Nearly three weeks ago the Students' Council sent out a survey concerned with students' opinions on visiting privileges in the residences.

The function of the survey is to collect statistics on students' opinions and desires concerning the residence regulation that does not allow men visiting privileges.

The University sent out their own opinion poll to Assisi Hall asking students their reaction to having visiting hours on Sunday afternoons. The Students' Council felt that before any attempt at changing the present regulation was made, an effort should be made to discover the students' own ideas on the subject.

Students' Council is, ideally, students helping each other achieve mutual goals. Hopefully, results of this survey will provide substantial facts when the Administration is approached for discussion about the residence regula-:ion.

Various channels must be navigated in this students' endeavour to voice their opinions.

A change in residence regulations concerns the President, Sister Albertus, the Administration, and the Board of Governors. It will take some time to tabulate the survey results and this. matter is of top priority in the Students' Council.

This matter concerns students--it is the students who must defend and support their rights and desires. ### EXAMINATION POLICY

In the light of last year's experience in reviewing requests from departments for dispensations from formal examinations in certain courses, the Committee for Academic Affairs this year wishes to provide for greater independence at the divisional and departmental level. (In the 1974-75 President of the Student Council may academic year forty-two of the fourtyfour departmental requests were granted) Accordingly, the committee accepted all departmental or divisional recommen-

dations on dispensations subject only to an individual's right to appeal by October 30, 1975. Department and division chairmen will simply record with the Academic Dean the evaluation practices in all their courses by October 15, 1975. Any faculty member, academic officer or the Academic Vicechallenge the adequacy of any evaluation practices. In such cases the Committee for Academic Affairs will make a final decision.

LONDON (ZNS-CUP) ---- British archaeologists report they have recovered a stash of hashish about 2000 years old from a Carthagenian warship which sunk off the coast of Sicily during the Roman-Carthage wars.

The excavators report that the ship was found with airtight containers of the hash, which was apparently smoked by members of the crew to heighten their morale during combat.

According to the scientists, the containers were good enough to preserve the potency of the hash under the sea for the past 20 centuries.

Faculty and students are reminded that the last two weeks of each semester are set aside for evaluation in those courses in the departments or devisions require it. During the two weeks before the examination period of each semester no new evaluations contributing to a final mark may take place -- all informal testing must occur before this period and all formal testing must take place after.

It will be the responsibility of chairmen to inform the Registrar of the need for time and space allocation during the official examination periods at the end of each semester.


You can do it, so come on down and see us sometime - we'll all work to make OUR paper alive and well and living at the Mount.

(This article will be a regular feature in the Picaro from now on, if there is to be a Picaro from now on) and is directed to those of you who do not know there is a weekly Student's Council meeting on Tuesdays in Rosaria Board Room, who know about the meeting but do not have time to attend, but care enough to have some idea of what is going on, or who want to know what names to use when they complain that the Studnet's Council never does anything.)

The meeting took place at 12:15 (henceforth to be from 5:30-7:00p.m. Tuesdays weekly) with Ms. Derrick--(scrubwoman, ticket seller, doorman, Senate member, newspaper proof-reader, and lay-out artist, writer, member of six other committees-and for those of you who've never spotted her around she's also the President of the Stulent's Council herself and has an office down in Rosaria) in the chair.


Some of the issues which came up were: Matthew Pearce (executive V.P.) suggested that a finance Committee should be formed

to look after unbudgeted requests for financial aid-e.g. At the second last meeting the possibility of procuring a grant for a small residence store in Vincent Hall was brought up by Donna Carroll. A loan was all that could be given as the money was unbudgeted for. The idea was considered (generally) a good one but as people willing to sit on such a committee are as scarce as hen's teeth, it was set aside for further consideration.

Jane Carmen (Home Ec. Rep.) broughtup the idea of getting better lightingin some fo the more widely used areas. which are now poorly lit at night. The area from Evaristus to Vincent Hall the back stairs from Evaristus to Seton. She's also going to see Mr. Merrigan or Halifax City Officials about a crosswalk or light down at the front gate-the trip across the road is a major risk and God help you if you lose your mitten in the middle of the road so Jane is going to fix this matter up. (you may wonder what a Home Ec. Rep is doing worrying about traffic and lights but then.....)

Marie Timmons (Academic V.P.) then brought some good news into the meeting-Professors are no longer allowed to give any new work or any exams for two weeks prior to exams. The two weeks are to be spent in review. Any infringement of this rule is to be taken to the Academic Affairs Committee. Other issues were discussed-check Rita Cahoon's minutes-posted in a good few places around the Mount for the nittygritty.

The rest of the 2 hour meeting was spent on the usual time consuming topic of Student Apathy. It was suggested that the Council completely come to a halt for two months- no dances no movies, no newspaper, no beer and chips etc. A heated discussion ensued publicly. Undiscussed frustrations and gripes of many came out into the open. No one knows why only 7% of the students are-



willing to give their time to the other 93% (without any positive reinforcement, ) Why? Only you students know. Do you just not have time? Do you feel your Council is a tight little clique in which you would be an outsider? Do you spend all your time, money and energy at Dal and SMU and feel it's just not worth it? Are you going through your college years thinking the 25 people who do anything around here do it without thanks because they're trying to get into the Society of Canadian Martyrs?

