# Derrick reelected as council president

An oddity in Student Union elections occurred at Mount Saint Vincent University when Anne Derrick was re-elected for her second term as Student Union President.

When asked why Derrick wanted the position for a second year, she replied, "Money and extended continuity."

Derrick's campaign stressed student solidarity, student aid and housing and an integration of students into university decision making of policies. She felt students were interested mainly in domestic problems. "They want to express themselves to administration and faculty", she said.

Derrick got 76 per cent of the votes although the voter turn out was poor (less than 400 people voted). She attributed her win to her experience and the poor campaigning of her opponent, Pat Faulkner. "I would have been surprised if I hadn't won," she said.

For next year, a better structured student council and the commencement of The Social Athletic Complex are the aims of the President.

Derrick hopes that next year's council will be able to put down concrete ideas to follow in the future. "Everything should be in writing", she said.


She feels male visiting hours should be extended. "We should allow males in residence, but not have it open 24 hours a day," she said.

She also feels there should be a pub on campus which would mean setting up a liquor control board.

More involvement in the Atlantic Federation of Students is also a priority she said.



# Are you applying for Student Aid?

Applications for student loans will be available after the first of May. Students wishing to obtain a loan application should mail their request to the following addresses depending on which province you reside in:

Nova Scotia: Nova Scotia Canada Student Loans Committee, Dept. of Education, P.O. Box 578, Halifax, Nova Scotia.

Newfoundland: Canada Student Loans Authority, Dept. of Education, Confederation Building, St. John's, Newfoundland.

Prince Edward Island: Canada Student Loans Committee, Dept. of Education, Charlottetown, P.E.I.

New Brunswick: Dept. of Youth, Centennial Building, Fredericton, New / Brunswick

Ontario; Ministry of Colleges & Universities, Student Awards Branch, Mowat Block, Queen's Park, Toronto, Ontario M7A 1C6

Filling out your application form

It is advisable to mail in your loan application as early in the summer as possible. It usually takes four to six weeks to process an application and generally there are delays due to the fact that a number of students do not supply all the necessary information and verifications required in the application form. Be sure to read the instructions attached to the application form very carefully and fill in every space which

is applicable to you. If you are classed as a Group "A" student (dependent), your parents will have to fill out the section regarding their financial data. Please note that all incomes given must be verified by copies of T4 and T1 forms if the head of the household is employed. If your father is on a pension, he will require a letter from the company where he is obtaining his pension for verification; if welfare is being received, a letter from the Social Assistance Dept. is required; if on unemployment, a letter from the Unemployment Insurance Commission is required.

All students are classed as Group "A" students (dependent), unless they qualify as Group "B" under one of the following criteria:

- 1. the applicant has been married prior to the first day of the month of registration for the academic year for which he is requesting aid;
- 2. he/she has successfully completed four years of post-secondary study;
- 3. he/she has been working for two years:
- 4. he/she had any combination of successful completion of post-secondary study and work experience which adds up to four years


5. he/she has been assessed as a Group "B" student in past years.

In case the Student Aid office requires more information concerning your application, it would be advisable to inform them of your summer address if it is different from your home address.

Expenses which you can claim on your budget for the school year:

- 1. Tuition fees
- 2. Student Union fees
- 3. Books and instruments -- you can claim \$200 for the full academic year.
- 4. Room, rent -- if you have applied for residence you may claim the rate charged. If you are renting, you may claim an average figure to an approved

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## Residents survey

# Student interest in open house fizzles

A few weeks ago there was a great deal. of concern within the student body about the open hours in residence issue. A number of students circulated a petition and demanded meetings with the residence representative Joanne Belliveau.

As a result of this, Ms. Belliveau drew up and circulated a survey to the residents of this campus. This survey was intended to provide adequate information to take to the Student Affairs Committe for action. This was a very short, simple survey which would require approximately five minutes to complete. Apparently the residents of Mount Saint Vincent are such diligent students that they couldn't spare the time required for this survey.

Of the 560 resident students, 200 returned the survey. Representatives of the Residence Committee in all residences were designated to collect these surveys and notices for the interested residents were posted to tell where these representatives could be found.

Heaven forbid that one should assume disinterest was the reason for the poor return. That could never be; at least not at MSVU. This request originated from the students and everyone knows they all cared enought to see it through. Even now, they are asking when open hours will begin.

In an attempt to discover what went wrong and where it did it was revealed that Vincent Hall where this started, was the worst offender, followed closely by Assisi, where it is rumored that male visitors are already in existence. Evaristus had a excellent return rate and the Birches, Marillac and Marywood were good. The overall return was slightly over one third of the possible. two hundred replies. That's only a Can you imagine the reception these results would get if presented to the Student Affairs Committee? The person

presenting the issue would be laughed at if this was claimed as justification for "open hours".

