Freedom of Information Act?

OTTAWA (CUP)-- The city of rumors. Listen carefully on any given day and you will pick up some tidbit.

A cabinet shuffle in the making, who is going to get what post, the latest government scandal is about to break, millions have been wasted by a department, legislation will come soon on something or other, Trudeau is resigning, so and so has been posted to such and such, and a thousand variations of the same theme, facts without foundation. All very vague as rumors are wont to be.

But now there is a growing movement to impede the flow of rumors and start replacing them with facts providing a healthy flow of information for intelligent assessment of a situation or problem by a member of the press, a member of parliament or some vested interest group or citizen.

Asking for information sounds simple and natural enough. It appears to be a basic right.

In fact, it is not, for in Ottawa, and in provincial and municipal governments, information is withheld on a grand scale. The bureaucracy is enshrouded in a veil of secrecy and does not

have to give up information.

Indeed, it can not because it is estimated that 80% of government documents are classified. Let any citizen try to get a report or document that a government or civil servant decides it doesn't have to release. That person will be met with a stone wall of silence.

Opposition MPs, and surprisingly enough, government backbenchers have as much difficulty getting information as any citizen.

Information given freely is one thing. Information carefully selected and channelled by the government is propaganda.

The solution to this snocking state of affairs is a strong

Freedom of Information Act, such as the those now existing in the USA and Sweden, according to private citizens groups, major associations across Canada and MPs from all political parties.

The prime mover behind the call for such an act is Conservative MP and former opposition leader Gerald Baldwin, who has been fighting for an Act for a decade.

Replying in the House to the government's small mention of more open access to government documents in the throne speech recently, he said, "the rights we seek to obtain by legislation of this kind are not extravagant or improper. It was said hundreds of years ago that a people which means to govern itself must have the power that knowledge brings."

Science Social

The 1976-1977 Science Society of MSVU sponsored a "Science Social" on November 30th, 1976 from 8:00 to 11:00 p.m. All the Science faculty and students were invited to attend, and refreshments were provided for everyone. The purpose of the social was to allow the students to become better acquainted with this particular sector of MSVU students, as well as to meet and talk with their professors. There was a good turn-out of faculty, and everyone who came soon realized that it was a good opportunity for informal conversation. It is hopeful that word will spread and any absent students will perceive the benefits of a small gathering such as this.

In accordance with the nearness of the Christmas holiday, Santa and Mrs. Claus honored us with an appearance, giving everyone a small present to top the evening off. Kathy Mykelyn, president of the Science Society, introduced herself, the secretary of the Society, and the science representative on Student Council. She spoke about the future activities of the society for the upcoming year. It is hoped that the Science Society will be able to continue with more activities, especially science-orientated ones, with the help of more student participation, in the second term.



Council Defeats Motion

The Dalhousie Student Council Sunday night defeated a motion to give \$2000 to AFS/FEA for emergency funding.

Arts Representative Bernie Macuonnell told the council "I think there are two basic groups here, and the people in the middle who will make the decision"

A compromise amendment giving a lesser amount totalling \$750 was defeated by the two extremes, when both agreed that it was not an acceptable way of resolving the question.

Mount Saint Vincent University Vice-President External, Diane Wright, together with Nova Scotia College of Art and Design Vice President External, Don Soucy, were present to speak about granting emergency funds to FEA/AFS

"The main problem is the constant referral to AFS/FEA as 'they'. The failure to realize that it is not 'they', but an organization of the students in the Atlantic," Soucy commented after the motion was defeated.

Koskolos Resigns

The Mount's Entertainment Director, Terry Koskolos, resigned as of December 4.

When asked why he had resigned from his position, Terry stated that "the position is a full-time, not part time position." He also added that being a student first, he was unable to give the time required for the job.

The Student Council accepted his resignation and thanked him for his work in the past.

