

Half of positions filled

Gerald Enright, the only applicant for Student Store Manager was appointed to the job. Enright currently works at the store, man-


aged by his sister, Oonagh, this year.

Father Ritter— practices what he preaches

"The Minnesota Strip is a fifteen-block stretch of Eighth Avenue in New York City—a place for porno parlors, strip joints, cheap bars, fleabag hotels and thousands of drifters, hookers and pimps. It is no place for a child. Yet it acts as a magnet for thousands of the one million teenagers who run away from home every year." (Taken from the Covenant House pamphlet).

This is the message Father Bruce Ritter gave at the standing room only St. Agnes Auditorium at 6903 Mumford Road, Wednesday afternoon, March 17th.

Father Ritter is the founder of Covenant House, a child care agency that opens its doors to run away teenagers in New York City. "God knows they are sinned against, they are the lost sheep," said Father Ritter, "they are the prodigal son that hasn't come back."

These children are scared and have no place to go. Covenant House is an alternative. Their needs are basic from a place to sleep, food to eat and some clothing. There is counselling and an atmosphere of understanding love. Covenant House has long range goals as well; education, jobs, a feeling of self worth and in-

dependence.

Father Ritter runs his emergency center called Under 21 on the same principal as Covenant House with volunteer staff helping and supporting the children. The Center is open 24-hours and 7 days a week. "No child is ever turned away," said Father Ritter.

"These children need to survive, they have nothing left to sell, they sell themselves." Father Ritter went on to say "Prostitution has become a mere transaction, an entertainment. Pay the entertainer, even children. Society has decided that sex is entertainment."

"We are the problem not these children. Adults are apathetic. We have a sex industry because we want it. We encourage it," said Ritter.

Fifty percent of the teenagers that come to Covenant House don't make it. They are too far gone. Of the remainder 50%, 20 percent of them go back home, 20% to a residential, foster home and/or job training program and the last 10% get independent apartments and jobs. The House helps 4,000 teenagers out of 12,000 a year.

Father Bruce Ritter is a Franciscan priest. He was a professor of Theology at Manhattan College, and got involved with run

away teenagers in 1968. After a sermon one Sunday, one of his students dared him to practice what he preached. He left his position at the college and moved into an apartment in the ghettos. He has been working with teenagers ever since.

Debating team matches wits with university and student council presidents

"The reason so few people are interested in debating is because of the misconceptions they have about it" said Wentzell. "Debating is fun" he said and if more people come to realize this then the more members we should have in the fall.

The club has placed quite high in numerous competitions staged during the academic year. Last week at the University of Western Ontario Invitational, the MSVU debating team placed second in a field of 35.

McGill's North American tournament showed the Mount placing 25th out of a 150 teams.

Jim Wentzell, earlier this year walked away with first prize in the Dalhousie University public speaking championships.

All in all a very respectable year for the Mount.

The team hopes to continue its success next year in Canadian University competitions and also in the World competition to be held in New Zealand. A shortage of funds poses a small problem for the team who will have to increase their fund raising activities in order to meet costly travel expenses.

September 82' will mark the second year of the Mount's revived debating club who through various workshops and exhibition debates such as the one scheduled on Thursday, hope to attract more members.

The upcoming debate will allow interested students to participate in the event as the debate will be open to questions from the floor.

Wentzell feels this is the perfect opportunity for students to see and partake in an actual debate and if interested to join the club in the fall.

Quest for Fire—humans in the rawww!

Quest for Fire focuses on three pre-historic men who leave their starving, bearily clad tribe in the middle of a swamp. The three men then venture across beautiful, rugged terrain, meet a young woman from a more advanced tribe and learn the stone-age secret of 'flicking you bie'—how to rub two sticks together and make fire. (And that ain't all).

The plot contains basic elements of 'Man against Man' and 'Man against Nature'. This makes the film ultimately realistic.

Quest is savagely horrifying in its recognition of man's instinct of violence. Friendship, leadership and love are communicated accurately, while assorted gushes of

humour frame Quest with comprehensive entertainment for any race, color, language or religion today. After all it is us we are watching on the screen—thousands of years ago, unconditioned, without our dependence on technology and very often without our clothes. We are exposed.

There are no casinos, space ships, laser zaps or gun fights in Quest for Fire. They fight with bones and sticks and escape by running barefoot, not in a 1982 Lotus Spirit or Chrysler New Yorker. There are no 'profanities' or 'obscenities'. As a matter of fact there are no English words at all or languages from any other modern day culture.

Even without all these essential ingredients of a 'popular' science-

adventure theme, the tone of primitive chatter, eye expression and gesture give the roles of Naoh, Ika, Amoukar and Gaw, just as much identity, sentimentality and realism as the cast of *The Mod Squad*, *General Hospital*, or *On Golden Pond*—perhaps even more.

Four relatively unknown young actors, **Everett McGill**, **Ron Perlman**, **Nameer El-Kadi** and actress **Rae Dawn Chong**, daughter of **Tommy** (Cheech and) **Chong**, make professional, what might have been a laughable elaboration of the 'Dawning of Man' scene in *2001 A Space Odyssey*.

