"This university can graduate students who can make a difference in our mass culture, because this university is different!" So said Mount president Dr. E. Margaret Fulton, Canada's only female university president, at a special faculty dinner. The following evening she also welcomed all new students to campus at the President's Orientation Dinner.

### **Mount Success Story**

Funding for special research projects initiated by Mount Saint Vincent University faculty has jumped a walloping 3400 per cent in less than six years, according to Dr. Wayne Ingalls.

Speaking to the first meeting of faculty for the 1981 fall term, Dr. Ingalls said the tremendous increase in the number of research grants obtained from outside sources could be attributed to a change in attitude on the part of the university's senior administrators and many of its faculty members.

Late in 1974, he said, the Mount set out on a program to increase the research productivity of its faculty. At that time a research administration office was established and funds were allocated for research purposes. Hiring policies were also initiated and the university began to tively recruit faculty with a record for for a potential for) research productivity.

grants also helped to create a climate which encouraged research," said Dr. In-

With this kind of serious commitment to support research, a change of attitude on the part of faculty was also required. The Mount was small in comparison to other Canadian universities. Its faculty had heavy teaching loads and no funds available to attract the graduate students required to assist faculty members pursuing research.

'So, at first, Mount researchers doubted they would be able to obtain the funding from external sources required. But after a few initial success stories, attitudes have changed and various important research projects have become a very vital part of the university," said Dr. Ingalls.

Since that time, too, the Mount has shown a tremendous increase in enrolment and there has been a 27 per cent increase in full-time faculty. The total research funding generated by Mount faculty from outside sources since 1974 has increased from \$13,000 to \$459,500.

Dr. Ingalls, who became the university's Director of Research and Special Projects only two years ago, said research projects underway involve anthropology, biology, business administration, public relations, chemistry, economics, education (child studies), english, mathematics, history, modern languages, sociology to name only a few.

### Youth Drop-In Program

"What to do — where to go?" This is the eternal complaint of young people who lack facilities for recreation.

With this in mind, Mount Saint Vincent University is including a Youth Drop-In program for teenagers, 14 to 18 years of age, in the Community Recreation Program at Rosaria Centre this fall.

Young people will be able to use the gymnasium, exercise rooms, games room and weight equipment on a daily basis, for 12 weeks for a modest membership fee and a few extra dollars to help cover the cost of additional supervisory staff.

A second innovation in the program this year is Exercise for the Fun of it, on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 9:30 to 11:30 a.m. This includes a babysitting service, but will depend on the number enrolling before finally being included in the program. About 22 participants per session are needed to make it feasible.

Drop In For Fitness will be repeated this fall, aimed at the business community who like to exercise during lunch hours. This will take place daily from 12 noon until 2 p.m. with exercise classes on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 12:15 to

The Senate meets regularly from September to April on the last Monday of each month, with the first meeting of this year scheduled for 7:30 p.m. September 28 in Rosaria Board Room.

According to the University Charter, the Senate is responsible for the academic policy of the university, overseeing matters such as the introduction and termination of academic courses and programs of tudy; standards for admission; conduct of examinations; qualifications for and the granting of degrees, certificates, and diplomas; scholarships and other awards and prizes; convening and conduct of convocations; student conduct and discipline; and academic qualifications for the appointment and promotion of faculty.

The Senate comprises a total of 33 voting members, including 8 ex officio members representing the university administration, 17 elected faculty members (including one from each of arts, science, home economics, business, and education), 5 student representatives (one of whom must be a part-time student), and 3 representatives from the Dalhousie University Senate, as well as the Secretary of Senate, who is a non-voting member.

Items dealt with at Senate meetings are normally brought forward by the Standing Committees of Senate, whose membership consists of both ex officio and elected representatives. Several of the Senate Standing Committees (the Committee for Academic Affairs and its subcommittees, the Library Committee, and the Committee on Student Affairs) include student representatives. All Senate Committees may receive written submissions from faculty and students; in addition, faculty and students may attend anyone wishing to make a presentation an overall increase.

before a Senate Committee which is meeting in closed session may request permission to do so from the Chairperson of the Committee.

As stated in the Senate By-Laws, meetings of Senate are ordinarily open to all members of the Mount Saint Vincent University community (which includes all employees, students and members of any official body of the university) except when the matter being discussed requires confidential treatment. The agenda for all Senate meetings is posted in Seton Faculty Lounge and Evaristus Faculty Lounge five days prior to the meeting; the agenda is also available for perusal in the office of the Secretary of Senate, Dr. Wayne Ingalls (Evaristus 205). Following each meeting, a report on items approved by Senate is published in the MSVU Newsletter.