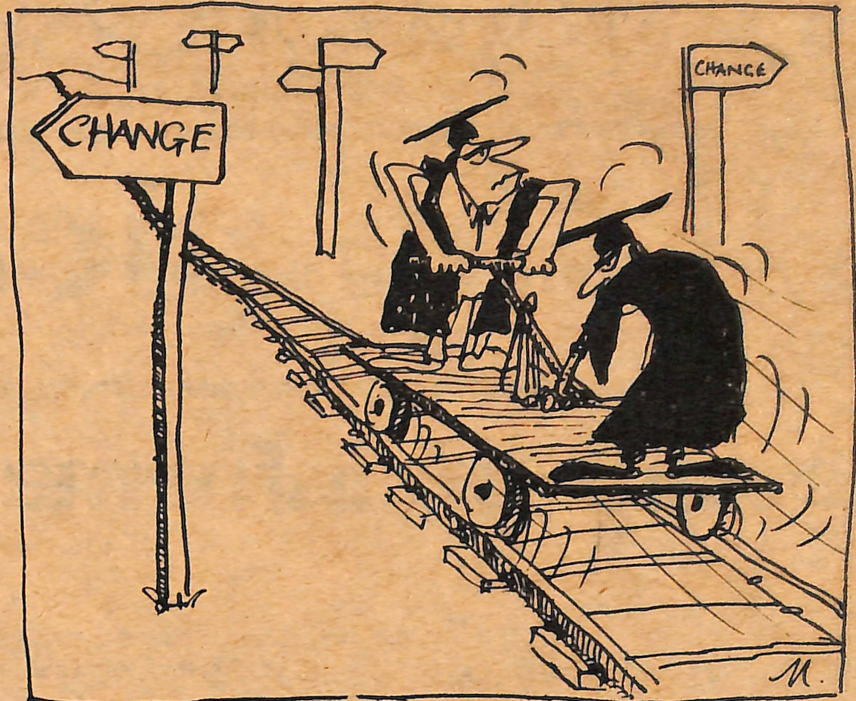

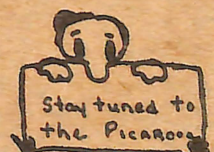

ACTING COURSE

Length of course: 3 years
All applicants must have completed high school at the time of admission and be between the ages of 17 and 24.

PRODUCTION COURSE

Annual auditions and interviews will commence in March 1977 and will take place in every major city in Canada from St. John's to Vancouver. The National Theatre School is a post secondary school which undertakes the professional formation of future actors, designers and production personnel for Canada's professional theatre.

Length of course: 2 years
All applicants must have completed high school at the time of admission but there is no age limit. Design Section candidates must be able to draw.

