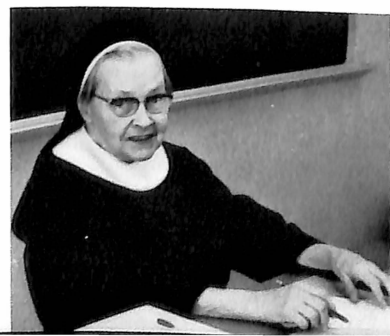

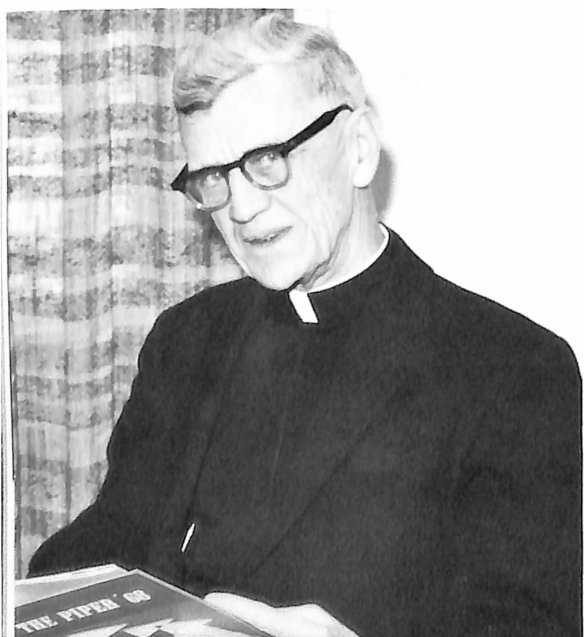

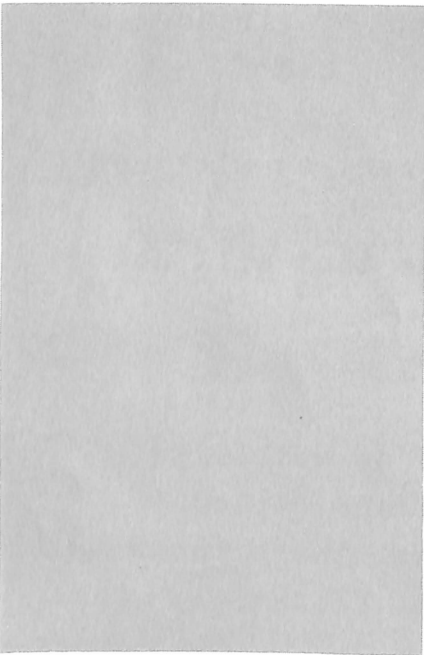
LYNN BAISLEY

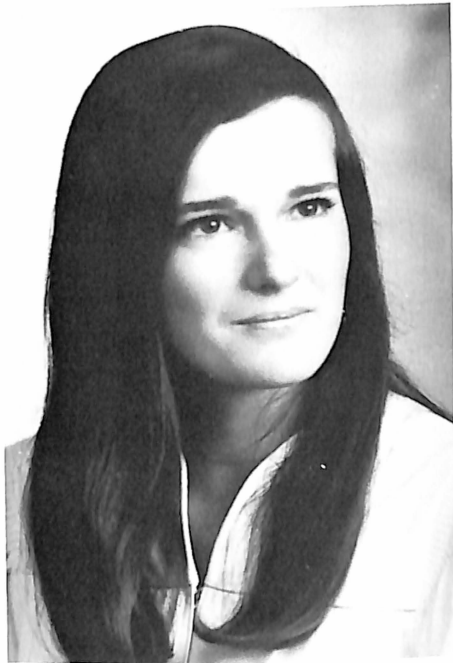
HEATHER BUTLER

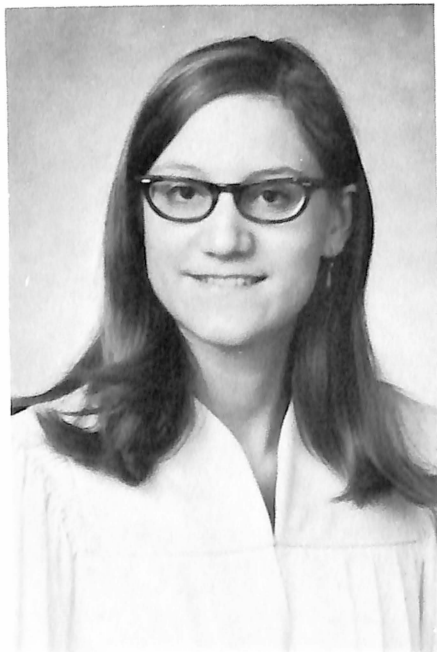
JANE BUZZELL

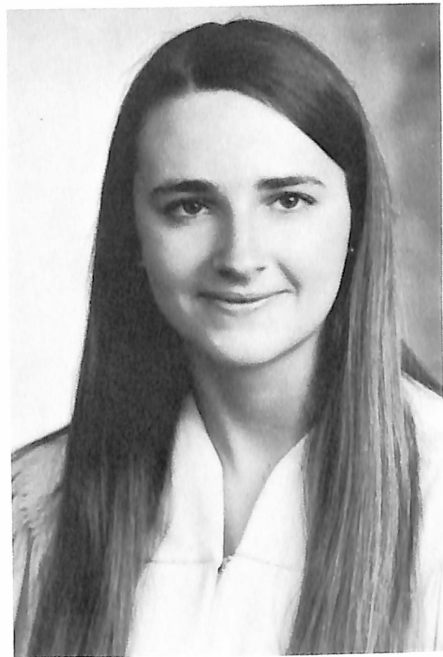
