A Glance

at Our Heritage

The Sisters of Charity established Mount Saint Vincent Academy in 1873 providing girls with elementary and secondary schooling.

By 1914, the need for post-secondary education was becoming increasingly evident, and a 25-year agreement with Dalhousie University was signed. Under this agreement the Mount supplied the first two years of a bachelor program and the final two years and the degree were given by Dalhousie.


The Nova Scotia legislature awarded Mount Saint Vincent with a college charter in May 1925. M.S.V.C. was then able to grant degrees in the arts, sciences, and music.


Until 1949, the Mount received no financial support from beyond the Sisters of Charity congregation, who solely owned and operated the institution.

It was on January 31, 1951, that the combined complex of Motherhouse and College was destroyed by fire. But, by September of the same year, the new college building, Evaristus Hall, was ready for students.

Enrolment grew and in 1966 two new buildings were added to the campus, Assisi Hall and Rosaria Hall. Also in that year a revision of the college charter was approved and the College became Mount Saint Vincent University.

Seton Academic Centre, providing classrooms, offices, an Art Gallery, and a 1000 seat theatre in the round, was functional in 1971. A new five-year agreement between Dalhousie and MSVU, on an association-as-equals basis, was signed. The Mount admitted undergraduate men for the first time to facilitate the agreement.

The Birches, five townhouse residences, were built in 1972, and Rosaria Centre was officially opened on March 14, 1981.

OUR PRESIDENTS

MOTHER M. EVARISTUS

Mother Evaristus, the first president of Mount Saint Vincent College, served from 1938 to 1944. She had been directly involved in the affiliation with Dalhousie in 1914 and had been a major influence in the application for the College Charter granted in 1925. The completion of Evaristus Hall was also largely due to her efforts.

Sister Maria Rosaria

While in office from 1944 to 1954, Sister's main efforts on behalf of the College were in the field of scholarship. She wrote numerous articles published in the classical journals and earned international commendation for her dessertation on "The Nurse in Greek Life".

Sister Francis d'Assisi

Being installed in 1954 and remaining in office until 1965, allowed this president plenty of time to instigate changes for M.S.V.C. Some of those changes were: including the Mount in the University Teacher Training Program of Nova Scotia; introducing graduate studies in English and Education; initiating steps for a new charter; completing plans for the building of Assisi and Rosaria Halls; and moving toward adoption of the present Coat of Arms.



Sister Alice Michael (Dr. Catherine Wallace)

Sister Alice Michael served the Mount as its president from 1966 to 1974, overseeing a number of developments. She was responsible for the formation of the new Charter. She also provided for a new Board of Governors and faculty Senate; planned the major expansion of library, science, and administration facilities; introduced a new program of Continuing Education for Women; and introduced the special women's collection of books by and about women.

Sister Mary Albertus

Mount Saint Vincent's fifth president was installed in 1975 and remained as president until 1978. Sister Mary Albertus was born in Massachusettes but came to Nova Scotia to earn her undergraduate degree. With a rich educational background, as both student and teacher, she was a definite asset to the Mount.

Dr. E. Margaret Fulton

Dr. Fulton became the Mount's first non-Catholic, lay president in 1978. She earned her undergraduate degree at the University of Manitoba and received her Ph.D. in Victorian Literature at the University of Toronto. Our president is well-known for her efforts in the movements for world peace and equality for women. Her devotion to Mount Saint Vincent University is undeniable and her dedication to her beliefs, her energy, and her enthusiasm should be an inspiration to us all.

GENERAL REGULATIONS

There shall be no visiting of rooms after 10:00 p.m. Permission for late study is to be asked of the Dean.

DINING ROOM

Dinner is served in the Dining Room at 5:45 p.m. For the evening meal, students are expected to dress informal dresses take the place of sweaters and skirts and dress shoes replace sports and saddle shoes.

Should it be necessary to leave the Dining Room before the end of a meal, a student shall excuse herself to the Student Council President in the absence of any faculty member.


ABSENCE FROM CAMPUS

Permission for off-campus leave must be obtained by all.

Seniors may have off-campus privileges any day of the week until 8:45 p.m. provided they register in person on their departure or return.

Students whose homes are at a distance shall visit only those families for whom their parents have given written permission.

