## Mount faculty member assaults colleague

Police were called to the Mount on Tuesday, Sept. 18 to investigate an incident that took place between two faculty members.

Two women, aged 58 and 56 respectively, had an argument in one of the school's classrooms. The older woman then assaulted the other by hitting her on the head with a plastic T-ball bat.

The injuries suffered by the victim were not serious, although one of the women is now under medical care. The victim chose not to press charges. No students were present during the incident.


Judith Woodsworth, VP Academic at

the Mount, hopes that students will stop the rumours surrounding the incident. She says that both faculty members are very upset about the incident and that the rumours will likely make their recovery more difficult.

Students affected are those who had classes with either of the professors involved in the incident. These students have been spoken to, and their concerns have been addressed.

Neither the police nor the school would reveal the identities of the faculty members because of privacy issues.

## Parking problems cause on campus headache

There are four seasons in Nova Scotia: Almost winter, winter, still winter and construction. This is the joke that has been told time and time again and it is understood that "construction" occurs roughly between May and August. It doesn't usually extend into September. At the Mount, however, that's exactly what happened.

For the past week students with the luxury of a car have been getting up an hour early or parking up at the Mother House parking lot and walking down to their classes while the Evaristus parking lot was re paved. This has caused some complaints among the students, especially those who don't live close to campus and for whom getting up early sometimes means six in the morning.

D.J. Awalt was one of the students unhappy with the parking problems.

"I pay one hundred dollars to park here, the least they could do is give us a better place," he says.

According to Awalt usually if you get to school by nine you are guaranteed a spot, but with the construction that had been going on nine o' clock parking was not an option. Glenn Hollet, chief of security says there is no reason for students to have trouble finding places to park, that they justaren't going far enough away from Seton to look.

"If you are going downtown to go shopping in one store, you just don't look there for a parking spot. You go at least a block away to find one", he says.

Hollet says that if students have trouble finding a parking spot they should go to Assisi desk and Security will help them find a place.

There are seven hundred spaces in twenty-two lots so there should not be a problem finding somewhere to park.

Although it might have seemd like longer to students, the Evaristus parking lot was only off limits for six days. The Mother House parking lot was opened to provide extra spaces and a shuttle service was offered.

Construction or not, students should give themselves at least fifteen minutes before class so they will have enough time to find a place to park. That way if they do have to walk they will have time.

## Hands on approach to combatting terrorism

LAWRENCETOWN, N.S. (CUP) -- Vianne Fowler is a firm believer in the idea that one person can make a world of difference. In the wake of last week's terrorist attacks, the Lawrencetown, Nova Scotia mother has launched an international campaign of support and unity for the victims called "Hands around the world against terrorism."

"We're asking people to trace their hands, write their name and where they live on them and mail the cutouts in," she explained.

Fowler has enlisted a local elementary school to glue the hands into a chain. When the chain is finished she plans to send it to the New York City mayor Rudolph Guiliani.

"We're all responsible for what goes on in the world. People need to be more tolerant," Fowler said.

"We're so wrapped up in what we ourselves are doing that if someone trips on the sidewalk we no longer stop to help them up, "

Fowler said she credits her eight-year-old son's desire to help the terrorism victims for spawning the campaign.

Keith Colwell is Fowler's local municipal councillor and a strong supporter of the hands project. "We're hoping to raise awareness of peace and people working together and hopeful-

ly raise some funds for the International Red Cross too," he said. Colwell and Fowler have been

using local and national media outlets, email and letters to the office of the Prime Minister and Members of Parliament to draw attention to the campaign.


Fowler estimates it will take approximately 530-million hands to make a chain long enough to circle the globe, but says she's undaunted.

"I'm hoping to have this done by Christmas but I will work on it as long as it takes," she said. " We already have 140 hands, one

baby fist and two dog prints."

## No such thing as "holy" war

There was a common cry for immediate military retaliation in the days following the terrible events of September 11. I found myself growing more and more uneasy as George Bush and his representatives, media commentators, political pundits, and even the average person on the street joined together their calls for war. What astounded me was that apparently George Bush had a 90% approval rating for this declaration of war.