CHRISTINE CRAWLEY

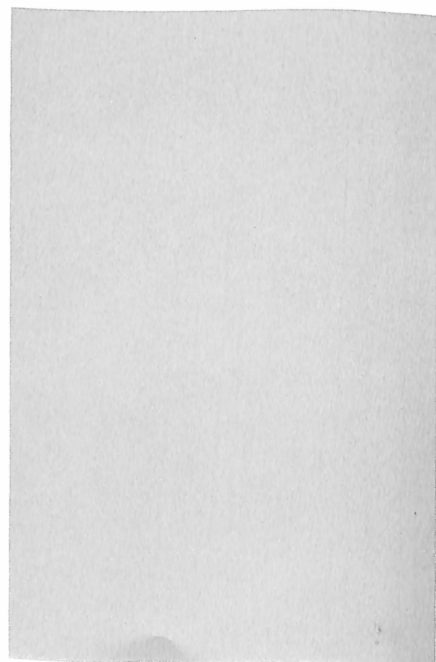
CATHY GRAY

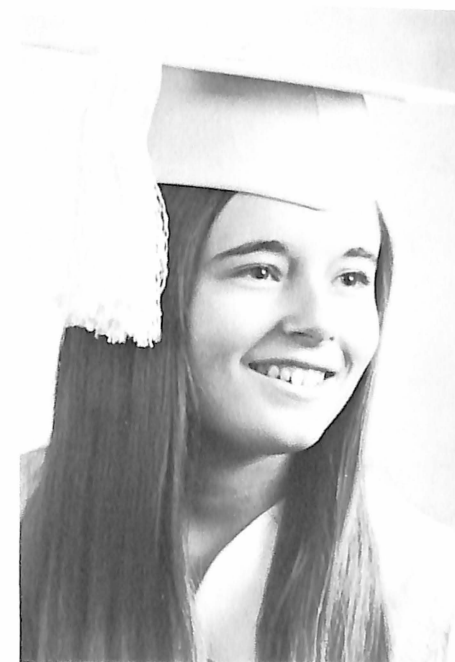
MARGI JOLLIMORE

KARLA KOHLER

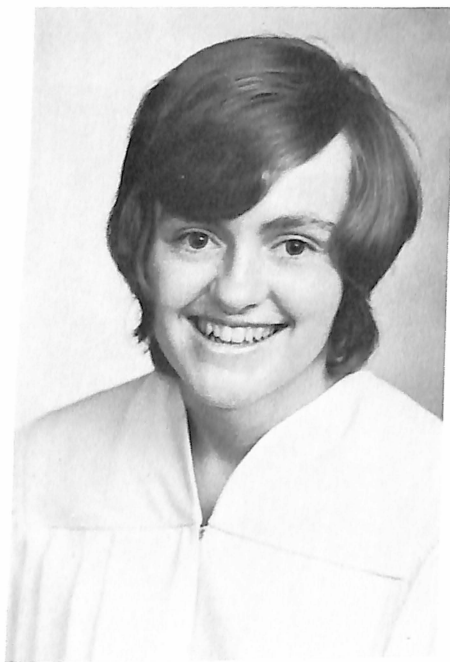

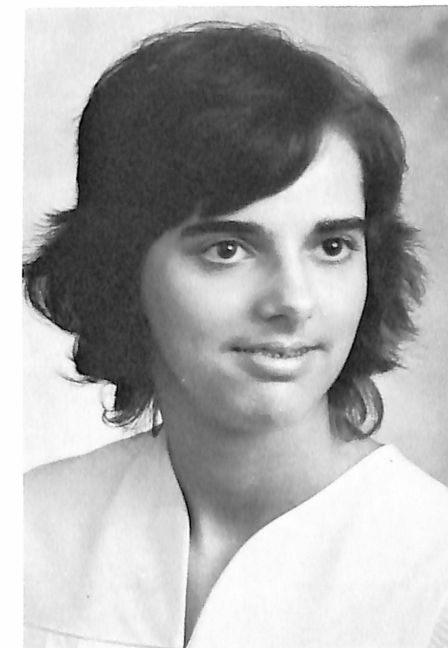
CHARLOTTE NOAH

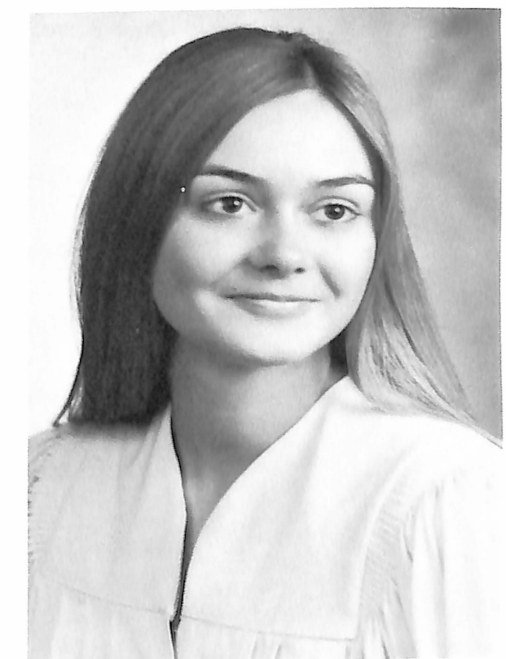
JOAN WHEBBY
