacDonald, M.D., of Pictou County, N.S. and Elizabeth Smith MacDonald. Dr. MacDonalds' brother has recently been appointed Dean of Law at Dalhousie University.

Dr. Mairi MacDonald graduated from McGill University in 1946 with a Bachelor of Science degree in Agriculture with first class Honours in Economics. In 1950 she

was awarded her Masters degree with first class Honours in Social Sciences, at St. Francis Xavier University. Then in 1968 she received a Doctor of Education (Adult Education and Counselling) from the University of Toronto.

Dr. MacDonald brings to her post at the Mount, more than 2 years of experience in teaching and counselling in N.S., Ontario, and Britain. She was Secretary of the Adult Education Division of the N.S. Department of Education, from 1949-1952. Later she began teaching in London, England, Halifax, Toronto and London Ontario.

Within the last five years, Dr. MacDonald has acted

as Director of Counselling at Seneca College of Applied Arts and Technology, Willowdale, Ontario. Also she has been an Instructor in the graduate program in Counsellor Education and Supervision of Practicum for M.Ed. Students at the Ontario Institute for Studies in Education, Toronto. Dr. MacDonald is a member of several Canadian and American professional organizations concerning adult education, counselling and guidance. Re-

Bad news for those living in residence

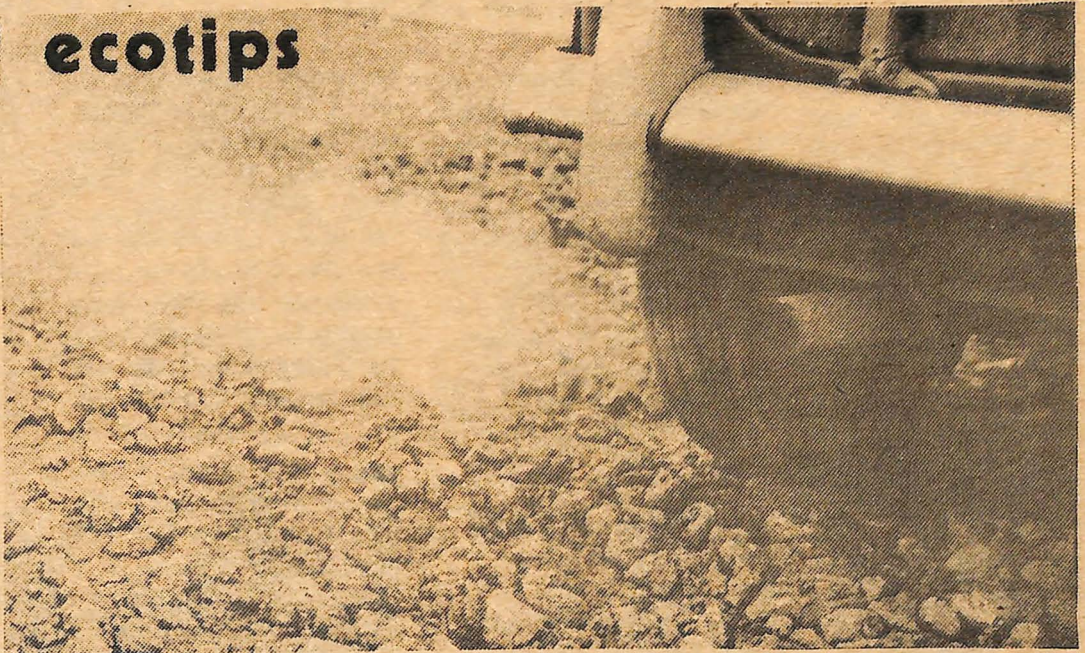

ecotips



General

Use your neighbourhood to good advantage. There is likely an impressive array of skills that can be shared so that old appliances, lawnmowers, clothes, etcetera, can be repaired rather than scrapped.

If the old appliance or whatever cannot be repaired by you or a neighbour, do send it to a repairman or donate it to an organization that can make use of it.

Don't scrap wire coat hangers. Return them to the cleaner and boycott those cleaners who refuse to accept them.

Transportation

The internal combustion engine is a great danger to our air and eventually to our very lives. While there is not yet an alternative to it, we can attempt to minimize its effect on our environment.

Use low-lead gasolines when and if you can.

Keep your car tuned properly. You will get better gas mileage, more usable

power, and the gas will burn more efficiently with a minimum of pollutants discharged into the air.

At the cottage, keep your outboard motor or snowmobile in a reasonable state of tune as well, and make sure your outboard is not leaking gasoline and oil into the water.

