

Canadian International Relations

Recently, as a delegate from our school (MSVU), I attended The Canadian Political Science Student Association Conference (CPSSA) in Montreal. This year's theme was "Canadian Defense Policy in the Twentieth Century". It was an honor for me to not only represent The Mount, but Atlantic Canada as whole. I was the only delegate from Nova Scotia, which in my opinion, is not satisfactory. I believe other schools throughout the province should model what the Mount is doing to give Atlantic Canada a voice. This conference enabled students to share and compare opinions on what our country's role is on the International stage since September 11,


Some of the topics discussed at the conference focused on what part our military should play in the hours, days and months ahead in regards to current International issues. Should Canada invest more money in foreign aid, or military equipment? How much is enough? Should Canada stick to its traditional contributions involving the United Nations, or determine its foreign military role in terms of US policy?

The broad consensus among delegates attending the conference was that Canada should continue to support humanitarian interests rather than its economic concerns; however, in a country structured such as ours, the complexity of this consensus can be undermined by political and economic factors.

The dependency that is placed on Canada by the United States in terms of its geographic location and trade, unfortunately, according to political actors, cannot be ignored. Canada is now faced with the moral dilemma-Economics versus Universality. One in four jobs in Canada is affected by the U.S. and 80 percent of our population lives within 200 kilometers of the US border. What position are we going to take in the event of a war that has no direct pay off for the country, but may have serious long-term consequences on us and on the U.S.?

The United States is persistent that Canada should continue pumping money into its military. In my opinion, we need to reassess where we stand on such issues. Also, I believe that the US is looking for a bi-lateral agreement with Canada regarding military action because of its long-term reputation, and involvement, with the United Nations. The US spends more money on military equipment in a week then Canada does in a year, which in the past has been 2.6 percent of its GDP. Again, in my opinion, if Canada sent one person over seas it would be justification for the United States. So, as country are we willing to sacrifice lives over money? What do you think?

The annual CPSSA conference will be held at The University of Toronto next year, where the focus will be healthcare reform in Canada. I encourage people to attend and let our voices be heard.

As a student at the Mount, I have often heard my peers complain that there are few student run activities on campus, and those that exist are uninteresting and suffer from low participation. This year, as President of the Canadian Studies Society, I wanted to make sure that we had many activities for students to take part in. The society agreed that these activities should benefit individual students as well as the community at large. After attending a few Society Presidents' meetings, I learned that many other societies were on the same wave length.

Aside from the regular social events like pub crawls, bar creeps, movie nights, downtown socials and various types of sales, MSVU societies have brought in guest speakers from outside the Mount, organized gala fundraisers and have volunteered and raised money for many worthy causes.

In terms of charitable activities, MSVU societies are #1!

- -Spurred by the Canadian Studies Society challenge, the Mount community raised \$500 and over 1000 food items for the Metro Food Bank Society in December.
- -As well, the Child and Youth Studies Society and the Psychology Society both raised enough money to each adopt a family in the Metro Food Bank's adopt-a-family program.

-Throughout the year, the Business and Tourism Society has supported the Metro Food Bank Society, Phoenix Clothing House, Christmas Daddies and the Red Cross

-When the House for Habitat for Humanity was broken into earlier this year, the Science Society held an informal fundraiser to help out. During the Christmas season, the Science Society also took part in a Toy Drive.

-To mark Caritas Day, the Canadian Studies Society sent out volunteers to sort food at the Metro Food Bank, sort through donations at Hope Cottage, and take inventory of kitchen supplies at Phoenix Youth Shelter.

-The Residence Society held their annual Residence Charity Ball earlier this year which raised funds for Phoenix House.

-For the first time ever, the Child and Youth Studies Society will be hosting "The Program for Children with Autism Gala" on Friday, March 28th, 2003. Proceeds will be going to the program for children with Autism, here at the Mount.

-The Business and Tourism Society will be holding their 29th Annual Business and Tourism Dinner at the Delta Halifax on Wednesday, March 26. His Worship, Mayor Peter Kelly will be the guest speaker.

So, you say, MSVU societies are great at helping the community, but what about the academic side of things? What are they doing to promote higher learning? Well, I will tell you.

-The Canadian Studies Society hosted two lecture teas attended by over 30 past and present students. The guest speaker in the fall was none other than the Mount's Dr. Jane Gordon. Her lecture "Women of Note" was an intriguing way to teach students about Canadian female composers.

-At the spring tea, Mount alumnus Monica Stoilov, Andrew MacNeil and Stefanie David discussed their challenges and successes as local teachers, teaching Canadian content to the children in their elementary and high school classes.

-The Psychology Society, on occasions, has hosted many brown bag lunches featuring psychologists across HRM as speakers. Their most recent guest speaker was Dr. Ruth Carter, who conducts psychological assessments of children and youth for the IWK, Children's Aid and the courts.

-The History Society invited a group of high school students from Germany and Holocaust survivors to talk about how the Holocaust has affected the small town they live in.

-The International Students Society was

instrumental in promoting a very successful International Fair in March.

Societies like the Canadian Studies Society, History Society, English Society and Science Society also provide services such as proof reading essays, tutoring, advising course selection and library resources.

This, I'm sure, is just the tip of the iceberg. The point is that MSVU student societies have a lot going on and are doing their part to help the community around them. Many society presidents have commented on how their society helps bring a sense of camaraderie to each individual department.

Society corners and offices help to give students places to gather and share in some of the best aspects of university life.

For everyone who says societies do not do interesting things, I hope I have helped debunk the myth. One need only to look around - check out the individual society bulletin boards, Jargon's Society Page or society newsletters.