The school will send application forms to everyone so requesting. 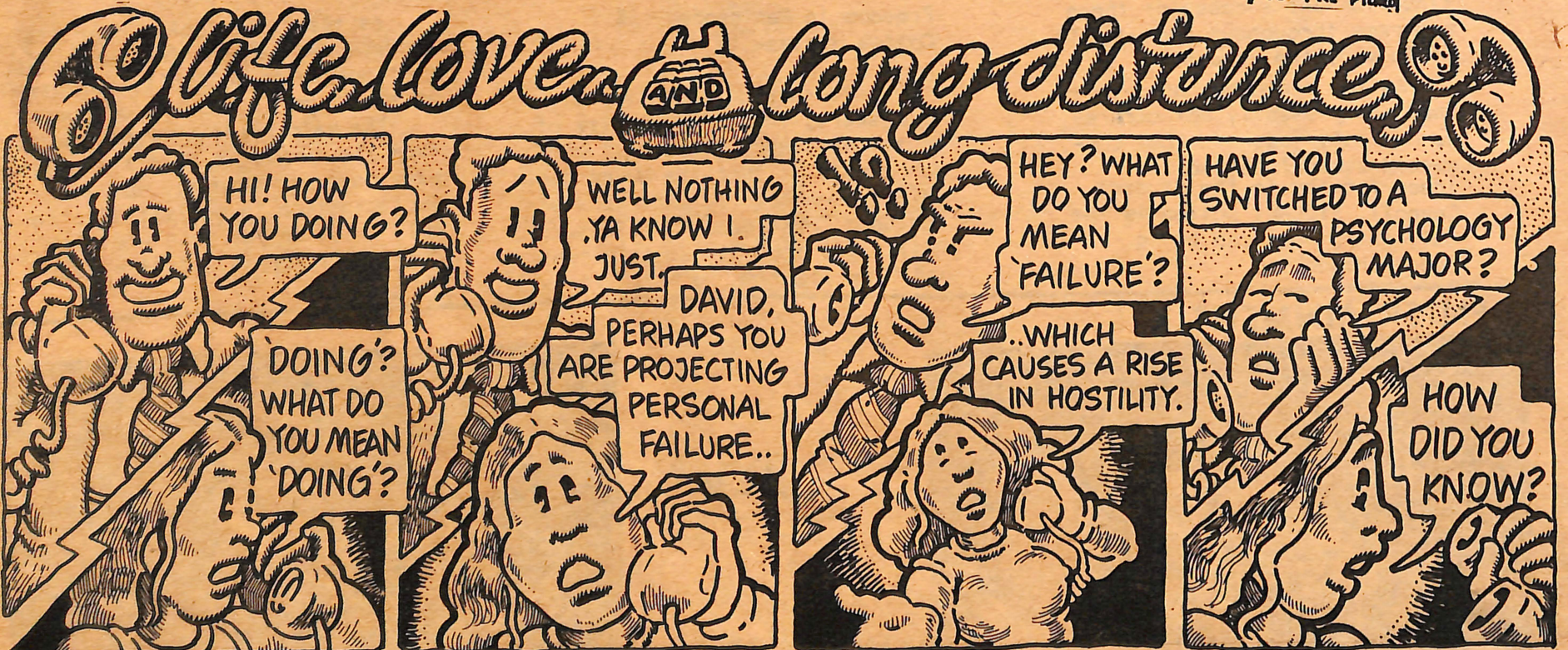

What kind of activities would you like to see more of on campus?