When buying a new outboard or other small-engined vehicle, choose a four-cycle motor rather than two-cycle because the latter burns its fuel much less efficiently.

If your car has a manual choke, use it properly. Don't leave it out for too long or you will gum up both your engine and your air with excess carbon.

Fabrics and Clothing

There is difficulty in deciding whether one fabric is better than another in terms of ecological safety. For example, cotton is an ecological luxury since it requires far more land, water and pesticides to produce than, say, nylon or rayon. In fact, 70 percent of all the DDT used in the United States is used on the cotton crop. And the DDT used today will still be toxic in the year 2000. On the other hand, the factories which produce chemical or synthetic

fabrics also pollute, though exactly how much is hard to determine. There are disadvantages on both sides of the argument, so the only response to the problem is to buy durable clothes and to pass them on to someone else when you have no further use for them.

For clothes that are simply worn-out, what remains can definitely be used around the house. Old cotton shirts can be used to mend sheets, etcetera, or to make colorful aprons, or just as polishing cloths.

Non-Returnable Glass

Glass bottles can be modified quite easily by cutting off the necks for example. To cut, dip a piece of cord in kerosene or in lighter fluid and tie it around the bottle where you want it cut. Light the cord and it will burn through the glass leaving a rough edge which you can take off with emery cloth.



Sex Discrimination Provision

On September 1, 1972 important amendments to the Nova Scotia Human Rights Act are scheduled to become effective in Nova Scotia. Section II A(1) provides that no person shall deny to, or discriminate against, an individual or class of individuals, because of the sex of the individual or class of individuals, in providing or refusing to provide any of the following:

- accommodation, services and facilities customarily provided to members of the public;
- occupancy, or any term or condition of occupancy, of any commercial unit or self-contained dwelling unit;
- transfer of any property or interest in property;
- employment, conditions of employment or continuing employment, or the use of application forms or advertising for employment, unless there is a bona fide occupational qualification based on sex.

I sense an attitude that was verbalized to me very nicely during orientation week. I had invited a girl to the house. She hesitated awkwardly and finally slayed me with..."Well,... really, I'm not very religious."

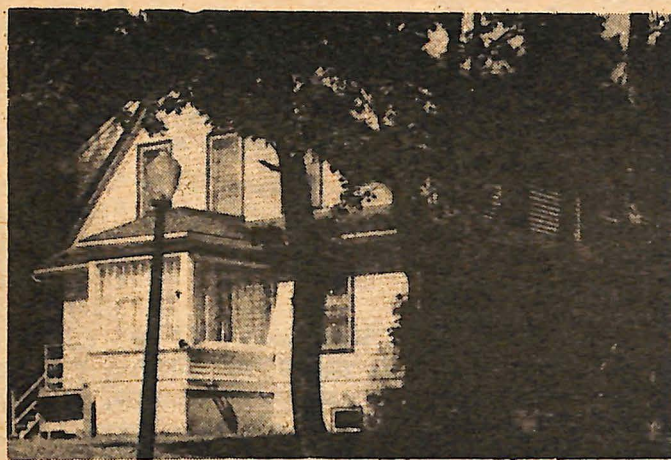
Her reaction startled me. I wasn't ready for it. We parted in silence, still strangers to each other; but what she said stuck in my mind. And since then, in one way or another, many people have said "Well,... really, I'm not very religious", and so they stay away from the place because they think we are having prayer meetings all the time, or because we are trying to suck them into something, or because they think our preoccupation is with "Irrelevencies", like angels and archangels, and so on. Hell, I don't even know what they are.

But if we don't go around praying all the time - or asking people if they are saved, then what are we, and what do we try and do? That's a fair question.

OK. So let's talk about the house. It's for you to use, and we really don't have a carefully concealed ulterior motive for wanting you to use it. Just relax, kick off your shoes, listen to some music, and make some coffee. Nobody

will crowd you. We've got nothing to sell, except that we care. We care about people, and about being human - which we can only do in relation to other people. But the possibilities for growth, for movement towards a fuller sense of human-ness, only comes about as we meet. Maybe we can help each other find out who we are; maybe no beautiful things will happen, but we won't even have that possibility if we don't reach out to each other and dare to let someone know us. And as for the chaplains- well, it's

true that they have a religious bias. But religion as I see it involves to a great extent the attitudes and values that a person adopts - attitudes towards oneself, towards others, and towards whatever it is that is greater and beyond all of us; and the value systems by which we make our decisions. If the chaplains are "religious", then it seems to me that their concern is largely for something internal - the tensions and processes that are localized in the inner part of man, and not some-



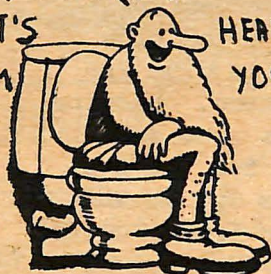

Commitments:

We suffer no lack of challenges in Canada today. We do suffer, in my opinion, a serious lack of commitment on the part of government to meet these challenges. I would like to talk with you now about four I feel to be most urgent.