On a final note, and since this is the last edition of Jargon for the year, I would like to say thank you to all the staff of the newspaper for creating a vehicle for all students to become connected to one another.

Mystic volleyballers slug it out at ACAA playoffs

Packed gym, music blaring, players yelling, and balls bouncing. Many of you are probably thinking what I just described is a basketball game. But no...you would be wrong. It is Mount Saint Vincent University's other kind of ball team in action, the women's volleyball team.

March 1 and 2, Atlantic College Athletic Association (ACAA) men's and women's volleyball playoffs were held at St. Thomas University in Fredericton, New Brunswick. Your very own Mystics made the trip hoping to knock off the competition on the way to the ACAA women's volleyball title.

The feeling among the team heading into playoffs was optimistic, and why not? ACAA 1st team all-star Joni Hirtle was dishing out the assists from the setter position, while twin tower middles Devon Day and Carolyn Carter were shutting down opposing hitters with their gargantuan blocks. Kelly Savary and Lori Matheson were denting the floor with their bombs from the left side of the court, while graduating right side Kristen Middleton, with her feisty red-headed attitude, was showcasing an all around game. Bringing experience, passing, athleticism and encouragement to the court were Andrea Daniels, Chelsea Whitehead, Robyn Thomas and Natalie Masluk. From the bench, assistant coach and former Mystic Kate Morrison provided (depending on the situation) some fire or

general hilarity, while first year head coach Susanne Dittmer was the calming voice of wisdom.

After a successful 12-4 season, MSVU were seeded third for the playoff weekend. Looking to get to the final for a shot at last year's champion St. Thomas Tommies, our Mystics had to first get through the second seeded Universite Ste. Anne Dragons. Considering the Dragons' stand out defence and smooth offence, no easy task.

The positive energy was flowing for the Mystics Saturday morning show down. Adorned in stickers and mean looking fake tattoos, the girls got out to a fantastic start. MSVU's accurate passing allowed Hirtle to give all of her hitters clean looks with her consistent sets. Each time Ste. Anne's would try to close the point gap, MSVU would respond with a thunderous block, diving dig or booming attack. They left the mistake-prone Dragons in confusion, taking the first set 25-15.

Before the second set Dittmer warned her squad not to expect their opponents to make the same mistakes twice. The head coach's words came back to haunt her team as Ste. Anne's came out with fire in their eyes, looking to even up the best of five semi-final. Limiting their mistakes and relying on their superb defence, the Dragons took the second set 25-20.

The Mystics had a sense of urgency starting the third set, sensing that their shot at playing in Sundays final was slipping away. The score was extremely close as the lead switched back and forth. While MSVU would put together a run of well-played points, only to make a string of errors, Ste. Anne's was the model of consistency. MSVU was not able to convert on their opportunities while Ste. Anne's caught the Mystics off guard with their tipping attack. The Dragons took the third set 25-20, putting them in the driver's seat 2-1.

The lady Mystics were determined heading into the fourth set. It was do or die time. Dittmer calmed her team down, stressing the importance of a good first pass and consistency on offence. MSVU took the floor intent on evening up the game at two sets a piece. The play in the first half of the set went just as Dittmer instructed. By limiting their own mistakes, the Mystics forced the play to the Dragons. The teams blasted the ball back and forth, fighting tooth and nail for every point. With Ste. Anne's ahead 22-21 and the gap closing, Dittmer called her last timeout to give her troops a breather and a chance to focus. Unfortunately it was not to be for our squad. An errant pass and an attacking error pushed the score to 24-21, and a strong attack from Ste. Anne's finished the game.

The intense three sets to one match was the

only semi-final to go more than the minimum three games.

With many of her players fighting back tears in their post game meeting, coach Dittmer stressed that they had played an excellent game, and even though they had lost, they had made Ste. Anne's earn every one of their points. Many of the players spoke of the advances the team made in their game to even get to the conference semi-final. Hirtle said that the entire team added to their game. "All of us improved in some way, whether it was our technical skill or mental toughness." Hirtle added that the mental improvement was very important. "Our mental game was subject to steep up and downs, but it was less of a rollercoaster this year. We were able o fight through close games at the end, and we were better at maintaining an even level of confidence throughout a match."

So next year when you are sitting at home or bored in residence, get off your duff, make your way down to the gym and take in a women's volleyball match. Here are a few reasons why: volleyball is a fast-paced and intense sport, it IS cool to support your school (no, really), and these ladies can flat out play.

That's My Bush By Francis Mullins

A few hours ago I was watching the unelected President of the United States give a press conference. He looked a bit stiff, nervous perhaps without a teleprompter to keep him from saying something that hadn't been pre-approved by John, Dick or Rumsfeld. Unlike many past presidents, George is not known for his rhetorical abilities, leading to allegations that he is a functional illiterate, but I believe those charges to be unfounded. After all, he was reading the reporter's names off the list in front of him just fine during the press conference, sometimes so fast that he wasn't even looking at the questioner he was calling on. I don't think the questions were pre-approved, because Bush completely failed to answer any of the questions he was asked. But the reporters at the White House know the drill by now: if you ask a hard question of the President, it will be your last. This certainly factored into his decision not to call on Helen Thomas, who has been asking questions at Presidential press conferences since 1960. She is 80 now, and openly critical of Bush's White House, but what's a 43 year tradition when you've got a war to fight to ensure peace?

