THREE TIMES A WINNER

March 9 and 10, 1991 can probably be considered the most successful two days in MSVU athletics. The Mount has competed in the Nova Scotia Colleges Athletic Association (formerly the Nova Scotia College Conference) for 11 years, but the success of last weekend sets new standards.

Provincial titles in women's volleyball, women's basketball and men's basketball highlighted the weekend. Individual awards went to Elaine Collins, Julie Roberge and Paula Ingarfield for volleyball, Jocelyn Maclean, Andrea Drake and Alex Taylor in women's basketball and Mark Forward and Tony Ross in men's b-ball. Coaches Anne Lindsay and Rick Plato were also rewarded for their efforts.

The women's volleyball team captured their tenth title in the last 11 years defeating UCCB in straight sets. After defeating Kings College in the semifinals, MSVU swept the Capers by scores of 16-14, 15-11 and 15-10. UCCB had defeated the Mount in their three previous meetings, but home court advantage spurred the Mystics to victory. Collins, Roberge and Ingarfield were named to the All-Conference team.

The team will be leaving March 20 for Quebec City to compete in the Canadian Colleges Athletic Association (CCAA) National Championships.

The women's basketball team won a second consecutive title, defeating the Nova Scotia Teachers College (NSTC) in an extremely close game. The championship game, held at the Agricultural College, went to overtime before the Mount pulled out a 58-56 victory. Jocelyn Maclean and Gail MacDonald led MSVU players with 11 points each.

Senate Decision Victory For Women

The recent defeat of Bill C43 in the Senate is a victory for women and the women's movement, said Judy Rebick, the president of the National Action Committee on the Status of Women.

Bill C43 made doctor's criminally liable for performing abortions. Because of this, the bill would have severely limited women's access to abortions, said Rebick yesterday during a speech to over 50 people at Mount Saint Vincent University.

"The defeat in the Senate wasn't just a quirk," said Rebick. "It was because women fought for 20 years and convinced the public that we have a right to control our own bodies."

The freedom of choice for women is a culmination of years of political and legal battles, said Rebick. "When we started...nobody thought we could win. But we fought back, we organized and because a majority of people support choice--we won."

Although women now have the legal right to make decisions about their own bodies, Rebick said there is still room for improvement. "Now abortion is 100 per cent legal, but the reality is that access is very limited across the country." Access to abortion is poor because clinics are only located in major centres, Rebick said. "Theoretically there is access, but in reality, access is very limited outside Halifax--for example."

The struggle for greater access to abortion should take place at both the provincial and federal levels of government, Rebick said. "On a federal level we need legislation to ensure the universality of medicare. Included in this should be access to abortion because it is a health service."

"Now the fight has moved to the provincial level. We must fight in the same way as we did at the federal level." Rebick said women can lobby and legally challenge provincial governments to make abortions more accessible.

"We must make it clear in

elections, that we as a women's movement, are not going to vote for someone who is anti-choice," said Rebick. "We're not going to give up this right that we fought so hard for."

However, Rebick doubts any government will bring in an anti-abortion law in the next generation. "More than 75 per cent of the population believe a women should be able to do what she wants with her body. It's something that is between her and her doctor." Rebick said politicians know the majority of people support choice.

Although one barrier to greater accessibility to abortion is getting government to change, Rebick said women must not underestimate their own strength.

Rebick, the president of the National Action Committee (NAC) since last May, has been active for years as a pro-choice advocate and as spokesman for Dr. Henry Morgentaler's Toronto abortion clinic.Besides leading Canada's largest women's organization, Rebick is also the director of special projects for the Canadian Hearing Society. She is involved in human rights work with deaf and hard of hearing groups.

Laurier Paper Shut Down Over Sex Article

TORONTO (CUP) -- Campus cops threw the editors of Wilfred Laurier University's student paper out of their offices March 4, after the student council effectively shut the paper down.

The council's move came three days after The Cord ran a controversial safer sex guide for gay men.

The council board of directors accused The Cord of sloppy journalism, and complained about the safer sex article, which was originally published by the student newspaper at Memorial University in St. John's, The Muse. Council president Stuart

Lewis said the safer sex article offended many students. "Because the union acts on the behalf of the students," Lewis said, "we have the obligation to encourage something we can be proud of and not support something that puts us in a negative light.

Cord editor Tony Burke defended the paper's decision to run the article, which uses explicit language and erotic scenarios to discuss safe sex.

He felt the article was inter-

esting, and when he asked other staff members about it, none were "violently" against running it, although some had concerns about the article's wording.

"The language was explicit but the intent was good," Burke said.

According to the council, there are other reasons why The Cord should be shut down. "The Cord has published some poorly researched news stories and potentially libellous editorials," he said. "There has been a pattern of problems over a long period of time and an isolated incident did not cause this."