There are only a few really dumb things about Quest for Fire. All this time that the three heroes have been off searching for flames, taming wild beasts and discovering the missionary sex position with Ika, their tribe remains on that soggy piece of swamp turf freezing to death.

The elephants harnessed with

'life-like hair and beard' look more like Big Bird's friend the Snuffleupagus rather than ominous mammoths.

What really makes this film is its non-Hollywood look achieved through excellent on location photography both here in Canada and around the planet. Quest was funded by Canadian producers Les Plouffes and Atlantic City while direction came from France's **Jean-Jaques Annaud**.

The actors really are out there in those swamps, bogs and rigorous mountain ranges. But their appalling discomforts and indignities were worth the trouble. The actors must have had great faith in what they were doing.

It seems that there are really no better 'special effects' than those provided by Mom-Nature herself. Its refreshing to leave set designs for a while and take man out of the 'real world' exposing him to the elements.

Quest for Fire may leave you with the question—Would we be intelligent enough to survive if we had to live like that again?



At the Gallery—Prints and potters

A large collection of the works of West-Coast Printmaker Sybil Andrews are now on exhibit at the Mount Art Gallery. The exhibition which is touring Canada was organized by the Glenbow Museum in Calgary and will be at the Mount until April 18.

Sybil Andrews was born in England in 1898. As a teenager, she experimented with water-colour, and through a small inheritance she was able to enter the School of Fine arts. Later, she attended the Grosvenor School of Modern Art where she learnt linocut printing from Claude Flight. Andrews came to Canada in 1947. She and her husband settled in Campbell River, British Columbia where they built boats for a living. Later, when they were financially secure, Andrews returned to her art.

Sybil Andrews absorbed many of the early movements in art including futurism, cubism as well as the linear style of Art Deco. Her use of these movements are very apparent in most of her works. Her paintings fall into three main groups: people at work, people at play, and religious paintings which include a Stations of the Cross series. In most of her prints, she concentrates on the dynamics of motion, creating a sense of the

physical activity involved.

Peter White, curator of the Glenbow Museum will give a lecture at the gallery on the work of Sybil Andrews on Tuesday, March 30 at 8:15. After leaving the Mount, the exhibit will next be seen at the Art Gallery of Ontario in Toronto.

"All Fired Up" is another exhibit on at the gallery. "All Fired Up" is a collection of innovative teapots, cups and saucers

Porky's supposedly a comedy

Porky's, a supposedly funny movie, centers all its humour around the futile attempts of high school males to get laid.

The humour, although well received by the audience, was tasteless and abuses both men and women as mere sexual objects.

The movie follows the antics of five Angel Beach High, Florida, students in their efforts to find an instant cure for virginity. These five and most of the men in the movie, are so preoccupied with sex that it precludes everything else in their lives.

The movie plot enshrines the size of the male organ as all important, demeaning the other attributes of a potential lover. The movie also enshrines the sveltness of the female body, making those with less-than-perfect bodies less than human.

But, putting the sexual antics of the movie aside, there is a very serious message about red-neck law enforcement in the Florida Everglades in the 1950's.

The movie centers around an establishment called, you guessed it, Porky's, with less than reputable moral standards. Anything can be bought for the right sum of money and the clientele is as red-neck as you can find in the good old U.S. of A.

When the crew from Angel Beach are intimidated into leaving Porky's by Porky himself, their cause is not helped by the country's Sheriff Wallace, who just happens to be Porky's brother. The Sheriff smashes their headlights and tail lights and charges them the fine for having broken lights.

The car's owner, one of the five lads, Mickey Jarvis (Roger Wilson) keeps going back to get his revenge and keeps coming home more and more beaten up each time. Revenge is eventually had by the Angel High bunch, but only after they team together and use some very red-neck techniques themselves to outwit the enemy.

The movie has a second serious message, one of the racial tension of the time. This message is personified through Tommy Cavanaugh (Wyatt Knight) picking on the new Jewish kid in town, Brian Schwartz (Scott Colomby). They eventually become buddies, but only after Tommy stands up to his ex-con father who has been beating him up for getting beaten by a Jew.

If you want to see this movie then see it. But don't go because you think it's a comedy, because it's not worth seeing on that level. Go see it for the serious message of racial tension and red-neck law.

They did not go to the Provincials Championships held in Truro due to lack of player participation. The Athletic Department requested that the team not receive any awards at the Awards Banquet this year. Hellen Folkler the Athletic Director said that it would be an embarrassment to everyone involved if they did. The question of there being a team next year will not be decided until the fall.

Sports Comment Who'll win the Stanley Cup

The National Hockey League (NHL) Playoffs are almost here, and with them comes the excitement of playoff hockey and the speculation as to who will win the Stanley Cup.

Although all 16 teams that qualify for post season play have a chance to take home Lord Stanley's coveted trophy, there seems to be three teams that have to be considered the favorites. They are the New York Islanders, Edmonton Oilers, and the Montreal Canadiens.