All off-campus privileges are dependent on scholastic standing.





HOLIDAYS

On November 28, 1983, the Mount Senate passed a motion declaring January 31 as the President's Holiday to be recognized by the University community.

There have been several different days observed as holidays since the installation of the Mount's first President in 1938.

October 26 was called Feast Day or President's Day and was a special day on campus until 1944.

December 8 or December 10 had been named as President's Holidays during the period from 1944 to 1954.

October 26 regained recognition in honour of Mother Evaristus and was called Foundress Day, from 1954 to 1966.

From 1967 to 1983 a specific day was not declared and a holiday was granted at the President's discretion.

TRADITIONS LOST

Big and Little Sister Ceremony

Each upperclassman adopted a "little sister" from the incoming class. The "little sisters" would each light a candle from the flame of the "big sister's" candle, signifying the passing on of wisdom which the "big sister" had received at the University.


Mount Saint Vincent University had preserved the scholarly tradition of wearing cap and gown. Very early in the academic year, new students were formally accepted in the University community by being officially capped by the College President.

WHAT'S THE PICARO?

It is the name of our University's student newspaper of course and the meaning behind the term is interesting.

"Picaro" refers to the hero of early Spanish literature. The Picaro is a person who roams about the countryside, retaining the ideas and philosophies expressed by the people he encounters. From these various ideas he divulges his own philosophy.

The University motto, which is translated as "Truth Leads to God" is only one of the many aspects of M.S.V.U. that poses greater meaning for those who can appreciate its origin. The motto asserts the religious concerns which inspired the foundation of the University.

COAT OF ARMS

The Coat of Arms of the University is based on the Coat of Arms of Venerable Elizabeth Seton, foundness of the Congregation of the Sisters of Charity. It bears three silver crescents within the "treasure." The same "treasure" is found on the Coat of Arms granted to Nova Scotia in 1625, so the Community Foundress and the Province are represented. The three peaks on the shield signify the name of the University, "Mount" Saint Vincent. The book, a symbol of learning, is positioned between two maple leaves - the emblem of Canada. Above the book is a dove, symbolizing the Holy Spirit, and indicating that knowledge is only a means to Wisdom, the highest gift of God.

The colors of the shield are blue and gold. Gold symbolizes the divinity of our Lord and blue is for our Blessed Lady. The periphery of the Coat of Arms is royal blue and azure, the dual blues of Mount Saint Vincent University.

UNIVERSITY LOGO

The design of a new symbol, to represent the University along with the Heraldic Crest, was approved in January 1971.

The symbol, created by Eagles and Radcliffe Ltd., skillfully combines the letters "M", "V", and "U" to provide a distinctive pattern that is visually appealing and easily remembered. The addition of two circles above this pattern immediately adds warmth and the awareness that the symbol portrays as well.


This, it was felt, was the essence of a university; young people, alert people who are working together towards common objectives.

YEARBOOK HISTORY

Just as Mount Saint Vincent University has grown and changed so has the appearance, content, and name of the yearbooks produced to commemorate each passing year.

Names of past volumes have included: Kappa Kronicle, Phoenix, Memories, and Katina. The present title, Janus, has only been used since 1976, but its relevance should assure it a long life on the cover of the book of memories of our years at Mount Saint Vincent University.

Janus was the Roman God of beginnings, openings, entrances, doorways; of public gates through which roads passed and of private doors. Being the God of



Gates, he was naturally the God of departures, returns, and by extension, the God of all means of communication.

As a yearbook then, Janus represents a departure from the university, as we achieve our goal of graduation, and also a means of returning to it, through memories captured in the words and photos found here. We look to the Janus insignia as a symbol of our progression to the future, and the many thresholds we have yet to cross, and as a symbol of those doors through which we have already passed gaining confidence, wisdom, and pride.



"The universities... serve the national cause in so many ways ... that theirs must be regarded as the finest of contributions to national strength and unity."



Nanette Elsinga was named to the All-Conference team and was honoured with the title of All-Canadian at the National Championships.












WOMEN'S BASKETBALL






The Men's Hockey Team earned the right to play against U.C.C.B. in the College Conference final by defeating King's in the semis.

M.S.V.U. played in the Dalhousie Intramural League throughout the season, finishing with a 3-2-2, win-loss-tie record.