The Cord is currently embroiled in two lawsuits stemming from an editorial printed last year. Burke doesn't think they should have to pay the mistakes of last year's staff, since the paper has a high staff turnover rate.

"This year's staff is being held accountable for last year's mistake that some of the new people didn't even know about.

The student union has been trying to shut us down throughout the year and now, we're barred from the office."

If staff try to enter the Cord office, Burke said they can be charged with trespassing.

You state in your letter that between pages 2-11,75 women and 52 men were shown. Well how about if we look at the total number of pictures in general. How about these statistics:

50 -- 100%

Total # of women only pictures 27 -- 54%

Total # of men only pictures 2 -- 4%

Total # of women and men pictures

15 -- 30%

Total # of scenery pictures

6 -- 12%

Do you realize that last year's yearbook was put together by five women who would never intentionally misrepresent anyone, let alone their own sex. Where were all the volunteers from the Women's Studies Society when we asked for help, any form of help anyone had to offer would have been appreciated. Where were you when we spent our nights and weekends just trying to meet the book's deadlines. Did you ever think that if you felt strongly enough about a certain cause that you should do everything in your power to make sure that your views are heard. Maybe by volunteering sometime to the yearbook, you could have alleviated these such "misrepresentations" which you said occurred.

Now I ask you, by using three pictures which contain at least 40 of the 52 men you stated appeared in pages 2 - 11 (and by the way, which have women in them as well) as your basis for your "misrepresentation" do you feel like your sample is just a little bit biased? What about the coverage of the fashion show; some men at the Mount might feel that this is very unimportant to them, in fact some might find that a bit biased. As far as your concern about the Male Beauty Pageant, unfortunately you were not in attendance because those that did enjoyed themselves immensely, and some of these people were even women. Even if you were in attendance and did not enjoy the event, well, nobody can force you to stay and watch the remainder.

But, I am not going to continue to disprove your accusations. I would like to make a strong point on how I feel. Not only do I feel personally attacked, because of my position on the 1990 Yearbook Committee, but I also feel that I, myself am misrepresented. As a past graduate of Mount Saint Vincent University, I find it very disturbing that people in the Women's Study Society voice there opinion as that for all women at the Mount. I have never been a feminist, nor have I ever been against them. I believe that everyone has a right to their own opinion and I also

If you want to pronounce injustice or misrepresentation, I suggest these are much more serious topic that you should be addressing. I also believe in equal pay for equal work, whether it be for a women executive or a male housekeeper.

So many people these days who believe in causes to extremes to try and better their situation, but realistically don't you think that time spent devoted to more important issues (like those mentioned above) would do your cause more good. People these days have little patience for "people who cry wolf."

I strongly urge you to reconsider your motives and focus your energy on such instances that are truly of greater concern to the public eye for all men and women.

12 Steps To Curing Alcoholism: Al-Anon Support Groups Help Families

"God grant me the serenity to accept things I cannot change, the courage to change the things I can, and the wisdom to know the difference."

Millions of people are affected by the excessive drinking of someone else. Be it an alcoholic parent, sibling, child or friend, watching a loved one suffer from alcoholism can leave scrious emotional scars.

The Al-Anon Family Groups are a fellowship of friends and family of alcoholics who share their experiences and feelings in hopes of overcoming the common problems they face. By following the 12 steps and traditions of the Alcoholics Anonymous program itself, Al-Anon members are able to ease their emotional burdens, and move on to help others gain an understanding of alcoholism.

Bev, whose family name will be withheld because of Al-Anon's firm belief in anonymity, has been attending Al-Anon Family Groups for the last five years. Along with patience and determination, Bev has been able to rid herself of the guilt and the her while growing up with an alcoholic father.

"In sharing your experiences, and from hearing other people's experiences," said Bev, "you realize that the burdens you carry from being affected by alcoholism area also carried by other people."

Perhaps the most appealing thing about the Al-Anon organization is the sense of acceptance and understanding within the groups. People from all walks of life attend Al-Anon meetings; all are different, yet all share a common thread. For Bev, realising that she wasn't along was the first big step to feeling better about herself.

"When you first start attending Al-Anon," Bevsaid, "you listen to people you've never met in your life, and they're telling you your whole life story as far as your feelings and your way of thinking go ... it's so helpful."

Bev has been busy for the last few months working with an Al-ateen group which she helped tostart. The Al-ateen groups are very similar to Al-Anon, you give teens the opportunity to meet with members of their own peer them to "open up" to adult.

"We help one another by talking and listening. Most teens feel more comfortable with others of their own age group."

Alcoholism is a family discase. When one member drinks too much, the entire family suffers. Children who have grown up in homes with an alcoholic are profoundly affected by it, even in adulthood.