Did I need any more confirmation that this man is not fit to be the Chief Executive of such a monstrously powerful country? I've been holding out hope for the remote possibility that he is actually much shrewder than everyone expects, that he plays the buffoon so he can act like he doesn't know any better, then everybody will be real scared and want to stay outta his way. Does he have Sun Tsu in mind, "The supreme Art of war is to win without fighting," and he is using a supreme show of force to make Saddam crap his pants and disarm. Then the United States not only doesn't invade, but pulls their troops out of the 2/3 of Iraq they already occupy, and Saudi Arabia to boot, and then arranges for the UN to oversee democratization of Iraq. Sadly, those kinds of crazy the-world-isnot-going-to-hell-in-a-handbasket fantasies have no place in objective journalism. The news is about facts, hastily checked and poorly authenticated facts to be sure, but facts nonetheless.

This article may seem anti-American, but listen to what the Bush White House has done to Americans to see who's anti what. In just his first year in power, Bush managed to pull out of the Kyoto Protocol and has done nothing to regulate carbon dioxide emissions, turned down international efforts to enforce the 1972 treaty banning germ warfare, cut \$700 million for repairs to public housing, cut half a billion dollars from the Environmental Protection Agency, cut funding for research into fuel efficient cars, has pushed oil and gas development in environmentally protected areas in Montana, Florida and Alaska, passed a tax cut, 43% of which goes to the top 1% of Americans, violated the Comprehensive Test Ban Treaty by developing new nuclear weapons, cut funding to Boys and Girls Clubs in public housing, gave 1/30th of the funding requested to the Justice Department for suing tobacco companies, and on and on. That's a short list of what he was up to before 9/11. Since then he's gotten worse.

From what I've heard, most Canadians hate Bush, and it's translating into a not-so-veiled irritation with Americans in general. It all started when he first got into office, and invited the President of Mexico to the White House before Canada's PM, the traditional first head of state to visit the reigning Prez. Then, of course, there was the time Bush gave in to U.S. lumber manufacturers, after they had been lobbying for twenty years, and imposed a duty on Canadian softwood lumber entering the United States, without going to arbitration through the World Trade Organization or through NAFTA. The first big slap in the face, however, was at his first speech to the world after September 11. What Canadian can forget when he said "Nor will we forget the citizens of 80 other nations who died with our own: dozens of Pakistanis; more than 130 Israelis; more than 250 citizens of India; men and women from El Salvador, Iran, Mexico and Japan: and hundreds of British citizens. America has no truer friend than Great Britain." Not only did we get beat out of best friend status by Britain, we didn't even get mentioned!

Well, at least we are not alone. He pulled the same tariff stunt with the US steel industry, putting 30% tariffs on certain grades of steel that happen to be produced in West Virginia, Ohio and Pennsylvania. West Virginia was a key state in the last election. The United States imports at least 2 million tonnes of steel from each of Japan, South Korea, South America, the European Union, and the countries of the former USSR. Twenty million tonnes of imported steel a year, and a whole whackload of countries losing jobs so outmoded steel mills in the US wont go bankrupt. Apparently Bush would rather take shots at the entire industrialized world than face the downside of free trade, but it was a curiously shortsighted strategy as his administration scrambles to find allies for an invasion of Iraq. I guess Bush never figured out that bullies don't have friends for a reason.

And what the hell was he thinking when he lumped North Korea, Iran and Iraq together as an Axis of Evil, before he began to relentlessly pursue an attack on Iraq? You want to know why North Korea has started developing nuclear weapons again, and the means to deliver them to North America? Because the Administration has made it perfectly clear that if you are a member of "The Axis of Evil" then you will be attacked. It's plenty ironic that the U.S. is going to attack a country without any known weapons of mass destruction to "disarm" them, while a country that admits it has nuclear weapons and will use them is studiously ignored. So what is a Bush good for? Hiding behind. Bush doesn't have the vision or the competency to function as a world leader, so he relies heavily on his backup. Vice President Dick Cheney was defense secretary under the previous President Bush during the first Gulf War, not to mention previous stints in the Nixon and Ford administrations. He was also CEO of the oil company Haliburton before becoming Vice President, which had dealings with (surprise!) Iraq and other repressive governments. Don Rumsfeld is Secretary of Defense, and has been hangin' with the Republicans since Nixon was Prez. This is the fellow that has pushed crackpot schemes like "Star Wars" missile defense, the development of which has violated arms control treaties that were designed to limit the proliferation of nuclear weapons.

What do these two fellows have in common? Well, they both avoided combat service during the Vietnam War, they both have a vested corporate interest in reshaping the flows of power in the Middle East, and they both keep reminding Bush not to speak before he is told what to say.

The world has become a much scarier place since late 2000, when Bush supporters managed to stage a coup and steal the Presidency from the winner, Al Gore. I'm not scared of terrorists, far less than getting in a car accident at least. But I am scared of what a C student can do when he is in charge of a military force as big as the next 8 biggest military spenders in the world. I'm scared what can happen when a third-rate President only remains in power because of the support of the most conser-

vative, reactionary, warmongering and greedy sectors of society. I'm scared of what will happen if the U.S. stops paying attention to the United Nations and only listens to what it wants to hear. And I hold out hope that someday soon, the U.S. economy will deteriorate from their \$350 billion+military budget and the horrendous exploitation of natural resources will halt, so that the world won't die in 50 years.

There is an incredible amount of information available on the shenanigans of Bush and his backup team on the net, the kind of information that wasn't widely available until late in the Vietnam War. There's also some incredibly funny stuff too.