Certainly I felt grief, horror, and anger at the attacks on New York and Washington. On one level, it felt natural to want retaliation. But, as I began to reflect, and talk to others, a growing affirmation of my own intuitive voice that violence is not the answer began to emerge. I cringed every time I heard the term "holy war." Surely this must be an oxymoron?

As a person of faith, I believe that God is present within each living being. How can any violence ever be justified in the name of this Divine presence within each and every one of us? This to me is the ultimate blasphemy. As I continued to formulate my thoughts and reactions over the past two weeks, statements from church groups began to emerge. From a letter from Canadian church leaders: "The peace we seek will not be based on conquering others, forcing peoples into submission, hurting the innocent, or ignoring the victims and people marginalized throughout our world ... It will be a path of justice, equity, and security for all." From the Moderator of the United Church of Canada, Rev. Marion Pardy, " ... let us appeal for decisions based on God's wisdom, on being justice-seekers and peacemakers." From members of the Faith in Action Committee of the Maritime Conference of the United Church of Canada: "All war is self-destructive. If war could indeed bring about peace, history would have provided us with a peaceful world long ago."

After reading these letters from Canadian churches, I wondered if there might be the same kinds of statements coming out of the U.S. I was interested to see if there were American responses that were more reflective, more tempered than the ones I had seen in the mainstream media. I was not disappointed in my search. I found a wonderful website -"Sojo Net" - the online voice of Sojourners Magazine, from Washington, DC. Their mission statement says that they are "... a Christian Ministry whose mission is to proclaim and practice the biblical call to integrate spirituality renewal and social justice. In our lives and in our work we seek to be guided by the biblical principles of justice, mercy and humility."

Under the link "Responding in Faith", I read many articles written by Americans around the country. These articles and columns had titles such as "Don't let our values be a casualty too", "Let us be slow to anger and quick to listen", "How far does our compassion reach?", "Lead us not into war", and "Not in our son's name." All of them, while deploring the terrorist attacks, called for a sober second thought in the wake of the tragedy and a commitment to non-violence and peace-making. I commend the website (http://www.sojo.net) to all who may be interested in reading more.

Also on the website is "Deny them Their Victory, A Religious Response to Terrorism", a document developed in consultation with Jewish, Muslim and Christian clergy. This document has been signed by more than 1,000 people including Christian, Jewish, Muslim and Buddhist leaders. Signers from the Christian community include Protestant, Roman Catholic, Evangelical, Orthodox, Historic Black Church and Historic Peace Church traditions. It is one of the most inclusive religious statements ever released. It says: "... But we must not, out of anger and vengeance, indiscriminately retaliate in ways that bring on even more loss of innocent life. ... we can deny them their victory by refusing to submit to a world created in their image. Terrorism inflicts not only death and destruction but also emotional oppression to further its aims. We must not allow this terror to drive us away from being the people God has called us to be. We assert the vision of community, tolerance, compassion, justice and the sacredness of human life, which lies at the heart of all our religious traditions."

I also happened to tune in to the Oprah show recently. It was a show that featured prominent women who had joined the call for non-violence. Rep. Barbara Lee from the United States Congress was the only representative to vote no to giving George Bush unlimited power to respond to the terrorist attacks. She said that it was a very difficult decision, but after praying, and thinking about how people of faith should respond she had to vote with her conscience. She has received criticism for this, but is unwavering in her decision. I admire her courage. Her last comment was "as women, we need to instruct our children about violence so that they will inherit a peaceful world."

As I write this I feel more hopeful than I have since that terrible day. It is a hopeful sign for me that there is a growing movement committed to non-violent resolution emerging across the continent, and around the world. We need to hear each others' voices, voices from different faith traditions, women's voices, students' voices, voices from those who have for too long been voiceless. We need to empower others to join in the chorus. Thousands, perhaps millions of lives are at stake.

## CIBC Run For The Cure: Who would you run or walk for?

One year ago, waves of white T-shirts surged past the gates of Point Pleasant Park. Arms pumping, shoulders back, in classic power walking style they rounded Robie and headed back to the St. Mary's campus. Refreshments, commemorative coins and prizes awaited the participants of the 2000 CIBC Run for the Cure. Event organizers announced the money totals and thanked the crowd for their efforts. Cancer survivors spoke of the hope that soon a cure for breast cancer would be found. The almost 4,000 walkers and runners were left feeling that they had been a part of something extraordinary.

