



SETON ACADEMIC CENTRE

SETON ACADEMIC CENTRE


Seton Academic Centre is our latest academic building. It was officially opened by Premier Gerald Regan on October 13, 1971, and blessed by Archbishop Hayes. The Centre is dedicated to Elizabeth Bayley Seton, foundress of the American Sisters of Charity.

The Mount foresees an increased student enrollment of up to 1500 students - Seton Academic Centre is an integral part of this planned expansion. Its contemporary walls enclose several departments formerly located in Evaristus Hall, thus allowing for enlargement of the main library. The building is flexible, especially due to the central auditorium which may be used as a whole, as two semi-circular auditoriums, or as four audio-visual lecture theatres. It is amenable to varied types of programs.



EVARISTUS HALL

Evaristus Hall is the main building of Mount Saint Vincent University. Dating from two years before the fire that destroyed the "Old Mount", it is the oldest university structure on campus. Archbishop Mc-Nally turned the first sod in 1949. Started under the leadership of Sister Mary Evaristus, our first president and the building's namesake, it was ready for occupation in 1951. Classes were held as of September 25, 1952. Additions to the structure were made five years later. Today, Evaristus Hall encompasses residence rooms, administrative offices, the chapel, the library, and a number of classrooms and laboratories.




The year of 1966 was a noteworthy one at the Mount for two reasons. On April 16, 1966, legislation revised the College Charter so that Mount Saint Vincent graduated to university status. In the same eventful year. buildings that were the first to be raised since 1952 were completed -- Assisi and Rosaria Halls.

Assisi Hall is a twelvestory residence with accomodations for one-hundred forty people. Consisting of, for the most part, single rooms, it also has lounges. laundry-room, and kitchenettes on every second floor.

> Rosaria Hall is adjacent to Assisi Hall and connected to Evaristus by a heated tunnel. It is a student centre with Student Affairs and Student Services offices, the bookstore and bank, and, perhaps most important of all, the cafeteria!



The Birches are five new student residences on campus. Raised in 1972, and as contemporary in conception as in date, these are shingled townhouses fully equipped to house one hundred students altogether in a comfortable and homelike atmosphere not readily available on university campus. Because they were not built in the traditional fashion, the new residences caused little disturbance to the natural environment. Therefore, although short steps away from the main campus area, these seem to form a self-contained village blending with the trees and clustered around the university pond.

For the 1973-74 academic year, the Mount again increased its enrollment. In September, we registered 1200 full-time and 500 part-time students - a considerable increase over last year. The great popularity of our secretarial programmes, now filled to capacity, was undoubtably part of the reason. We also had an encouraging increase in arts and education, and the other programmes held steady.

The increase in part-time enrollment from 350 the year before) results in part from the activity of the continuing education department, which has attracted women to the campus for short orientation programmes; many of these women have since enrolled in credit courses. The trend across Canada indicates increasing involvement by mature students - a trend certainly visible on this campus.

Admissions had a good year, and the signs for 1974-75 are most encouraging.

This year the Mount competed in three sports intercollegiately.

Field Hockey - Mount Field hockey team played a number of exhibition games with the other universities and competed in the intercollegiate Junior Varsity tournament in October.

Volleyball - The volleyball team played a number of exhibition games as well as competing in the Mount Allison Invitational. In the Intercollegiate Varsity "B" championship tournament held in Antigonish, the Mount did extremely well, and lost to Saint Francis Xavier, the tournament winners in the third and deciding game by two points.

Basketball - The basketball team showed flashes of brilliance but never did gain consistency due to injuries and illnesses which plagued the team all season. For the first time in three years the Mount girls finished lower than second in the Intercollegiate Junior Varsity Sectional tournament and were eliminated from fruther competition.

Intramural Activities included the following:

Tennis - A clinic was given to over 40 students in October by Provincial Coach, Bob Piers, and lessons were given throughout the winter by Waegwaltic Tennis Club's head instructor - Mrs. Mary-Lou Singer.

Instruction was also provided in Judo, Swimming, Yoga, Badminton, Golf and Curling.





