
## DEDICATION - MR. H.A. ETHERIDGE

## CHAPLAINS

We asked our two chaplains, Fr. Dan Meunier, Catholic priest, and Fr. Don Shipton, Anglican minister, their views of church unity.

FR. DAN: There is a new conception of unity slowly making its way in the church. For a long time church unity was felt to be the reaching of some sort of huge uniform block where everybody through some transformation came to a common mind. But the facts have proven that this doesn't work, because people are readily identified with their cultural riches which they have come by through the ages, and they aren't about to give them up.

So ecumenism is slowly stressing that there is a much deeper unity than uniformity, and that is a unity of the faith. People will be gathered around a basic acceptance of Jesus' love and still be free to express this deeper unity in the different forms which are theirs.

FR. DON: And this very diversity is, in fact, a richness, a very real richness. Now we are seeing that the total meaning of the gospel can't be contained in one camp or one denomination. Different denominations have now found modified ways of expressing something which they have found to be real and meaningful. And really to enrich ourselves, whoever we are, it seems logical to try to make these differences and uniquenesses a contributory factor rather than a conflicting one. The old "ecumaniacs" felt that to achieve unity of Christian people, we must do away with all denominations and have one church. But, as Dan said, this doesn't work. Instead, people have discovered something at a deeper level, which is a common faith. By emphasizing this unity of faith people can transcend the barriers of denominationalism. So it's conceivable that everyone - a Catholic, Baptist, United Church, Anglican - will become committed to each other.







Sister Marguerite Flinn has long been associated with the university, first as a student, then as Dean of Women, and finally as an Assistant Professor of Biology.


Sister earned her M.Sc. degree in biology at Dalhousie University, and she is now doing her doctoral work on N.S. Asters.





## INTERVIEW WITH DR. SETH DEPARTMENT HEAD

Economics, I think, is a respectable social science which has its social, commercial, and intellectual values. As an aid to intellectual growth, economics provides a wide scope for developing among students a particular technique of thinking.

We live in times of dynamic change and social ferment. Swift and far reaching changes are taking place in the 'economic fabric of Canada' and the world around us. The main objective of the department is to provide our future citizens the facility and opportunity of comprehending problems created by this process of change.

The discipline of economics has become a part-parcel of my life. Nothing pleases me more than the opportunity afforded by the teaching profession for stimulating the students' interest in some of the more serious economic problems of our times.

The evidence is overwhelming that students retain very little of what they learn in college economics courses unless they become interested enough to continue to use it as they read the newspapers and vote; after they escape the threat of final examinations. If we do not manage to kindle a real interest in economics that will keep students concerned with its issues after graduation we have lost the battle at the outset.





## INTERVIEW WITH DAVE LYONS

We first discussed the recent changes in the Business Department. There is in fact a new program which has a concentration in Business Administration or Management. With the addition of the new course in Marketing and Accounting next year, Mr. Lyons felt that the Business Administration degree at the Mount would be much stronger, and therefore the Mount graduates would be more able to compete with graduates from other Maritime universities.

As far as the university goes, Mr. Lyons feels that the university should serve the community. But the question arises - should it be just the surrounding area, or the whole city. Also what can the Mount do for the community? One idea is to introduce more courses at the Mount that would interest a continuing education student. Another important factor is the image of the Mount. What image does the Mount promote to the community. Right now the Mount is in a transition period, and is not yet promoting a consistent image, but this will come with time.

To end the interview with Mr. Lyons, I asked a very important question, What does he feel is the role of women in business?

Although women make up a larger percentage in management than in previous years, he said that women will probably occupy 50% of management positions even if there is equal opportunity.

From what he has seen, he thinks women are on "a kick" as far as trying to get involved in Business Management. There are not enough women who are genuinely career oriented, and as it takes a while to get into the management stream, only the really interested women will make it. He also mentioned that hiring practices must be changed, and as far as women are concerned, it will be a very slow process.





## CONTINUING EDUCATION

The Continuing Education Department at the Mount serves the other academic departments of the university by providing courses, programs, and special events for those students considered "Continuing Ed.'s" and, also, for all students at the universities in the country, with approximately one-third of its students in Continuing Education.

What I find surprising is that many people don't realize that they can take university studies even without finishing high school. They feel inferior in some way - and this is silly! That is why - for the number of students coming back after being out of school for many years - we try to do all we can to make them feel comfortable and happy, and make their time here as successful for them as possible. Because we know it takes a lot of courage to overcome the fears they have about returning to the formal classroom.

This year the Continuing Education Department planned a three-phase series of programs for women. The first phase was a series of weekly meetings for homemakers. Twenty-four women were invited for eight weeks, free baby-sitting provided. This very successful series, My World, focused on the world of a woman; first of all as a distinct person; secondly, on her relationships with her husband and children; and finally, on her role in her own community.

The second phase was a great, one-day special, April 11, when over 150 women attended a seminar on A Woman Today.

The third phase is an exciting new credit course entitled Perspectives on Women. It is an inter-disciplinary course in which a student can obtain a credit in anyone of the following disciplines - Sociology, History, Psychology, Political Studies, Religious Studies, and Home Economics. The course will be planned so that at the end of the first semester (which gives an overview of each subject) the students will be able to decide which discipline they would like to receive credit in, and then they will receive in-depth study of women from the perspective of that chosen department during the second semester.




I think the Mount offers a flexible program which really seeks to serve the needs of the community as the University perceives them. Some examples of this are the pre-service and in-service reading workshops, the supervised remedial reading program for children carried on by students on a one-to-one basis in the schools, and the Family Life Institute.

The Institute has as its aims to impart a knowledge of the principles of human growth and development, to create an awareness of the responsibility of each person to promote good interpersonal relationships, to understand the changing role of the family, and to develop the ability to communicate the above affectively as well as cognitively.

The University offered its first Institute in the summer of 1972, and it was received most favorably. Some students felt that even if they never actually teach the program, they will certainly be better teachers for having taken it.


Perhaps the greatest service the Mount can offer those teachers who wish to improve their intellectual and professional status, is the personal attention of concerned faculty for each student.

At present the Department places great hope in its developing integrated B.A.-B.Ed. program. Students who choose to be teachers would begin taking some professional courses as early as their junior year.





Next on the agenda was the Quebec Winter Carnival Trip. Thirty business students benefited from this "educational and cultural tour". I know everybody had a great time.



I'm sure that next year will be even greater and I wish Ellie (MacNutt) as next year's president the best of luck and . . . PATIENCE.