Students have said they didn't have time, didn't think it would work, or had too many other surveys to fill out. Some thought that the administration should be prepared to grant "open hours" without any survey or such indication of interest. Some even thought it would happen that way (eventually).

It is a sin to disillusion the young, but, with this poor show of interest nothing will ever change at MSV.

Residence Representative, Belliveau says, "there isn't enought to base a serious request on. The surveys that were returned were good but there weren't enough of them. Students have to realize that we can't get results with only little over one third. The administration won't even consider it seriously now," sums up Ms. Belliveau.

When asked what she thought about the poor results Student Union President, Anne S. Derrick has a very definite view.

Derrick says, "Students just can't expect anything if they aren't willing to exert at least a token effort. They won't make any significant progress in any such endeavor if they sit back and wait for Council to do it all for them. Council needs proof of support for such an issue".

A good reply to the survey would have provided this support. With what has happened the furture for "open hours" isn't very optimistic . . . unless students do something.

# 37% respond to campaigns



# Liberal women M.P.'s protest Why Not

OTTAWA (CUP) -- Liberal women MP's are angrily campaigning against the button and advertising campaign which Health Minister Marc Lalonde is peddling to help liberate Canadian women.

Simma Holt (Vancouver-Kingsway) and Iona Campagnolo (Skeena) won't wear theirs and they are not afraid to say "Why Not".

"It's bloody degrading" Holt.

She charged Lalonde has been misled into endorsing the button by his "office full of surrogate wives."

"I consider it to be sexist in tone," said Campagnolo.

They said that none of the women in the House of Commons are wearing the buttons bearing the "Why Not" slogan and they appear to be intimidating their male colleagues to dump theirs.

vetractors of the button claim that the button "Why Not" could be taken as as invitation to something other than equality of status.

Campagnolo said the button could be taken as having a "sexual connotation."

Holt suggested that the health minister may have been misled endorsing the button because of the number of women in his office.

"He's got an office full of surrogate wives and I guess he thinks that's being liberated," she said.

Lalonde has been visiting the North West Territories distributing buttons and was unavailable for comment.

When contacted back in her Vancouver constituency office January 27 Holt said she was opposed to the advertising slogan and was totally against continuing with the advertising agency which is running the campaign.

"An agency that is as insensitive as they are by putting out the button and not even paying attention to women picketers who demonstrated in front of their the university's counselling to high offices against the campaign shouldn't be kept on," she said.

"I think the slogan is degrading and sexist in innuendo.' It's absolutely bad. I'm not a wild eyed feminist and I fought my battles in the journalism industry, which is the most chauvinist of all, but I'm still against it."

She said she complained to Lalonde along with serveral other women MP's and had made it quite clear to the men in the caucus why they object to the

She said however, that Lalonde told her he is committed to the ad agency and can't change now.

When she reached her office in Vancouver yesterday she found a large cardboard blow-up of the slogan which was meant to hang in her office. She promptly sent it back to Lalonde.

"It's absolutely stupid, how negative can you get," she said.

When questioned about her comments concerning Lalonde's office staff she said that she meant no disrespect to the women but said they were very protective of Lalonde and didn't have a deep enough understanding of the women's

maximum. If you live at home, the standard weekly assessment for board and lodging is \$21.45.

- 5. Food -- if you are living in residence, you may claim the amount the university is charging for a meal plan. An assessed cost for noon meals is allowed for students living off campus. If you are renting, determine a reasonable cost for food for the full academic year.
- 6. Trip Home -- the cost of one return trip home a year by the most economical means of transportation can be claimed if you are a Group "A" student and are attending an institution not in your home town.
- 7. Local transportation -- an assessed cost of local transportation is permit-
- 8. Miscellaneous -- a miscellaneous cost of a given amount which will be stated on your application form is permitted for each week of an academic year (35 weeks) to cover the cost of

clothing, laundry, recreation and all other personal needs.

The costs mentioned above are all direct educational costs that are allowed. There may be circumstances whereby a student may have an additional education cost which can be entered in the space marked "other" on the budget. Please note that claims for a typewriter or car insurance;, etc. are not considered direct educational costs.