Ann, 23, also grew up with an alcoholic father. Ann loves her father very much, but says he was someone who hurt her and scared her during her whole life. Because of Al-Anon, Ann has been able to begin to understand why she is the way she is. Like why, for instance, all her relationships have been with men with drinking problems.

"When a girl grows up with a 'Jeckel & Hyde' father as I did," Annsaid, "she gets mixed up ideas of what a man or a husband is supposed to be. What she grows ago, and now asks herself why she had always denied the fact that it would help her.

What you live, you learn; what you learn, you practice; what you practice, you become. This is the cycle of life so many people affected by alcoholism are trying to break. This is what the Al-Anon Family groups help them do. By offering comfort, hope, and friendship to the families and friends of compulsive drinkers, Al-Anon helps people deal with the disease of alcoholism.

Do you worry about how much someone else drinks? Do you think that if the drinker

stopped, your other problems would be solved? Do you have money problems because of someone else's drinking? Are you afraid of upsetting someone for fear that it would set off a drinking bout? If so, chances are that Al-Anon could help you.



There are labelling standards that protect consumers, so do not be afraid to return products when you feel the label has been misleading.

Remember, your choice at the grocery store counts towards good nutrition, good health, good looks, good feelings--these might all be in store for you.


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




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


FASHION SHOW

Health Plan Referendum

ADDITIONS TO EXIST-ING HEALTH PLAN Question to be put forth March 19 & 20

There will be a referendum on two additions to the existing Health Plan during the Spring Election, March 19, & 20, 1991.

Options include VISION CARE BENEFITS and ORAL CONTRACEPTIVES. The second option includes 80% of the cost of Oral Contraceptives. Additional premiums per month will be \$1.87 or \$22.44 per year, for a total cost of \$89.28 per year.

The third option includes both Vision Care and Oral Contraceptives. Additional Premiums per month will be \$5.55 or \$66.60 per year, for a total cost of \$133.44.

Services are the most tangible

The existing rates are \$4.34 per month or \$53.00 per year. The renewal rates for the upcoming year will be \$5.57/month or \$66.84 per year, an increase of \$1.23 per month or \$13.84 per year. This is the first increase in the Health Plan in three years.

The Alternative Plan has three options, the first reimburses the user \$80.00 for the purchase of eye glasses or contact lenses in a 24 month period. Additional premiums per month will be \$3.68 or \$44.16 per year. For a total cost of \$111.00 per year.



Students are vocalizing a need for greater focus on unity and communication. We need to pay attention to the simple things and everything else will follow.



On April Fool's Day, 1949, Newfoundland joined Confederation and became Canada's tenth province.

Canadian playwright David French uses this historical moment as the basis of his comedy-drama "1949", now on Neptune Theatre's main stage. It's a humourous (but sometimes sappy) story of the Mercers-a Newfoundland family living in Toronto on the eve of Confederation. Emotions are high and memories of the past are painfully relived as family and friends from "home" come together to mourn the death of their country.

The best of "1949's" talented cast are Florence Paterson as Rachel, Nicola Lipman as Mary Mercer and Richard Donat at Jacob Mercer. Everyone on stage gets a chance to show both scrious and humourous sides to their characters. Most of the laughs are earned by John Beale as Ned--an intense young man who (in an attempt to impress a girl) gets himself caught in a string of lies. Ned's scenes with his love April (Melissa Mullen) are hilarious. Also comically outstanding is Joseph Rutton as Norman, the

Mercer's hard-of-hearing and nosey neighbour. "1949" is the fourth play in French's series on the Mercer family. In three previous plays -- "Leaving Home", "Of the Fields Lately," and "Salt Water Moon,"--French has followed the fortunes of this trouble-ridden Newfoundland family who have lived in Toronto since the Second World War.

With this play, however, David French seems unsure of whether he wants to give an indepth history lesson or write the latest episode of "Another World".

"1949" high-energy beginning loses its steam as the play progresses. What starts as a story about national pride and shame, turns into a slow-paced mish-mash of romantic troubles, confessionals, and over emotional scences. The multitude of plots become tiresome and their conclusions are unsatisfying. With the topic of Confederation seemingly pushed into the background during the second act, "1949" loses its point and impact it could -and should have.

But all intense critques aside, "1949" is a lot of fun. Its got lots of great little surprises (the final resting place of Billy's extracted tonsils is the best!), and loads of laughs. It's worthseeing. "1949" runs until March 31, 1991.



The men's basketball team also travelled to Truro for the provincial championships. They defeated Kings College in the semis and prevailed 44-39 over NSTC in the final. The tourna-

ment capped off a very successful year, for the men, who finished with 17 wins and only 3 losses in the regular season.