JOBS: Right now, more than half a million Canadians are without jobs, one of the highest unemployment rates in the industrialized world. In Quebec, one in eleven is jobless; in Newfoundland, one in nine; among young Canadians, one in five; among our native people, three in five. Well over two million people are directly affected.

Canada can do better. My government would make the creation of jobs its first priority.

My government would immediately reduce personal income taxes, to stimulate consumer demand, to create jobs. We would eliminate the 11% Federal sales tax on building materials to encourage construction, because construction means jobs. We would encourage the further processing of our raw materials here, because that means jobs.

My government would expand the retraining opportunities available through the Department of Manpower, and make that agency much more aggressive in searching out job vacancies.

My government would insist on greater long range planning of special job-creating activities—such as summer youth employment—so that the communities to be served could be involved from the outset, and so that jobs could be found for those whose need is most pressing.

Further, my government would act to strengthen our job-creating potential for the future. We would increase direct government investment in research and technology, and expedite the process by which Canadian innovations can be marketed around the world.

PRICES: What cost you five dollars four years ago right now costs you six. The poor people of Canada, the elderly and those on fixed incomes, have suffered most from this kind of inflation, but clearly it affects the earnings and savings of all Canadians. And, because it makes Canada's exports less competitive, inflation affects a good many jobs as well. The government I lead would tackle this problem directly.

First of all, my government would calculate its tax revenues in terms of constant rather than inflated dollars, so as to eliminate the Treasury Board's vested interest in inflation.

We would strengthen the role of the Auditor General, so that unproductive government spending, which contributes not a little to the inflationary cycle, might be revealed and reduced.

We would support the cost-of-living escalator formula for those receiving old age and guaranteed income security benefits.

And, should the need ever arise, my government would be prepared to use temporary wage and price controls to combat inflation.

ECONOMIC INDEPENDENCE: Fifty-eight percent of Canada's manufacturing industry is foreign controlled, and there have been almost as many foreign takeovers since Mr. Trudeau took over as in the previous ten years.

Mr. Trudeau's recent legislation does not begin to meet the problem: it fails to correct a situation in which it is easier for foreign than for domestic corporations to effect takeovers; further, it fails to increase a Canadian presence in existing subsidiaries, and fails to provide for full financial disclosure by those subsidiaries.

My government would enact the changes necessary to make this legislation truly effective. Beyond that, we would revise the Bank Act to make certain that venture capital was available for the expansion of existing Canadian firms, or the creation of new ones.

My government, in concert with the provinces, would develop new programs to ensure the rapid growth of our entrepreneurial and managerial talent pools.

And we would, again together with the provinces, establish and define key sectors of the economy which are to be considered reserved for Canadian ownership.

THE ENVIRONMENT: Half of Canada's urban centres with populations of a thousand or more lack any sewage treatment, and a further third have only the most rudimentary equipment. The Trudeau government's Ministry of the Environment is not really a ministry at all, since many of its regulations are enforced by a variety of other government agencies.

We can, and absolutely must do much more to protect Canada.

My government would first of all create an Environmental Council to monitor, and disseminate information upon the quality of our environment, and recommend measures to parliament.

My government would encourage the development of large-scale anti-pollution industries in Canada.

It would, together with the provinces, act to stiffen the penalties for all forms of environmental neglect, whether to our air, soil, or water, international waters included.

It would use a variety of financial incentives to assist industry to invest in pollution control equipment.

It would create a co-ordinated Department of the Environment.

I would say again that we face no lack of tasks, no want of challenges anywhere in this land...in our cities and towns, on our small farms, and across the open reaches of our north.

We can meet none of them if we cannot create jobs, if we cannot protect the savings of those who work, cannot assume greater control over our own economy, cannot live in harmony with nature.

I am confident that we can do these things, and a great many more, if we are wisely and honestly led.

My government will strive to provide that kind of leadership. You have my word.