The CIBC Run for the Cure is not a typical walk-a-thon. It is a national fundraising campaign that last year alone raised \$9.3 million for cancer research.

Several statistics may cause Mount students to join the event. Nova Scotia has the highest cancer mortality rate in Canada. One in nine Canadian women will develop breast cancer. Registration for the Run is \$30, \$25 if you met the deadline and free if you can collect \$100. However, these facts are often not enough to motivate students to join the Mount team. For many there has to be more than logical reasoning, there has to be an emotional appeal.

This year's campaign asks, "Who would you run for?" Many students join because they know someone who has had cancer or they are survivors themselves. They walk or run because they know they are helping to fund the research that one day will wipe out this disease. It is a way to fight the feelings of helplessness and frustration often associated with cancer. Almost everyone can think of someone to run for; cancer has left few families untouched.

For MSVU Birch 5 resident Adele Stevens, last year's event was reason enough to sign-up this year.

"It was an impressive scene. On the field, the road, there was this throng of us, all in T-shirts and all for cancer. I was in special company. I'm doing the Run again this year to relive the experience."

This year is the 10th anniversary of

the event and the warm-up begins at 9:40 a.m. on Sept. 30 on the SMU football field. At 10:00 a.m. those running the five kilometers head out onto Inglis St. followed by the larger group of walkers.

The Mount has another strong team this year of approximately 170 students, staff and faculty. DianeTinkham, a cocoordinator of the Mount effort said that while this year's registration numbers are down the focus is on ensuring the day is a positive one for those involved.

"It is such a heart-warming event, it's uplifting to see people of all ages come out and be a part of the Run," she says.

By the time this article has been printed and read the 2001 CIBC Run for the Cure will have taken place. The opportunity to be a part of this year's Run has passed but research will continue to be done for many years. So next year you'll have the chance again, whatever your motivation, to walk or run for the Cure.



## Radio airplay affected by terrorist attacks

When the United States was attacked on September 11, our lives changed in subtle, yet undeniable ways. Airspace was closed down in order to prevent any further terrorism, suspicious-looking people arrested for nothing more than being in the wrong place at the wrong time. People have become more sensitive and emotional as well. Radio stations in America have received recommendations to ban many previously innocuous seeming songs from the radio.

Although most people are sensitive to the emotions surrounding the attacks, not everyone is in favour of extensive changes to playlists. Canadian media critic John Corcelli says that there should be some limitations to songs being pulled from the radio.

"I don't believe in censorship, but some songs are more appropriate to be played at this time than others."

This seems to be the common feeling among radio progammers and media watchers. Corcelli believes that problems with playing songs arise when they are taken out of context and reinterpreted in light of recent events.

While the effects on Canadian radio as in the US, there

have been changes. A few

songs have been pulled from the playlists of Halifax radio stations C100 and Q104, but only temporarily, and they will be readded in the near future. The songs were pulled out of respect for the terrorism victims and due to public sensitivity to anything with even vague reference to the September 11 attacks. At Q104, the playlists were reviewed carefully by song title, but according to J.C. Douglas, the station's program director, it was impossible to avoid all potentially offensive songs. Even after careful con-

sideration of what songs played. should be Douglas says that were still some complaints. stations have not Mellencamp, "The End Of The "Strange Days" by the been as extensive World As We Know It" by REM, Matthew Good Band and "I Feel Safe In New York was one of the songs mentioned.

Songs that were

pulled from Q104's playlist included "Crumbling Down" by John Mellencamp, "The End Of The World As We Know It" by REM, and "I Feel Safe In New York City." Terry Williams, Program Director for C100 also pulled songs including "Falling For The First Time" by the Barenaked Ladies. He indicated that C100 was also focusing on playing more upbeat numbers since the attacks.

"We tried to play more positive songs as well, such as 'Peaceful World."

When asked if he thinks the attacks will have any long-term affect on the music industry, Williams mentioned an interview with Fred Durst, lead singer of Limp Bizkit, that he had read, in which Durst said his music will change as a result of the recent events.

"Music to come over the next year is going to reflect a difference. And we may see a kindler, gentler response from musicians in the future," says Williams.

As to how extensive the effects on the music industry will be, it is hard to say. As Douglas put it,

"It depends on what happens next."