Chomsky cuts to the heart of the matter

Noam Chomsky sits down for a conversation about the upcoming war in Iraq, the United States' foreign policy, the history of international terrorism and the future of the Middle East

MONTRÉAL (CUP)—Noam Chomsky, MIT linguistics professor and outspoken critic of US foreign policy, has authored dozens of works pertaining to political radicalism, media control, American military interventions and state terrorism. His most recent book, 9-11, was an international bestseller and provoked much debate about American responsibility for the World Trade Centre attacks in September, 2001. On November 8, Faiz Ahmad and Omar Badawi sat down with Chomsky to discuss the impending threat

of war against Iraq.

CUP: Do the US and the rest of the world have a responsibility to change the regime in Iraq? Do they even have a right to do so?

No one has a right, and if you don't have a right you don't have a responsibility. Undoubtedly, there are plenty of regimes that need to be changed, and Saddam Hussein's is one. But there's a long list. For example, let's take the United States—a great deal of the world regards the US as "a menace to itself and the world." I'm

quoting a senior member of the Carnegie Foundation writing in a mainstream British newspaper.


Incidentally, there's nothing new about regime change. That's an old, old policy. Just last October there was a commemoration of the Cuban missile crisis—Arthur Schlesinger, who attended the high level meetings in Havana, pointed out accurately that it was the most dangerous moment in the history of the world. And where did it come from? It grew out of an effort at regime change. The US was committed to overthrowing the Cuban government, first by terrorism—when that didn't work, they

tried by invasion, and when that didn't work, there was even more terrorism, which led up to the missile crisis and practically destroyed the world. That's a dramatic case, but there are many others like it. Efforts at regime change are an old story.

CUP: Many believe that, regardless of US motives or methods for removing Saddam Hussein from power, the world and the people of Iraq will be better off without him, often pointing to the Taliban in Afghanistan as an example. The argument, therefore, is that military action is justified.

First of all, the war aim in Afghanistan was not to overthrow the Taliban. That was an afterthought. There were people who were very much committed to overthrowing the Taliban—Afghans like Abdul Haq, one of the most respected Afghan leaders, whose position was that the US was bombing the country in order to show its muscle and to scare the world, not to overthrow the Taliban. Getting rid of the Taliban was a goal added three weeks later, when the war was almost over.

Would the world and the people of Iraq be better off without Saddam Hussein? Absolutely. But you can go down-a list from A to Z and pick out a lot of countries for which that's true. Does the US have any special right to intervene? Of course not. In fact, if anyone believed Bush's arguments and the arguments of the prowar people, there's a very simple way to overthrow Saddam Hussein which has many advantages to the current plan-help Iran invade. Terrific. The Iranians will tear Saddam Hussein to shreds, they'll kill anyone who's anywhere near him, they'll destroy all the weapons of mass destruction, they'll make sure that no successor ever develops any weapons of mass destruction—a great contribution to disarmament. There'll be people on the streets of Basra and Karbala cheering as the Iranian liberators come in, there won't be any problems with the UN, there won't be any US casualties, there won't be any Israeli casualties, it's just perfect. So why isn't anyone talking about it?

There are two downsides to this proposal: it doesn't leave the US in control of the second-largest oil reserves in the world, and it doesn't get Bush out of his immediate domestic problem, which is how to terrify the country into submission while he pursues a domestic agenda that's extremely harmful to most of the population—which, incidentally, is an immediate problem. That's why they have to invade this winter and not next winter.

The problem with next winter is that it's in the middle of a presidential campaign. By then you have to have had the victory behind you, so that the brave cowboy can be praised for saving us from disaster. The timing is purely domestic. The long term goals are something that everyone has known for years. The people that are running the show in Washington now are all supporters of Saddam Hussein—they supported him through his worst atrocities.

CUP: What would you see a just policy toward Iraq entailing?

I think that weapons inspectors should go back. The US has been trying very hard to prevent weapons inspectors from going back, because they want to go to war.

Remember what Resolution 687 says—that the disarmament of Iraq should be part of a general program of reduction of armaments and delivery systems throughout the region. That makes very good sense.

The US wants to go in exactly the opposite direction. But if you think that anybody has the right or the responsibility to overthrow Iraq, there's the obvious example of Iran. They're the victims, they have the means, they can be trusted far more than the United States. After all, 60 per cent of the population is Shiite, not necessarily pro-Iranian but at least much more positive toward Iran than toward the US. Iran would be much more successful in installing democracy—they can give a voice to a lot of the population, which the US probably can't. It's an insane proposal, but it makes much more sense than the actual proposal if we take the reasons seriously.

CUP: Mr Negroponte, the US ambassador to the UN, has stressed that the US is committed to allowing weapons inspectors to go forward. Addressing the fears of war-weary members of the Security Council, he called the last draft resolution put forth by the US "the best way to achieve the disarmament of Iraq by peaceful means." What do you think of his assessment?

He knows perfectly well that it's the worst way. The Bush administration has stated explicitly that they are interpreting the resolution as an authorisation to go to war. That undermines the likelihood that Iraq will agree to inspections—that's pretty obvious. Conditions have been imposed which allow the United States to do what it wants-conditions which were carefully written into the draft, such that the United States at any point can say, well, you didn't meet the conditions, so we bomb you. So if at four o'clock in the morning an inspector shows up at a presidential palace and he isn't given the keys in five minutes, the US can say 'Okay, you're in material breach, therefore we bomb tomorrow.' In fact, they can say anything they

want. This resolution is simply a way for the countries of the world not to have to face the wrath of the United States. They're terrified of the United States, for pretty good reasons.

