# Mount counselling service available

"Counselling" carries a number of different associations and varies in interpretation. Some may think of a stereotyped high school guidance counsellor who helps students choose their subjects, while others imagine a psychoanalyst asking patients to lie on a couch and free associate.

People are often unsure of the role of a university counselling service and fail to utilize it because of stereotypes they have formed in the past. Basically, the university counselling service strives to enrich a student's academic experience by promoting a sense of well-being and helping students to develop the skills they need to cope successfully in a university environment.

The Mount, like most major universities in Canada, employees qualified professional counsellors who provide direct service to students with a wide range of concerns. Counselling needs may include poor study skills, low study motivation, indecision as to program of study or career, debilitating anxiety or depression, relationship problems, and difficulty coping with stress.

Counselling usually takes place on an individual basis, however, a number of specialized skill-building programs are offered on a group format. Group sessions enable the counsellor to assist larger numbers of students with mutual concerns and also provide constructive feedback to the participants.

Some of the programs scheduled for the fall term include Study Skills, "Lock-jaws"—a public speaking group, and "No Sweat" (Test Anxiety)—for planning stage will deal with career planning, assertive training and personal growth. The Canada Employment Centre CHOICES terminal will be on campus September 21-25 for those who wish to talk to the computer about career possibilities.

All of the above topics can also be covered during individual counselling sessions, and the counsellors are always ready to respond to other areas of student concern. One does not have to wait until a serious problem arises before consulting a counsellor. Often an "everyday" situation may seem like a large stumbling block but may be clarified quite readily by discussing alternatives with a counsellor. Students who are functioning relatively well often seek improvement in certain areas.

The Counselling Service is located in the Student Services department on the ground floor of Rosaria Centre. Details of upcoming programs are available and students are welcome to drop in and browse through our career information



#### **CHOICES** coming to campus

The CHOICES computer terminal will be on campus again this year from Monday, September 21 to Friday, September 25. The terminal will be located in the Student Services department in Rosaria Centre.

CHOICES is a computerized career program which helps you to explore your abilities, interests and needs. This information is combined with up-to-date labour market statistics and the result is a comprehensive information package which will help you with decisions about possible careers. CHOICES is particularly relevant for students in programs which do not emphasize specific professional training, such as the Bachelor of Arts.

Students wishing to participate will have to sign up in advance. Because the actual

time on the terminal is fortyfive minutes, space is limited, so you must register by September 17 at the latest. Contact the Counselling Service at Local 357, or Bruna Caracristi at Local 156 so that an appointment may be booked. You will meet with a counsellor in advance to fill in a CHOICES travel guide to identify your likes, dislikes and capabilities. A counsellor will also meet with you individually to discuss how the information provided by the computer relates to you personally.

CHOICES can help you explore career alternatives, but it won't make decisions for you. It can help you determine what you want in your work and suggest occupations that seem to meet your needs. Perhaps most important, it will start you thinking about possibilities that have never crossed your mind
