Alumnae Award for Teaching Excellence


Students, alumnae and faculty are invited to nominate a full-time faculty member who has taught at least three academic years at Mount Saint Vincent University.


The nomination requires you to:

- -submit two other names of students alumnae or faculty who support your
- -explain why your nominee should be considered
- -return your nomination to the office of the Vice-President (Academic) on or before February 3, 1984

All nominations, if accepted by the candidates, will be reviewed by an eight member selection committee made up of representatives from students, alumnae and faculty. Nomination forms may be obtained from the offices of the Deans, the Vice-President (Academic), Alumnae and Student Council; at Seton front desk; and from the Picaro.

This award replaces the President's Award for Teaching Excellence.





Artist at Mount

Well known artist and writer, Graham Metson, will be teaching the history of communications to students at the Mount starting this semester.

History 284B will introduce students to the main aspects of communications as they have evolved since the Renaissance and up to modern times. The course will question whether print, radio, films and TV have wiped out cultural differences or accentuated them.

There will be a Canadian component with lectures and discussions on the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation, the National Film Board and private broadcast ing and motion picture production in this

In addition to numerous one-man shows of his own artistic works (in London, Dresden, Barcelona, New York and Halifax) Graham Metson is the author of books on the Halifax explosion, Halifax during the war years and the Canadian artist, Alex

He has taught at the University of Wis consin, University of Kentucky and the Nova Scotia College of Art and Design. His experience in photography, print, painting and film will provide students with an in-depth introduction to the fascinating field of communications.

Bursary Funds

The following bursary funds are available during the second term of each university year. Further information and applica tions for these and a number of programs is available from the Financial Aid Office, Rosaria 119.

The Soroptimist Foundation of Canada annually offers a fellowship to graduate female students to assist in studies which qualify them for careers servicing other women by improving the quality of their lives. Five grants of \$5,000 will be made available in 1983/84. Deadline for applications: January 31, 1984.

Mount Saint Vincent University Bursary Funds to assist students towards completion of academic term, awarded solely on the basis of need. Deadline: January 31,

Mount Saint Vincent Alumnae Bursary awarded yearly to a child of an alumna and awarded on the basis of need. Deadline: January 31, 1984.

Mount Saint Vincent University Continuing Education Scholarship awarded yearly to a woman over 30 years of age enrolled in any program except education. The award is based on involvement in student and community organizations and class participation. Student's average must be above 70 per cent. The award will not be based on financial need except in the case of a tie. Deadline: March 1, 1984

Mount Saint Vincent University Campus Association of Part-time University Students will award a credit voucher for the value of a full unit course to a part-time student who has already completed five units of credit in a degree program. This award is based primarily on financial need, but scholastic achievement will also be considered. Deadline: March 31, 1984.

Self Defence Program

The Athletics and Recreation Department is offering a couple of new programs for the general public this month. An added bonus for the Mount's DUET program (Distance University Education via Television) turns out to be the unexpectedly large number of casual viewers who tune in to the gerontology courses carried on the Atlantic Satellite Network.

A pilot study, recently completed by DUET researcher Helen Marshall, shows that at any given time several hundred viewers in the Atlantic Provinces are watching and enjoying the classes, even though they are not actually enrolled as

registered students.

In the Halifax metro area, for instance, between 250 and 750 viewers might be watching DUET on any given day; in Summerside, PEI, between 150 and 600, and in the Chatham/Newcastle area, between 35 and 105.

Marshall made 450 phone calls on a random basis to find out who the potential audience is and what percentage were

watching the programs.

Based on her projections and conversations with those contacted, it seems that women at home with young children have the greatest need for distance education offered by DUET. Often unable to leave the home, they are literally screaming "Do something for me!", Marshall says.

"Men on shift work, retired men and young unemployed men also watch our programs," she says, "and DUET offers courses of interest to both sexes, especially those who spend much time in the home caring for children or the elderly."

There are now 87 people enrolled as students in the DUET program and recent results show that they do as well, if not better, than students taking the courses on

cambus.

DUET programs go out via the Atlantic Satellite Network to communities in Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and PEI. In January, two credit courses are being offered on this network, The Biological and Health Aspects of Aging and The Psychology of Adulthood and Aging.

fait que les universités contribuent de façon importante à la prospérité économique, sociale et culturelle des collectivités, des provinces et du pays tout entier. Elle invite la Commission à insister auprès des gouvernements fédéral et provinciaux sur la nécessité d'assurer un niveau suffisant de financement à long terme, aux établissements d'enseignement postsecondaire.

Le mémoire appelle l'attention sur le rôle important des universités aux chapitres de la recherche et du développement. Il précise que la Commission devrait reconnaître: 1) que la presque totalité des chercheurs reçoivent leur formation à l'université, 2) que les universités doivent demeurer le point de convergence d'une bonne partie de la recherche pure au pays, 3) qu'on ne devrait pas laisser tomber l'appui à la recherche pure au-dessous d'un niveau minimal acceptable et 4) que l'équilibre entre la recherche pure et la recherche appliquée devrait faire l'objet d'une surveillance attentive.

L'Association souligne la nécessité d'une "politique nationale cohérente en matière de recherche" et elle prie la Commission d'établir des mesures particulières de redressement, à titre de protection contre une pénurie possible de chercheurs compétents dans les universités, au cours

des prochaines décennies.

Les universités canadiennes ont "réussi remarquablement bien" à apparier les demandes et les offres de main-d'oeuvre et elles devraient continuer de tenir compte des prévisions courantes en matière de main-d'oeuvre, dans la planification de leurs programmes, de mentionner le mémoire. Cependant, l'Association met en garde contre l'ingérence indue de groupes de l'extérieur, dans le processus de planification des universités.

Selon le mémoire, les inscriptions extraprovinciales d'étudiants canadiens représentent moins de 10 p. 100 du total des inscriptions. Il y est mentionné qu'un vaste programme de bourses d'étude et de recherche, financées par le gouvernement fédéral, pourrait contribuer à l'accroissement de la mobilité des étudiants au niveau universi-

Le mémoire, en outre, prie instamment les gouvernements fédéral et provinciaux d'encourager un plus grand nombre d'étudiants étrangers à venir étudier au Canada.