CUP: It seemed initially that there was some resistance on the part of France, Russia, and the other permanent members of the UN Security Council. But recently they seem to be acquiescing to American demands

Frankly, they're not going to stand up to the US. No one is. The entire world—including Middle Eastern nations like Iran

and Kuwait, the main victims of Saddam while he was a US ally—resists the idea of war. They all hate Saddam, they'd love to get rid of him, but they realise that, as horrible as he is, he can't hurt anyone outside his narrow reach. The only people afraid of the mushroom cloud are in the United States. But which country is going to want to prejudice its relations with the United States over something they know the United States is going to do anyway? Particularly when the US has been making clear all along that they don't need a resolution?

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

In fact, the US has said very explicitly that the UN is only relevant if it grants Washington the same authorisation that Congress did. Everyone on the Security Council knows that, including France, Russia and China. If the US is going to do it anyway, there's no reason to oppose them. This is what the UN calls the Yemen effect—it has to do with Yemen's refusal in the Security Council in 1990 to go along with the Gulf War, at which point they immediately had all aid cut and all sorts of impositions imposed on them by the US—other countries don't want to live with that.

CUP: So then what is the relevance of the Security Council and UN in world affairs today?

Zero. The US has made it clear that their relevance is zero. When you say at high levels, "you are relevant if you let us do what we want to do, and you're irrelevant otherwise," then the answer is that they're irrelevant.

Incidentally, that's nothing new. Go back

30 years, for example: the big issue of the day was the US war in Indochina. Every country at the UN was basically opposed to it, except for maybe England and Canada. But did that ever come up? No, there was no resolution, no discussion. The reason was perfectly plain. Everyone understood that if the issue came up at the United Nations, that's the end of the United Nations.

A year or two ago there was some brief talk about how the criminal court in the former Yugoslavia might investigate NATO war crimes. That was dropped very fast. During that period an American congressman visiting Canada was asked by the National Post what would happen if someone looked into NATO crimes, and his answer was basically correct: that if that ever happened, the United Nations buildings in New York would be taken apart brick by brick and thrown into the Atlantic ocean.

CUP: How do you see military action against Iraq affecting the Palestinian-Israeli conflict? Ariel Sharon's representatives have said that Israel will wait until the US has dealt with Iraq before pursuing a political track with the Palestinians, and Binyamin Netanyahu has said that US assistant secretary of state William Burns' roadmap for peace "is simply not on the agenda."


We don't know if the roadmap is on the agenda because we don't know what it is. In fact, we don't even know that it exists. There are plans about the Palestinians. The people near the centre of power, like Richard Pearl, Douglas Feith and, probably, [Donald] Rumsfeld have been talking about reorganising the Middle East for years. They have all kinds of far-reaching plans.

A war will be a complete disaster for the Palestinians. Sharon does have a plan for peace. Everyone has a plan for peace. Hitler had a plan for peace. The question is, what kind of peace? Sharon's peace involves some degree of autonomy and administration for Palestinian enclaves which Israel doesn't want to have to administer. Sharon's borders for Israel are much more expansive than Barak's were,

but the basic conception is the same.
Barak's chief negotiator at Camp David in 2000, Shlomo Ben Ami, has explained that the goal of the Oslo process from the beginning has been to establish a permanent neo-colonial dependency for the Palestinians—something on the order of South African bantustans.

In fact, the security officials in Israel have been playing close attention to South Africa's solution to the black problem 40 years ago. Establish black homelands, black police, black administration that control the population; white South Africans don't want to bother with that. And you can have some development dependent on white South Africa. That's a model that has been seriously considered in Israel. It's discussed very prominently in the Israeli press at high levels, and it was more or less the framework for the Camp David proposal. Sharon's roadmap is on that order except that he wants the Palestinian enclaves to be small.

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
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
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


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

CUP: Is the war on terrorism a manifestation of the "Frankenstein syndrome," meaning that the US is now having to protect itself from enemies that it itself has created?

That's happening, but let's be a little bit clearer. The war on terrorism was declared in 1981, by pretty much the exact same people who re-declared it after 9/11 and with the same rhetoric. The war on terrorism has been going on for 20 years.

Orwell would tell us that the war on terrorism is in fact a terrorist war. In the first phase in the war on terrorism led by Washington throughout the 1980s, the US carried out massive terrorist atrocities in Central America and the Middle East, Southern Africa and so on. That was the first phase in the war on terror. The second phase in the war on terror, which they redeclared on September 11, 2001, happened to be aimed at the organisations that you describe. The terrorists are now those recruited, trained, organised, and armed by the CIA and its associates in the 1980s, not to help the Afghans, but for reasons of state, power, the usual kinds. Around 1990 they turned against the US. In 1993, related groups came very close to blowing up the World Trade Centre. That was in 1993, not 2001.

Those groups happened to be organised by the West. You can say the same about plenty of others. Take Israel's main terrorist enemies-Hizbollah and Hamas. Where did they come from? The origins of Hamas lie, in part, with Israeli sponsorship of radical Islamist groups meant to undermine the secular Palestinian leadership. Hizbollah came out of a US-backed Israeli invasion of Lebanon 20 years ago, which killed about 20,000 and had no defensive purpose whatsoever. The end result is that it helped create Hizbollah.

Incidentally, terrorist acts are just a gift to the most hard-line oppressive elements. An increase in terrorism gives Sharon an opportunity to drive the Palestinians out, it gives the Russians an opportunity to clamp down in Chechnya and so on, throughout the world. It's very probable that the same thing is going on in Indonesia now.

