Mount's energy program praised by province

The Mount received honorable mention for its energy conservation practices from Nova Scotia's Department of Mines and Energy last week.

The award, presented during a ceremony at Province House, recognizes savings of more than \$160,000 in heating the university during 1986.

Art Landry, the Mount's maintenance

supervisor, says a major overhaul of the campus heating system during the fall of 1984 is responsible for the reduced heating costs.

An examination of the system revealed various weak spots which were renewed, replaced or repaired. Temperature sensors

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Author makes "intergalactic" stop at Mount

Mary Daly, feminist author and philosopher, will speak at Mount Saint Vincent University later this month.
Her lecture, entitled "Be-thinking, Bespeaking, Be-spelling: Re-calling the Archimagical Powers of Women", will be given on Friday, March 25, at 7:30 p.m. in Seton Academic Centre, Auditorium C. A coffee house will follow the lecture. General admission to both events is \$5, \$3 for students and unsalaried.

Mary Daly teaches feminist ethics in the department of theology at Boston College. She is the author of The Church and the Second Sex, Beyond God the Father, Gyn/Ecology and Pure Lust.

Daly has created a new philosophy, a new theology and even a new language in which to express a women-centred universe. Her latest book, Websters' First New Intergalactic Wickedary of the English Language, "conjured by Mary Daly in cahoots with Jane Caputi," explains some of this new language. According to the Wickedary, "webster means a woman whose occupation is to weave...words."

The Daly lecture is in conjunction with Language and Sex: Differences in Tone, a regional conference sponsored by the Institute for the Study of Women at Mount Saint Vincent University.

Conference sessions will run all day Saturday, March 26 and include topics such as Women and Legal Language, Can You Say It? Will You Be Heard? and Are Females Really More Standard Speakers?

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In November, Dr. Marguerite Andersen, Distinguished Chair in Women's Studies, visited the University of New Brunswick where she lectured on Quebec women writers and read from her own works, in French. Later that month, Dr. Andersen spoke at the annual meeting of the Canadian Institute for the Advancement of Women, of which she is a founding member. Her topic was Reflections in Literature of Women's Well-Being and Love (the theme of the conference was "Women and Wellness").

In January, Dalhousie University's French department invited Dr. Andersen to read from her own works. In February, she lectured on francophone women writers at Memorial University. Later that month, she lectured on the same subject at Acadia University, where she also led a graduate seminar in the education faculty on the subject of language and sex. In March she will deliver a public lecture in Charlottetown on the subject of opposition to feminism. Dr. Andersen will also lecture at the University of Prince Edward Island on Quebec women writers and meet with students and faculty of the French department to discuss Quebec feminism. Dr. Andersen has also attended women's studies meetings in

Fredericton, Ottawa and Toronto. She teaches courses in literature, creative writing and is a member of "Fools on the Hill" a theatre improvisation group.

Dr. Patricia Canning of the Department of Child Study will make a presentation titled Improving the Quality of Care: A Caribbean Experience at the International Child and Youth Care Conference March 22-25 in Washington, D.C. She is among 200 experts from 30 countries and six continents making presentations. More than 1,500 people from 47 countries have indicated they plan to attend.

Dr. Allan Neilsen and lecturer Lorri Neilsen of the education department served as guest editors of the most recent issue of Reading-Canada-Lecture (R-C-L). This is a quarterly journal for educators written in English and French. As well, Drs. Olga Scibior and Margaret O'Brien and lecturer Lorri Neilsen of the education department all contributed to the journal.

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were installed in Seton, Evaristus, Rosaria, Assisi and the Birches, and an air-conditioning unit placed atop Rosaria Centre.

The heart of the revamped heating system is a Delta 21 computer in Seton Annex. By 'reading' the temperature variations provided by the sensors, the computer adjusts the temperature levels in individual buildings. In Rosaria Centre, the air-handling unit helps to control the

temperature by regulating the flow of fresh air through the unit's dampers.

The entire heating-system retrofit cost "a little over a half-million dollars," says Landry. But with savings of \$160,000 a year, the project will pay for itself in four years.

The Mount's award-winning heating system was designed by All-Energy Engineering Ltd. and financed by Econoler Inc., both experts in energy management.

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Through its University Research Contribution (URC) program, the Standards Council of Canada will make available three \$10,000 grants to support standards related research during the 1988-89 academic year. Further details about the program and application forms can be obtained at the Research Office, Room 215, Evaristus. Faculty must submit applications by May 1.