As soon as your application form is received by the Student Aid Office, a card will be mailed to you to indicate that your application has been received. to transfer over the account from one forms from the Student Aid Office informing you of the amount of assistance granted. You will not be able to obtain the loan, however, until you have regis- receiving a bursary and did not receive tered at the university in September. Prior to coming to university in the fall, you will have received a certificate of eligibility from the Student Aid Office. This form indicates what

should be given to the Registrar's office when you arrive in the fall so that they can sign the appropriate areas and mail it back to the Student Aid Office and you can receive your bursary in January. At registration in September, the Business Office will sign your loan forms

and then you must take them to the bank to negotiate your loan. If you had a loan before, you must negotiate your loan through the necessary arrangements After a few weeks, you will receive some bank to the other. Thebursary portion of your student loan will not be received until Jaruary of the academic year. If you have been informed that you would be it by the end of January, please check with the Student Aid Office in your province or the Student Aid Office on campus which is located in Rosaria Hall. The bursaries will be sent to the Business Office by the Student Aid Office in each province and the Business Office will inform students of bursaries received by posting names on the bulletin boards outside the office.

Summer Savings

You are expected to make a contribution towards your educational costs from your summer work earnings. For example, a student contribution of \$300 is expected from a newly admitted student proceeding from high school to the fall term. For a second year univeristy student, the student is expected to save \$525. A student entering the third year of study is expected to save \$570 and the student entering the fourth year of study is expected to save \$610.

If you were not able to save the expected amount from your earnings during the summer, you may request an appeal after the first of September. Acceptable reas sons for adjustment would include the following:

- 1. did not earn enough--letter from employer stating gross amount earned and a budget of expenses incurred during the summer would be required.
- 2. could not find a job--verification required from you local Manpower office stating you had applied for a job through the summer with them about a job. You would also be required to have letters from three business where you tried to find employment.
- 3. illness prevented working--supported by a doctor's certificate.
- attendance at summer school--supported by verification from the summer school attended which would state the length of the course.

If you wish help in filling out your student loan application form or would like to appeal your student loan in the fall, please do not hesitate to contact your compus Student Aid Office located in the Student Services corridor, Rosaria Hall.



The news was broken to us gently. Dr. Paul Spong like a sculptor chissled away at the many slowly, and in a most delectably aesthetic manner he revealed to us one of his own masterpieces . . . a rather intimate relationship with over and it was time to go home, nobody noticed a whale. We sailed away into the world of the whales with the help of an entourage of slides, films, and recordings. The visual proof of the whales themselves interacting and responding to humans (and their music) was only to be surmounted by tapes of their own voices or their own music, which ev er you prefer.

It was just as they said it would be "totally absorbing" and "a tangible offer to the senses of an intelligence that lives in the sea as we live on land -- masters of the environment."

As we are (as considered by many) the most highly evolved creatures living on land, so are the whales the most highly evolved of the sea. The brain of the Sperm Whale is the largest and may be the most complex brain yet produced by the evolutionary process. The brain of the Bottle Nosed Dolphin is larger and as complex as man's.

Every 12 - 14 minutes one of the few remaining Great Whales is killed. Each year approximately half a million of the small whales (Dolphins and Porpoises) are butchered. Within five years the whales will be commercially and

perhaps biologically extinct. Within ten to fifteen years this will be true for almost all the Cetacean species.

This summer the fifth GREENPEACE vessel will sail from Vancouver. It's objective to save the world's dwindling populations of whales.

The GREENPEACE Foundation is asking Japan to vote in favour of a ten year moratorium at the

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

# Who are these supermen in blue?

-Who are these men in blue and what do

-What rights do they have?

-Who gives them orders?

-How much do we pay for them?

These questions and more I will attempt to answer in this article.

Pinkertons of Canada Limited is the oldest and largest private security force in Canada. They have been in existence for over 150 years and they employ both men and women.

In other parts of Canada, such as Montreal and Toronto, the Pinkerton guards have gun permits and do a variety of jobs from being private eyes to that of being bank guards. They even have special canine corps. However, in Halifax, they limit themselves mainly to the task of being security guards.

Here at Mount Saint Vincent University, we hire five Pinkerton guards, one of them being female. One guard is here through a day shift and the other four take various shifts throughout the night.

Mr. Robert Laframboise, the sergeant is in charge of the small army of persons in blue and he takes his orders from Mr. Michael V. Merrigan, the Executive Assis- 2 tant to the Administrator who is in charge of security on compus.

They are hired to quard Mount Saint

Vincent University and the Sisters of Charity's property. The cost is shared porportionately by both the University and the Sisters of Charity. Pinkertons of Canada Ltd. are paid \$4.00 per hour for each person with the exception of Laframboise whose position as sergeant re- iform. He only has the power of citizens quires more. The company will in turn pay the quard much less and therefore, make a substantial profit part of which pays for uniforms. On top of this we supply them with a car.