What lay behind the Bali [nightclub] bombing is not yet clear, but chances are it was the group Jamat al Islamaya. And where did they come from? They're part of the Suharto dictatorship's effort, with the backing of the United States and Britain, to link up radical Islamists and the Indonesian military in order to carry out terrorist attrocities against their own populations. The big massacres in Bali, far worse than this one, were a collaboration between Islamist groups and the army.

CUP: As you said, it seems that a US invasion of Iraq is pretty much inevitable at this point. How much difference can popular resistance still make?


A huge difference. It's the only thing that can stop it. What prevented the US from carrying out saturation B-52 bombing of

Nicaragua in the 1980s? Popular resistance. Current resistance to the war in Iraq has no historical precedent, to my knowledge. I can't think of another case where there was such large-scale protest against a war before it even started. Protest over the Vietnam War only came after four or five years of smashing South Vietnam to dust.

There is unprecedented opposition right now-US policy analysts are keeping their eyes open to it, and if it grows even more, they'll be concerned. In fact, some of the high-level hawkish arguments against the war is that too much division will be created inside the US. That's a concern which even the worst mass murderers worry about. Hitler worried about it, which is part of the reason why the Germans didn't carry out a full national mobilisation the way the Allies did. They just didn't trust their population, which probably set back their war effort. No matter who you are, military dictator, mass murderer or democratic leader, you have to be concerned about popular opinion.



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Interview with Grand Theft Bus; Little Known Band that Could & Will

HM: If you had to describe your music

using three adjectives, what would they be?

Bob Deveau: Confused, real, and open.

HM: For anyone who has never heard of Grand Theft Bus, what should they know or expect?

Dennis Goodwin: Nudity, sexually explicit lyrics, some thrash metal and perverse parodies of Sharon, Lois, and Bram songs (just kidding). I don't really know how to answer that but I'm going to try. If you've never heard us before you should expect a real diverse repertoire of songs. Some are really bouncy and are three and half minutes long with a catchy melodic hook. HM: What is your favorite song on the album?


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Movie Reviews

Daredevil

Bowling for Columbine

The Pianist



Fitness and Nutrition

In writing this article I realize there is so much I could discuss when it comes to fitness and nutrition. It is an area full of theories, claims, scams, and fads. where a few of them actually work and most of them just waste your time and money It's a touchy topic that leads many to frustration and failed attempts at leading a healthier life. One way to solve this problem is to improve the benefits you get from your workouts.' Seeing the results of hard work will motivate you to continue and stick with it and hopefully it will become a regular part of a healthy lifestyle. Okay let's get straight to the chase and talk about some important rules to follow for how to get the most from your weekly workouts.

Rule #1 Do both cardio and weights.

Many females often restrict themselves to only doing cardiovascular training such as treadmills and stair climbers... Fortunately the benefits of strength training has caught on as reputable journals continue to prove the benefits of this training. Proper weight training builds lean muscle tissue that is metabolically active and as such raises one's metabolism even at rest. In the long term this means a leaner physique. Some women fear getting too bulky or big from lifting weights. Fortunately that concern does have much basis as they lack the significant testosterone concentrations needed to have such an effect. Usually it's only the steroid using women in bodybuilding that get such muscular physiques.

Weight training also stresses the bones making them stronger and less prone to osteoporosis later in life. Women especially have a heightened risk for this condition and regular weight training could dramatically decrease this risk.

Rule #2 Don't spend hours at the gym.

This is a common mistake by beginners and even by some more advanced trainers. Quality not quantity is definitely the key to getting the most from your workouts at the gym. Overextending yourself cannot only lead to sickness, but also limits the ability of your body to recover and get stronger from the previous workout. If your goals are more endurance oriented then maybe those hours will be well spent, but for the majority of people just 30-60 minutes, three to five times a week is all that is needed. Also give muscle groups a rest by breaking up your weight routine. Simply working a muscle over and over without adequate rest will just continually

break it down. When you work your muscle you break it down, damaging it until enough time, rest, and adequate nutrition allow it to be repaired. It is during rest that the muscle strengthening process actually occurs. Even when you have to budget your time a 15 minute workout at a higher intensity level can lead you to your fitness goals. When you spend well over 60 minutes at the gym you increase the likelihood your body will begin to secrete the stress hormone cortisol which is as beneficial to your training goals as those tequila shots your friends forced on you Friday night. Just "Don't" Do it!

Rule #3 Focus on the larger muscle groups.

Using compound exercises that stress the large muscle groups of the legs, back, and chest is a very effective way to minimize training time and improve training results while burning more calories. A compound exercise is one that uses more than one muscle group and in doing so uses more calories to perform. For the chest the best example would be the flat bench press which works the large pectoral (chest) muscles as well as the triceps and to a partial degree the biceps. The lat pulldown exercise effectively works the Latisimus dorsi (back) muscles as well as the biceps and shoulders. Squats are great as they work the quadriceps, hamstrings and glutes. A certified personal trainer is a good person to consult in effective exercises and proper exercise technique

Rule #4 You cannot, I repeat, you cannot, spot reduce.

Spot reducing is an out-dated concept that needs to be forgotten forever. You can do ab exercises till your face turn blue, you can squeeze those buns till it hurts, but no matter how much you work these muscles you cannot reduce the fatty tissue that lies above and around them simply by doing these exercises. Proper nutrition, regular cardio and full body weight training will in the longer term reduce body fat in such hard to tone areas such as the stomach, hips and butt. So instead of spending so much time doing those boring ab exercises try investing more of that energy into pumping some iron and doing your cardio.