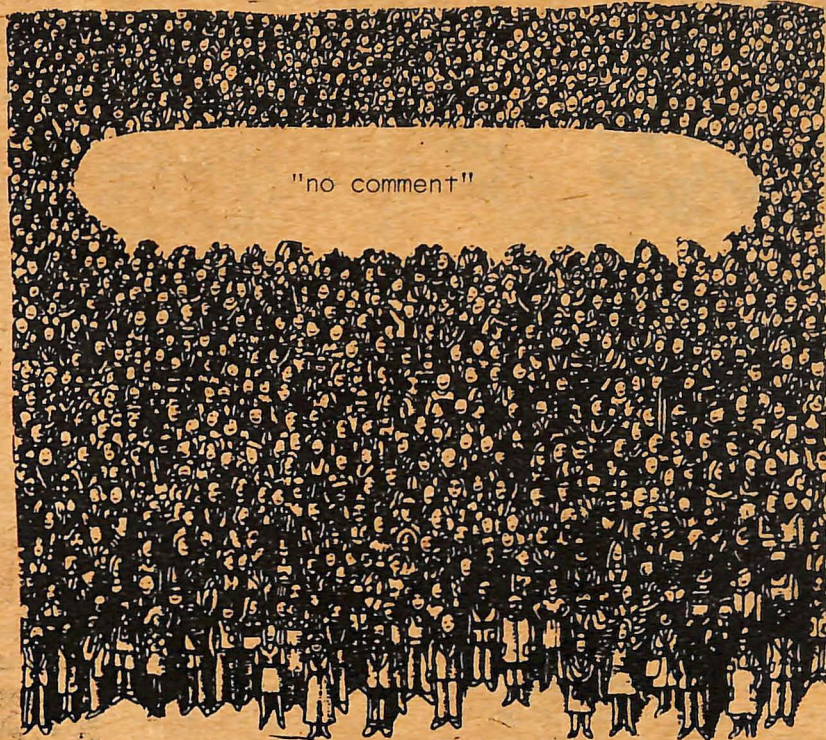

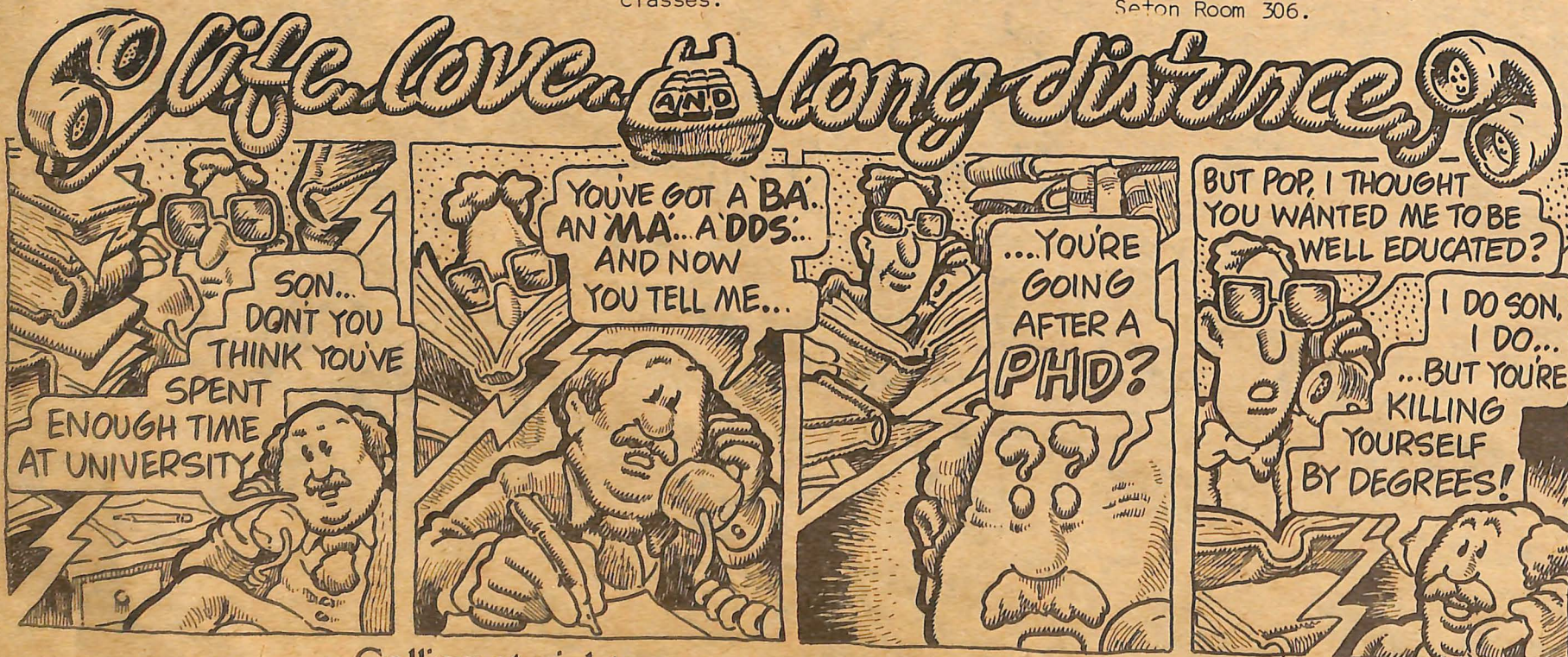
The team will continue playing in the Metro Ladies Basketball League with games scheduled for Tuesday evenings.
