Elections committee chair resigns Anonymous testimony sparks Yee's departure

A request for anonymous testimony to the Elections Review Committee led to the resignation of Gin Hing Yee, the committee chair.

"The majority of the committees decided to exclude me at an interview," said Yee, referring to a two-thirds majority vote that barred him from attending an interview with an anonymous student.

"I felt they were denying me my rights as a member of the committee and denying my rights as the chairperson," Yee told the Picaro, "I could not sign a document where I did not hear the evidence live, one-onone answering and asking questions off the cuff."

The committee, set up to investigate the irregularities of the Spring 1996 elections, comprising a three-member board that included Yee, vice chair Nichol Dakin and member Kathy Young. Dakin, who replaced Yee as committee chair after his resignation, explained that when the committee came together all they had for information was hearsay, so an important piece of information, such as a testimony, could not be ignored. The anonymous person was known by Kathy Young, and would only be interviewed on the condition that it be conducted by the two members of the committee not returning to university in the fall; that being Dakin and Young.

"Because Gin is on the

council this year," Dakin explained, "this anonymous person is returning to school and didn't want to be interviewed by the committee." Dakin stated that although some alternatives had been discussed by the committee on how to conduct the interview fairly, "in the end, of course, the majority won."

The majority vote prompted Yee to resign from the committee as he outlined in a *continued on pg. 3*



Fire Damages Evaristus Roof - Delays Moves.

The Mount suffered its second roof fire in the past twelve months on August 5.


A large section of the roof of Evaristus Hall burned after workers doing renovations had left for the day. The fire was visible from the Burnside area of Dartmouth and was reported to the fire department by the Canadian Coast Guard on the Dartmouth side of Bedford Basin. At one point the smoke trail ran above the horizon of most of the north end of Halifax.

"The smoke was thick and sank down onto the ground like a thick fog" recounted one student who arrived on the seen shortly after the fire was reported, "It smelled like a real good scout fire."

No injuries resulted from the fire which damaged approximately 25 per cent of the southern portion of the roof. Paul Rhyno, head of Physical Plant at the mount says luck intervened keeping damage to a minimum. "It was luck of the draw really. There was water damage to one room primarily on the fourth floor, but that room was under renovation."


Some paper damage occurred in the attic area with soot damage on the exterior of the building.

A preliminary report on the fire from the Halifax regional fire inspector points to a short with an extension cord as the probable cause. "That's



preliminary. We have not received a final report on the cause" says Rhyno.

Meanwhile renovations to Evaristus Hall are almost back on schedule. Some concern has been expressed by students about the delays caused by the fire. The registrars office which is to move into an area affected by the fire will now move in late September, one of the busiest times for students and the registrars. However, Rhyno is optimistic, "Right now we're almost even again. It was about a one week delay." Last December, fire damaged the roof of Rosaria Centre which was under renovation. The cause of that fire was a welding torch on a copper pipe.

a July 10, 1996-memorandum to the Student Council. "We were disappointed that he left the committee," Dakin said, "because, of course, he spearheaded it and gathered all us up and got us going."

Dakin confirmed that the anonymous person was the same one who had testified against Andrew Clattenburg during his disqualification last March. However, when asked about the subject of the interview, Dakin had declined to comment.

As for Yee, he remained very skeptical of the elections process at the Mount. "It's garbage," he said referring to the elections act, "It should be written like 'be it resolved that...' in proper language. As it stands now it's wide open to an individual's interpretation."

SteP forward mystery person # 2.



Yee's replacement was present for the interview, and will be on campus


Sheri Moore : President

Aside from learning about her new position as Student Union President, she has been serving on a committee about Debt Management for students, and serving as Vice President of the Student Union of Nova Scotia (SUNS). She's also been doing some of the duties of the Vice Presidents that are out of town for the summer.

When the school year starts, however, Sheri's main duty is to be a spokesperson for the Student Union, and for the University in general. She says that the students should know that she represents them. "Their issues are the issues of the Presidem" she says. She also wants to know that she is not alone in making decisions. low as four or sixcheap entertain- no cost, assum-ing you bring cheap for an entire ment is the only them back on evening's entertainment!



After a long wait of three years, fans of Toni Braxton have earned a fine reward - Toni's album <u>Secrets</u>, the follow-up to her popular self-titled debut, has been released and has singles racing up the charts. It won't be surprising if <u>Secrets</u> does better for Toni than her debut album did it seems as though there is at least one song on the album to convey the mood of every person who is in love or wants to be.

Whereas Toni's selftitled debut had a basically even mix of fast and slow songs, <u>Secrets</u> only contains one - the mega-hot single "You're Makin Me High". Music lovers who purchase this album expecting more than one fast song will therefore be misled, but Toni certainly compensates for it. Songwriter Singer and Babyface, who contributed heavily on Toni's first album, has either written or co-written seven of the twelve songs on Secrets. Toni has, however, gotten the support of a few outsiders; Tony Rich, the lead singer of The Tony Rich Project, did the music and cowrote the lyrics for the album's first song, "Come On Over Here". Toni Braxton herself is even credited for writing the lyrics to the song "Talking In His Sleep", which, undoubtedly, is the most humorous song on the album, but not in a Weird Al fashion. Other contributors to the album include R. Kelly, and Diane Warren, whose songs have been turned into chart-toppers by Bonnie Raitt and Celine Dion, among others.

Toni's rich voice and pitch range are certainly put to good use on this album. The song written by Diane Warren, "Un-break My Heart", exemplifies the soul that Toni sings with. It almost sounds as though the song is bringing her to tears as she is singing it. The song "Let it Flow", featured on the <u>Waiting to Exhale</u> soundtrack, is also another tune in which Toni's expression shines through. In fact, it could be argued that all of her songs have personalities all of their own. Unfortunately, many songs these days sound as though they are part of a big cloning factory, but not the ones found on <u>Secrets</u>. Toni has the skill of making unique songs filled with true emotion down to a "T".

To the many people who think that Everything But The Girl's first single was "Missing", you all stand corrected. Everything But The Girl, the duo of Ben Watts and Tracey Thorn, has been churning out albums since 1984. Their earlier videos show lead singer Tracey with unflattering radically spiked hair. It seems as though EBTG has been expressing themselves not only through their songs but their hairstyles over the past decade and a bit.

Some Canadians, and many Americans, think that North America rules the world's music industry. Everything But The Girl proves all of them Their new album wrong. Walking Wounded, is a blend of tunes that are unparallel to any American or Canadian band. Frontline Assembly, from British Columbia and on Nettwerk Records, comes the closest. Even then Frontline Assembly doesn't have a female lead singer with a powerful voice and strong lyrics like Everything But The Girl does.

The songs on <u>Walking</u> <u>Wounded</u> sound as though they reflect the emotions of Ben and Tracey. There is only one song that includes music by someone outside of the duo. There is a melancholy present in most songs, but some of the lyrics deviate from it, such as those of the song "Big Deal": "You spend four nights a week looking for your inner child / What you gonna say when you find him? / Suppose you don't like him or he doesn't like you? / Suppose once you wake him up he won't go back to bed and wants to stay up late watching t.v.?". Underneath all of the lyrics is a sturdy, though somewhat abnormal beat that gives the song what it needs.

Walking Wounded also features two remixes, one of the title song, and one of the song "Wrong", which is currently on the charts. 