Rule #5 Proper nutrition is half the battle.

Good results in the gym are further stimulated by good nutrition. Well there are some exceptions to this rule and we all begrudge those people, but for the most part what you eat correlates with the health of your body. Learn the benefits of a healthy diet by visiting websites such as the dietitians of Canada website. Always remember if anything sounds too good to be true it probably is. Eating healthy is not always easy and it is work especially in the beginning, but over time it will become much easier and enjoyable. Just give it a chance. Resources such as Canada's Food Guide to Healthy Eating is an excellent guide to follow and will provide you with the basics in healthy eating.

One very important rule to follow is to always have a post workout meal that contains some carbohydrate and some quality protein. Our exercised muscles work like a sponge to soak up any needed nutrients following the workout and research has shown timing is essential as there seems to be a two hour window where the body up regulates it's use of carbohydrates and protein. Carbohydrate and protein are needed to replace used muscle glycogen, promote protein synthesis helping the muscles recover from the workout and get stronger for the next. Often times over-training can be stimulated by not following the post workout rule limiting results in training. Nutrition research has shown a preferable 2:1 or 3:1 ratio of carbs to protein is best to stimulate faster recovery such as 30-60 grams of carbohydrate and 10-30 grams of protein. Good food sources for carbs include Fruit or even fruit juice, bread, cereal, or pasta. Protein sources such as milk, yogurt, cheese, whey, or meat are good bets and the benefit of a post workout health shake is enhanced by the fact that a liquid meal is easier and faster to digest and absorb. Get it into your body right after your workout and remember the sooner the better. Check out the post workout shake ideas below...

Poor Student Recovery Drink

2 cups milk with 4 Tblsp white sugar mixed in with a spoon, providing approximately 24 grams of protein and 48 grams of carbohydrate. This gives you your 2:1 carb to protein mix. Any other time of day you would want to avoid excess sugar and products that contain it, but after a workout the body prefers it's easily absorbable nature. It's also nice to note that calories consumed after your workout are less likely to be stored as fat as the body is busy using them for recovery and as well your metabolism is increased for a few hours.

Rich Student Recovery Drink

1 cup milk + 1 cup water + 20g

whey protein + 2 Tblsp white sugar + 1 banana. Whey protein is simply the highest quality protein available and can definitely give your recovery a boost.

Nutritional needs of Women.

Women have some special nutritional needs that need to be considered. First of all, because of menstrual loses women need more iron than men do. This makes them more vulnerable to iron deficiency and at the extreme end of this condition leads to iron deficiency anemia. Some signs of anemia include easy fatigue, loss of color, and inability to pay attentiondefinitely not what you want to face along with a tough school semester. This condition may also occur more often in strict vegetarians as they avoid the highly absorbable heme iron found only in meat, poultry, and fish. Nonheme iron is found in plant sources and isn't as well absorbed, but eating foods rich in vitamin C along with nonheme iron can dramatically increase its absorption. Good plant sources of iron include spinach, beans, tofu, and enriched cereal. Men should aim for 10 mg daily while women should get around 15

Calcium is a well-known nutrient that is constantly promoted to keep bones healthy and strong while preventing osteoporosis later in life. Women are more prone to osteoporosis, which is a disease in which the bones become brittle and fragile. Although osteoporosis does indeed inflict men it is much more common in women. Making sure you get sufficient calcium throughout your bone building years, which slows after age 26 years of age or so will pay off as you get older. Good sources include milk, cheese, yogurt, and broccoli. Both men and women should try to get in around 1000-1500mg daily. It is important to note that supplements of minerals such as these are not always a good idea. Minerals interact in the body and too much of one can cause a deficiency in another. For example, large amounts of Calcium have been shown to interfere with iron, so someone taking regular large doses of calcium from supplements and diet could theoretically increase their risk of iron deficiency. Judicious use of supplements can serve a purpose in certain circumstances, but the benefits of a healthy diet are enormous and complex, still not fully unraveled by science with much more to learn.

Last fall one of the larger stories in gay news was the coming out of former NFL defensive lineman Esera Tuaolo. This is old news now, and it is not like this story shocked the world. 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

When Tuaolo came out there were lots of questions being asked of his former teammates; most of the answers that made the news were negative responses. I phrase it that way because there are likely a lot of positive comments that didn't make the news, and again after the initial media storms we go back to the way things were.

Why is it that pro athletes, particularly male ones are afraid of having a gay teammate? I think most would be offended that I use the word afraid, but it is the truth. It is not that they are afraid of the individual, it would be that they are afraid of the gay man playing the sport.

Many heterosexual men perceive gay men to be weaker, and to have one playing at the same level as heterosexual men takes away from this perception. Ideas of masculinity are key factors here. Former Mount professor Blye Frank wrote an interesting article which sheds a little light on what heterosexual men think it means to be masculine. He surveyed a group of teenage boys and some of their responses ring very true. The essay is entitled "Straight/Strait Jackets for Masculinity: Educating for Real Men", and that is what much of the following information comes from.

In "Straight/Strait Jackets for Masculinity" one of the youths Frank interviewed, Mike, gave this interesting response "sports is probably the biggest thing to prove you're a real man, besides not being a fag". What is not being a fag? There is no answer to that question, but that is a good point. Sports are for real men, whatever real men are. There is a quote from another youth, Evan, which is interesting. Evan says "Men act in ways that produce masculinity. That's what sports is about. That's what fighting's about. That's what having a girlfriend or having a good body is about. Those are things that gain you authority, power...over other men and women". That quote points out the issue of power and masculinity, masculinity is often associated with strength and power.

