

Teaching excellence award goes to two this year

Two outstanding Mount professors have received the Alumnae Award for Teaching Excellence for 1987-88, in the first split decision since the award was initiated in 1981.

Josette Deleas-Matthews, associate professor of French, and John Sayre, associate professor of mathematics, were recently named co-recipients by a committee of faculty, students and alumnae. The award will be presented at the alumnae annual meeting June 4.

Josette Deleas-Matthews served as a

lecturer at the Mount from 1974 to 1976. Since rejoining the faculty in 1983, she has taught courses in French language and literature. Her interests also include film, drama and fiction, and she has developed courses in the aesthetics of film, film language and women film directors.

In addition to her teaching and committee responsibilities, Deleas-Matthews has served as an evaluator for Atlantis, the women's studies journal; as a participant for

Chef Rene bursary established by residence students

Marinus Vannieuwenhuizen, alias Chef Rene, alias director of food services, has become a beloved figure to students, staff and faculty alike.

A group of students decided recently to give back some of the care and kindness they have so often received from Chef Rene. Led by Daphne Hutt, a graduate student living in Assisi Hall, the councils of four residences have established a bursary in his name.

The Chef Rene Bursary, value \$200, will be awarded annually to a residence student who meets the criteria of financial need and involvement in residence activities.

Notice of the bursary was presented to Chef Rene at the Residence Banquet in March. To ensure its continuance, the residence councils have included this award in their constitutions.

But the residence students didn't stop there. When they learned that Chef Rene's daughter, Arlene, was planning to attend the Special Olympics in Seoul, Korea, this summer, they put together an additional \$200 to speed her on her way. Arlene, who also works on the cafeteria staff, will be competing in swimming, shotput and javelin events.

"All the money for both projects was raised, penny by penny, by the residence students," says housing officer Barbara Crocker.

Tracy Barton, treasurer of the residence council, explains they held "penny-rolling bees," gradually getting all the donated ennies and silver to the bank.

Both Barton and Crocker applaud Daphne Hutt's contribution to the bursary and the Seoul fund.

"Daphne was the first person to realize how nice it would be to give the chef something of lasting value," says Tracy.

He has published papers in refereed mathematics journals and presented research lectures at Dalhousie and UWO. He is continuing his research with the support of a second operating grant from the Natural Sciences and Engineering Research Council.

A member of Senate since 1986, Sayre has played an active role in numerous mathematics department and university committees. He has also served as a judge for national and regional science fairs.

Sayre holds BSc, MA and PhD degrees from the University of Western Ontario.

Blueprint for action - older adults and activity

The Mount's athletics/recreation department is helping the federal government develop guidelines for physical activity for the older adult.

Fitness Canada, in co-operation with the Secretariat for Fitness in the Third Age, initiated a consultation process earlier this year, whereby priorities and strategies could be set for Fitness Canada programs.

Athletics/recreation co-ordinator, Pat DeMont, gathered together two groups -- a focus group of older adults currently participating in physical activity, and a resource group of those who lead physical activity programs for older adults in the province.

Both groups were asked what type of activities they felt were appropriate for older adults, what they found to be major problems (for example, inaccessible transportation), and if they saw potential interaction with other service groups and agencies.

DeMont and two members of the focus group, Molly and Ralph Russell, just returned from Ottawa. They, and approximately 18 other representatives from across the country, spent two days examining and discussing the first draft of the Blueprint for Action report. The Russells represented Canadians currently participating in physical activity. They have been regulars in the Mount's soft aerobics program for the past five years.

The final report is expected to be released later this summer. It will be used to help the federal government plan and coordinate physical activity for older adults throughout Canada.