All three teams have enjoyed excellent regular seasons, with each one having accumulated over 100 points enroute to winning their respective divisional titles. A closer look at each team might give some indication as to which one, if any, should win the cup.

If just one favorite had to be picked it would have to be the New York Islanders. They have more points than any other team in the league thus far, and an enormous amount of depth and talent. Led by Mike Bossy and Brian Trottier, the Islanders boast a potent scoring attack. The defence is controlled by Denis Potvin who many people feel is the best defenceman in the league. The goaltending is secure with Billy Smith, one of the best in the business between the pipes.

The Islanders have a well balanced attack and along with the great depth on the team, they should not be effected by the long and tiresome playoff schedule.

The boys from New York have won the Stanley Cup for the past two years and you can be sure that they will do everything they can to defend their title successfully.

The Edmonton Oilers are led by, who else, Wayne Gretzky. Gretzky will however have to continue his amazing scoring pace in the playoffs if the Oilers are going to win the cup. It will be interesting to see if he can, considering playoff hockey is usually more defensive. Gretzky has an excellent supporting cast featuring allstar defenceman Paul Coffey, and rookie goaltending sensation Grant Fuhr.

The Oilers have an abundance of young talent and their youth should give them stamina over the course of the playoffs. They gained valuable experience last year when the beat out Montreal.

The key to Montreal's success is Guy Lafleur. Lafleur is injured right now but is expected back in the lineup by playoff time. Many people feel that Lafleur has slipped in the past two years but he usually produces at playoff time and will have to if Montreal is to dethrone the Islanders as Stanley Cup Champions.

The Canadians also possess a balanced attack with Keith Acton, Steve Shutt and Bob Gainey. Larry Robinson leads the solid Montreal defence. The Canadians have gotten fine goaltending this year from Rick Wamsley and Denis Herron. They appear ready to mount a series challenge for the cup.

The race for the Stanley Cup will be an interesting one this year. Teams such as Minnesota and Boston could also surprise a few people and take home the title of best in the NHL. It will probably be one of the three favorites however that comes out on top.

If Lafleur can regain some of the old form that made him the best player in the league a few years ago, look for Montreal to recapture the cup. If not, it will be another Stanley Cup for the Islanders with everyone else having to wait for next year.



Central America— an ideological battleground

Central America, has it become the new ideological battleground of the two super powers. By all accounts in the American media, and statements made by the Secretary of State, Alexander Haig, it would seem that this is so. According to Mr. Haig and his supporters in the United States, a stand must be taken against Soviet imperialism which is reportedly creeping into Central America. The country which is garnering all the attention is El Salvador.

It is felt by many in the Pentagon, Congress, and the CIA that the U.S. must support the right-wing government of Jose Napoleon Duarte. If they do not, they foresee a left-wing government taking control of the tiny nation, which will, of course, threaten stability in the region.

The idea of the "domino effect" is a favorite reason of American war hawks for sending large amounts of military hardware and money to the El Salvadorean government.

The funding of the present El Salvadorean regime runs against everything that the United States pledges itself to. They set themselves up as the defenders of freedom and democracy. By supporting the present government in El Salvador this is precisely what they denying to the people of that country.

The leftist gureillas who are supported to some extent by Cuba are fighting for the basic rights of the people of El Salvador. The U.S. must recognize the FNLA (the organization representing church groups, students, labor unions, peasant farmers, and opposition political parties fighting the tyranny of the present regime) as the truly representative political force in El Salvador. The FNLA would have at least have a reason to begin negotiations with the U.S. and the present regime governing the country. As it stands now, the United States are the oppressors of the people of El Salvador.

If the situation is to improve in El Salvador the present regime must be replaced. This must be done now, before the bloody battle now engulfing the country gets any worse.

Although, free elections are to be held at the end of March, they will not resolve anything. It is most probable that the present government would be returned, with the possibility that even more extreme government might take power. Before any elections take place a proper peace settlement involving all parties must be achieved. Proper elections cannot be held in El Salvador with a civil war raging around polling stations.

What type of government would be elected when voter intimidation by both sides would be commonplace. It is time for the Salvadorean people to be free of outside interference, and time for them to establish a free, non-aligned, democratic state.

nocent university students, by krikey!" stated the super hero.


Women swooned as Dr. P.R. flew up, up, and away into the cloudy sky.

Roxley sentenced to two life sentences

Public Relations professor Hardboiled Roxley was sentenced to two consecutive life sentences today by the Mount Saint Vincent court of shady activities. The photographs were the main element in the prosecution's case against the defendant. Mr. Roxley throughout the trial protested his innocence saying he was on his way down to the Sacaterium for a coffee when he tripped, causing the unmarked exams to fall out of his hands and scatter themselves over the stairs.

Roxley's story would have been believable if it weren't for the shots taken by recently decorated agent LummoX. She told the eight man, four woman jury that it definitely wasn't an accident but a case of premeditated misappropriation of exam marks.

"It's disgusting that things such as this happen in our education system" said Basic Writing and Reporting professor Part Clueless. "He should use the alphabetic rating scale like I do" she said.