Anyway I'll get back to the issue at hand. Coming out is a trial for any homosexual, even if the end result is positive. For someone in the public eye I do not doubt that coming out is all the more difficult. There are a number of notable athletes who have come out, former NFL running back David Kopay even wrote a book about his life as a football player, and coming out after his retirement. Canadian Olympic medallist swimmer Mark Tewksbury, Olympic diver Greg Louganis, and figure skaters Brian Orser and Rudy

Galindo came out as well. Aside from the aforementioned tennis stars on the female side there is Missy Giove, a mountain biker who is considered the Michael Jordan of her sport. I also recently read an article about a college skier who came out to his classmates and fellow skiers. Please pardon the name dropping in the paragraph, and I have more names I could put in here but I had better move on to a new point.

Accused of being gay, ouch!

There have been a number of cases over the past few years. The most recent cases have gotten a little more media attention than prior cases like Troy Aikman, or the Canadian Women's hockey team. Last year "Out" magazine did a supposed interview with a gay major league baseball player who is still playing. There was a great deal of speculation that the player was Mike Piazza of the New York Mets. Piazza in my opinion is heterosexual, and he did not seem to mind the insinuation that he was gay and that he thinks baseball is indeed ready for an out player. Some other situations have not been as kind.

For instance at the moment there is a little controversy over former major league pitcher, and hall of famer Sandy Koufax who has been rumoured to be gay. This has been denied adamantly and has left many people wondering why he or his spokespeople are offended enough to threaten a lawsuit.

I wonder what the offence in being called gay is. It is true that it isn't nice to be called something that you are not, but being called gay shouldn't be the end of the world. Should someone take offence to being called gay it probably relates to a seizing of power away from that individual. In most circles homosexuals are still seen as being less significant, or holding less power than heterosexuals, and that goes for men and women. I do not wish to deal too much with issues of power, because that is a large topic but it is something that needs to be considered here.

For athletes who come out their main fears are being ostracized and potentially becoming targets for other players. In a sport like football for example, where the game is rough and physical it may even be dangerous for an athlete to come out of the closet. This is one of the reasons why I personally don't think an athlete in that

type of sport should come out while still playing. But on the other hand, perhaps I should give pro athletes the benefit of the doubt. I have no doubt that if someone were to come out while being an active player there would be issues. But the other players and the league would adjust eventually to accept this reality.

It has often been rumoured that many gay athletes play pro sports, and there is a silent understanding between their teammates and management that they are gay; it is simply not made public. Yes I do have a long list of pro athletes, who could be gay, but I gain nothing and you gain nothing if I put them all in this article. People in general seem to be growing along with society in terms of tolerance of not only homosexuals, but of all groups. Not to say there isn't a great deal of intolerance in the world, but I would like to think we are getting better.


Why do we care?

I hope Marshall McLuhan will forgive me for bastardizing his quotation. Television is the best place to find homosexual characters in prominent roles. Whether or not we believe these characters further acceptance of homosexuals or hinder it to perpetuating stereotypes is an ongoing debate. Now on television we have the show Queer as Folk, which was at first a show in Britain and is one of the first, if not the first shows to focus on gay characters. It is probably a fair concern; Hollywood has been known to shun people for lesser reasons.

I must reiterate that most homosexuals just want to be treated as equals, and not treated differently due to sexual orientation.

Slippin it on

Okay well condoms do not get slipped on per say, but due to a computer snafu this is the second time that I have written this article so I reserve the right to poke fun at my title. Oh poke, that's funny. It came to my attention recently that there had been a major announcement concerning the use of Nonoxynol-9 for condoms and lubricants. Nonoxynol-9 is a widely used spermicide which has actually been on the market for about fifty years, and began being added to the lubricant on condoms in the mid 80's.

There has been a calling made by many leading scientists and health groups for condom and lubricant manufacturers to voluntarily remove Nonoxynol-9 from their products. The fear is focused on these condoms or lubricants being used in anal sex. Vaginal intercourse is still considered safe with the use of condoms with N-9 lubricants.

Early research on Nonoxynol-9 had

showed that it might aid in the prevention of HIV infections. Recent research has proven this belief to be false. The new research has indicated that use of Nonoxynol-9 rectally may increase the risk for HIV or STD infection. The research found that even a small amount of N-9 can weaken the cell lining of the rectum, potentially increasing the risk of HIV infection. Nonoxynol-9 although being an effective spermicide, offers little pregnancy protection if the condom breaks and offers no extra disease control. This is why many manufacturers of condoms and lubricants are voluntarily removing Nonoxynol-9 from their products.

This call came back in September and I honestly hadn't heard about it until a couple of weeks ago. I also had never heard that Nonoxynol-9 could reduce the risk of HIV infection. I was always under the impression that for anal sex there would be no reason to use a condom with a spermicidal lubricant, or a lubricated condom at

all considering how much extra lubrication is needed for anal sex. For anal sex a non-lubricated condom is best. All of the major condom manufacturers make non-lubricated condoms. Remember that lubrication is essential for anal sex, and finding the personal lubricant that is right for you is also important. You may remember that in a previous issue I discussed condoms and lubricants. As Sue Johanson says "lots and lots of lubrication", that is the key for comfortable anal sex. Well that and being mentally prepared for it that is. Remember not to use condoms that have lubrication containing Nonoxynol-9 for anal sex, whether you are a gay male, a straight female or any other person experimenting with anal sex that safety is key. With that in mind everyone, be yourself, and be safe.