On campus, the quards take care of the mail as well as having the job of checking parking and the security of the physical property. They lock doors and windows because of large amount of business Mount and give out parking tickets to illegal parkers.

"We're just paid to stand here and look stupid" was the reaction of one Pinkerton

quard when asked what he does. There is not much, in fact that a private security guard can do. They can evict a person off campus and give parking tickets. other than that, he is an ordinary citizen like any of us except that he wears a blue unarrest. That is to say, if he catches you for breaking the law, he must get a policeman to charge you.

Compared to a city cop or mountie, the Pinkerton guard is not considered to be as competent.

However, Merrigan assures Saint Vincent University does with Pinkertons of Canada Ltd., we get the "pick of the lot". He also said Pinkerton was chosen for its reputation and size.


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## YOU DON'T HAVE TO MAKE A CAREER OUT OF A SUMMER JOB.

#### ARTICLE - I

#### ARTICLE - II

### Objectives:

- 1. To provide a medium for the review and evaluation of campus food services.
- 2. To dialogue on such matters as the type of service offered, food prices, cafeteria hours, student employment, and other matters pertaining to the food

# M.S.V. P.R. masks the facts

Whatever else the Mount can be said to publish very attractive public relations brochures. Some of them boast appealing pictures of residence life - the townhouses... Some manage to convey the message effectively in mere words.

The Mount is without a doubt a very attractive place, many bright classrooms and residences, much enhanced by a proliferation of windows looking out over the splendid campus. However all is not as exciting as first it would seem. Certain residences are older and therefore more derelict; the unavailability of additional residence space creates this situation. However, this need not allow for further aggravation of the present problem. Marillac, for example, had a problem with rats, not particularly pleasant situation for those living there. The building belongs to the Motherhouse, as does Vincent Hall, and any changes or improvemnts must be initiated in the form of negotiations between the Motherhouse and the University.

Changes and improvments are not as easily perpetrated as they are complained about. No one in the University deliber ately wishes there to be descrepit furniture in the Vincent Hall Lounge nor does anyone relish the thought of peelingpaint and the smell of mildew. However these conditions should not be tolerated merely because they are due to the unintentional neglect of residence depreciation. Changes cannot result if particular problems are not brought to the

attention of the University, either directly or through the Student Council.

The physical problems of residence living will always exist; utensils must be replaced, appliances do break, paint peels roofs leak and furniture gradually gives up the ghost. The Student Council is attempting to correct some of the conditions most particularly those of rats and deteriorating furniture. Too often unpleasant or undesirable conditions in residence are tolerated until some concerned persons stumbles upon them.

Students disatisfied with their living conditions should take their initiative and direct their complaints through the right channels. Solidarity and proper representation of your concerns are essential. Contact your residence representative or Mr. Merrigan and Sister Marie Gillen. Putting your feelings into writing has great impact and demonstrates that you are taking definate steps to correct your situation. Act now and help shake the kinks out of the system.

# WILL YOU BE WEARING THIS BUTTON WHEN YOU GRADUATE THIS SPRING?


Canada has one of the finest educational systems in the world. But many Canadian employers unjustifiably underpay some very welleducated graduates of that system. Women.

A 24-year-old male, leaving university with a degree, earns on the average 19 per cent more in his first job than a woman of the same age with the same degree. A male high-school graduate can expect an average 34.2 per cent more than the equivalent female graduate. It just isn't right.

It just isn't right, either, that long before graduation, some schools still insist on channelling girls into home economics classes and boys into industrial arts.

Some girls make excellent mechanics and engineers. Some boys make excellent designers and chefs. Why curb their natural talents?

There is no logical reason why we should. Equal educational opportunities are guaranteed us under law, but there are prejudices and precedents. Society expects women to cook and sew because it expects them to get married one day. Don't men



get married too? Maybe they should learn household skills as well.

When it comes to employment, the same kind of archaic thinking brings us less pay and recognition. Certainly women get married, but many keep on working. Of some three million women working in Canada today, more than 50 per cent are married. Why are they being paid less than their husbands? Because they are married? How about a single working woman? It costs her as much to live as a single working man. So why is she also being forced to live on less? Particularly when 50.0 per cent of all Canadian women in the labour force, having completed their high-school education, have gone on to take

post-secondary training, compared to 39.3 per cent of the men. So no one can use the excuse that working women are less qualified.

The entire situation must change. But if it is to change, we have to start thinking of ourselves as equals. And demanding that others do, too. We have to teach our children to think differently. Because they are the next generation of educators and homemakers, employers and employees. We must break down the barriers of prejudice for ourselves and remove them entirely for our children.