And because I've never heard anyone say it before, thank-you Anne. Though we don't always show it we know you're working harder than you can or should.

FREDRICTON (CUP) --- A Newbrunswick man had to borrow \$1,028 so his daughter could qualify for a student loan.

Justin Wright was told earlier this year he would gave to make a "parental contribution" of \$3,970 towards his daughter's educational costs as a University of New Brunswick nursing student, if she was to receive a \$1,150 government loan. The daughter, Janet Wright, ap-

pealed the decision on September 22 and was informed three days later the amount of parental contribution would be reviewed.

It was, and her father is expected to pay only \$1,028.

The problem is that, like most other New Brunswick potatoe farmers, Justin Wright lost money this year. He ended up having to borrow from his retirement fund to make up his "parental contribution" so daughter Janet could receive her loan.

"I'm not ungrateful for the loan" she said, "but I'm still very disturbed that my father had to do what he did.

FREDRICTON (CUP) --- Provincial Liberal Opposition Leader Robert Higgins has termed New Brunswick's current student aid formula a "reversal of the philosophy" of student aid.

He referred October 16 to the decision announced by the province in a mini-budget last June to change the aid formula from \$1,000 in a loan followed by a potential \$700 busary and topped by a further \$300, to a loan maxium of \$1.400 followed by a potential busary maxium of \$400.

Rather than an improvement, he said, this decision made it only more difficult for low-income-students to take advantage of the busary, which he called a "reversal" of the philosophy behind student aid.

Higgins commented that some way of checking the honesty of the applicants and their parents had to be included in the policy, and said he did not discount the use of the previous year's tax return as such a measure.

He said he also favored establishment of a review committee - including elected student representatives - as published in the Liberals 1974 election platform.

Higgins was interviewed following his meeting with University of New Brunswick student president Warren McKenzie to "Open lines of communication" between students and the provincial opposition."


choir news







### MINIMATA DESEASE

TORONTO (CUP) ---- Fred Kelly, the president of the Treaty which represents Indians in Northwestern Ontario, said he was dissatisfied with the results of a meeting held September 29 with three Ontario Cabinet ministers to discuss mercury poisoning of Indians in the area.

Kelly was accompanied by members of the Grassy Narrows and Whitedog reserves, and three victims of Minimata disease, a crippling ailment caused by methyl-mercury poisoning and named after the fishing village in Japan where it was discovered in 1956.

Japanese scientists say they have found early symptoms of Minimata disease in the Indians of the Kenora-Dryden area in northwestern Ontario, and health minister Frank Miller admitted before the meeting that "20 or 30" Indians tested by the province have shown symptoms of the disease.

New Democratic Party leader Stephen Lewis said the Japanese scientists -

amount 39 of the 89 Indians tested. Cabinet ministers were asked by the Indians at the meeting to provide a new source of protein for the Indians to replace the fish which formed a staple but which is now contaminated.

The Indians asked for compensation for the loss of their commercial fishing rights, alternate employment opportunities, and they want the lakes and streams closed to sport fishermen.

In addition, they want the Dryden Chemical Plant which put the mercury in the water sued by the provincial government for the damage done to the Indians, and immediate testing of all Indians for Minimata symptoms.

No decision was announced regarding these requests, but the goverment did announce the day prior to the meeting that a group of specialists would be sent to Japan to consult experts there on the disease.

### STRIKES

Earlier in the summer a group of Japanese experts visited the area, but Natural Resources Minister Leo Bernier dismissed them as "travelling troubadours" stirring up trouble.

He clarified this remark at the meeting this week, explaining that the Japanese scientists had ignored the government when they toured the province. "That is not protocal", he said.

Fred Kelly told reporters the Indians hoped that the existence of a minority government in Toronto might change the government's attitude towards the Indian's problems.

Lewis made it clear he would not defeat the government on the floor of legislature over the mercury poisoning issue. He said "an issue like this... (will) not be made into that kind of trade-off in the House."

### N E W MACHINES= HIGHER PRICES

The lack of washing machines and dryers is always a subject of interest on campus. While talking to Mr. Merrigam, Administrative Assistant, we learned that the University plans to increase the number of washers and dryers in the residences. Assisi Hall is to get another set which will bring the total there to four of each machine.

The University is going to approach the Motherhouse about increasing the number of machines in Vincent Hall as the present ones are severely inadequate. There are only five washers and five dryers for 190 girls in Vincent Hall. As yet no machines have been installed on the third floor of that residence.



The only snag to the whole issue is that the old 25¢ a load washers and 10¢ a load dryers can no longer be purchased. Therefore, the University must change all the present machines to 50¢ for washers and 25¢ for dryers before the installation of new machines. This is not unreasonable in view of the present costs at laundromats.

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
# FORBES AND BROWN #