As in the past, busy-ness has been characteristic of the Business Department during 1973-74. Several Advisory Committee Meetings were held. Several new courses were approved for offering in September 1974. The Bachelor of Business Administration degree continued to attract ambitious and creative students. The first legal secretarial diplomas will be awarded in May. Next September will see the introduction of the executive secretarial diploma to replace the present general secretarial diploma. A large number of medical secretaries will graduate in May. Job opportunities are expected to increase with the increase in graduates: the Nova Scotia Dental Association is now interesting itself in the medical program.

Faculty members continued to be strong advocates of equal opportunities for women in business. Sister Elizabeth Weber attended a conference in Ottawa in January on "Emerging Women in Management". Sister Brenda Halton will attend a conference in Montreal early in April on "Women and Work".

The Business Society has had another active year. Social activities include a ski trip to Squaw Mountain during the March Break and a forthcoming social evening for faculty and students. The Society also hosted a short visit to the Mount by business students from Acadia University. Academic activities include the sponsoring of several secretarial students to attend a National Secretaries seminar. The Management students sponsored The Atlantic Business Conference which faculty and student representatives from most of the Maritime Schools of Business attended.

Growth seems to be the name of the game in the Business Department, and growing takes up a great deal of the time for all - faculty and student members alike.

CHAPLANCY

The Chaplains on the Mount Saint Vincent campus are resource people in preserving and strengthening the understanding and application of Christian values to student life and studies. University years challenge students to solve in some way the ambiguities of daily living. This is a time for questionning and search, a time of testing values against more sophisticated knowledge and insights.

Becoming mature as a Christian is not the easiest process in the academic effort. Values are often re-examined to assure their validity. Religious practices and beliefs are reevaluated to be placed upon a foundation of personal decision. Faith is made lifelong, intelligent and meaningful. The Chaplains are faculty members whose subject area is "Christian Becoming".

Opportunities for a deeper relationship with Christ are provided through liturgical celebrations. Ecumenism is presented and fostered by a team chaplaincy.


Personal contracts of Chaplains with students in discussion, counseling and prayer together set up a community feeling of Christian involvement.

for competent personnel to work with children of varying ages and ability. In response to the needs of developing children and their families, the Mount has initiated a two-year program

leading to a certificate in child development.

Now in its second year, the integrated program with its built-in orientation to all aspects of teaching and learning is becoming more and more effective in aiding students to make informed decisions regarding their future careers

The one year post-baccalaureate year is a demanding one with its courses in learning theory, humanistic foundations, curriculum and methodology.

The most current challenge to teachers lies in working with the exceptional child and Senate has approved a course for 1974-75 "Exceptional Children in Regular Classrooms".

One of the most pressing needs in the Atlantic area at the present time is for teachers with specialized skills in the area of reading. The Mount offers graduate programs with concentration in this field and has announced five \$1,000 scholarships to teachers who are interested in pursuing full time studies.

As the supply of teachers approaches the demand, the Mount takes the responsibility of selection seriously, not only from the point of view of the profession, but also from that of the prospective teacher and, of far greater importance, from the point of view of the children dependent upon properly selected teachers for their exposure to learning. No longer is teaching a matter of "whosoever will may teach". It has now become a highly selective profession and the Mount is interested in the best possible candidates.


the English Majors.





The academic year, 1973-74, was a busy and interesting year for both students enrolled in Home Economics and their professors.

This year, in addition to their many classes at the Mount, students become involved in community projects. Students in Family Studies classes visited those community agencies directly or indirectly concerned with families, unwed mothers, senior citizens' homes and classes for persons with learning disabilities and other handicaps. Each student in the communications class planned and carried through a project in the community. These projects resulted in some exciting learning experiences in communicating with persons of different socioeconomic levels and with various age groups.

The Consumer Studies Seminar class offered an "information and Complaint Service" to me members of the Mount community. Most requests for information and complaints were handled directly by the students. However, in some cases where greater satisfaction for the consumer could be achieved by referring the complaint to the appropriate government agency, this was done. Articles on topics of interest to Mount consumers appeared regularly in the Picaro. The two experiences, handling complaints and information requests and writing a column for the Picaro, provided the Consumer Studies Seminar class with interesting learning experiences and provided the Mount with a new resource and service.

In addition to heavy class schedules and reality learning through community experiences, Home Economics students found time for social events and attendance at professional conferences.




The Languages Department ran a new course this year: The Acadian Seminar, which is open to all students, both part-time and full-time, for audit or for credit. The course explores, in French, the language and culture of the Acadians. Father Leger Comeau is the Cultural Consultant for the course. Dr. P. Gerin teaches the literature and language part, alternating with visiting lecturers who are eminent Acadians coming to speak once a fortnight on the subject of their specialty or concern. Visiting lecturers have included the Honourable Louis Robichaud and Mathilde Blanchard and many other interesting guest speakers.


The Department is also attempting to arrange a Junior Year exchange with a Quebec university, to supplement the successful programme in Besnacon, France.

There is also a possibility being explored of a junior year in Germany. Several Mount students have worked and travelled in Germany this year, with the organizing assistance of Mr. Poller in the German Department.

Mrs. Hartzman has helped Spanish students to participate in summer cultural exchange programmes which include travel, and living with families, in Mexico and Spain. She has also developed a Spanish programme especially geared to the traveller.

NURSING DEPARTMENT

PHILOSOPHY DEPARTMENT

Philosophy can play a useful role in anyone's university programme. An attempt is made to provide avenues of introduction to areas of philosophical interest and relevance to students at M.S. V.U. who are majoring in areas other than philosophy. Our courses try to meet these needs and through invitations from other subject areas, we are able to make a philosophical input into some other courses this year.

1973-74 saw the introduction of a course entitled 'Reasoning and Logic' to provide an opportunity to focus study on the important areas of language and reasoning. This last year also saw the introduction of an interdisciplinary course in literature and philosophy tought by Professor R. Usmiani and Professor Payer. This course examines the subject of meaning and the absurd found in certain segments of contemporary philosophy and literature. This year, it was decided to reintroduce a course of general interest for 1974-75 entitled 'Fundamental Problems of Religious Belief'. The department collaborated in sponsoring a lecture on Death and Dying by Professor G. Davidson which attracted widespread interest at the Mount.





A busy year for all of us, as usual! Here are some highlights:

The number of students taking courses in Religious Studies increased again this year. For the first time, two students - Eric King and Carole-Anne Holmes - were selected by the 23 majors and minors in Religious Studies to represent them at our monthly departmental meetings.

Thanks to talented and enthusiastic students, our Open House display was especially appreciated for its warmth and attractiveness.

The majors, minors and faculty enjoyed a wonderful wine-cheese-and music party hosted by the Kings in Dartmouth.

The three full-time faculty members were regular participants in the meetings of the Halifax Association of Religious Studies Teachers (AST, Dal, M.S.V.U.)

Sister Elizabeth Bellefontaine became a consulting member of the university chaplaincy team this year, and even occasionally exercised her 'preaching' ability! Membership in professional associations usually takes Elizabeth to distant places: this year to Chicago for the annual meetings of the Catholic Biblical Association. She was also a member of the executive of the Faculty Association and of the Senate committee on Admissions and Scholarships.

Dr. Jacques Goulet further developed his community concern by functioning as a member of the M.S.V.U. Public Relations committee, the Nova Scotia Family Life Education Curriculum committee, and the Halifax CUSO selection committee. Besides attending the annual conference of the National Council on Family Relations in Toronto, Jacques participated in number of weeked seminars on family life education in Halifax, Church Point, Truro and New Waterford.

Father Barry Wheaton, the department chairman, spent much time this year organizing and implementing a new course entitled "Science/Technology and Religion," which might eventually develop into a full-scale interdisciplinary program. A member of Senate and of the Inter-University committee, Father Wheaton also taught a course at the Atlantic School of Theology, where he is a member of the Board of Govenors, the Senate, and the Curriculum committee. In his spare time, he also managed to produce a few more pieces of sculpture in wood.


PRESIDENT'S REPORT AT THE FORTY-SEVENTH ANNUAL CONVOCATION MOUNT SAINT VINCENT UNIVERSITY SISTER MARY ALBERTUS, PH. D.


The women and men who have received degrees today are equally to be congratulated on not having been segregated, on having been able to work side by side as they will later in their families on their jobs and in society in general.

Finally, we would like to thank the Patrons, Advertisers, and the Yearbook buyers, whose financial support made this Yearbook possible.

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
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





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
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


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
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
