

### Image Committee at Work


Dr. Marguerite Flinn and Assistant Professor Jon White have been elected to cochair the university's newly-appointed Image Committee which, over the next six months, will look into what 'we think of ourselves' and how others perceive the Mount which was founded as an all-women post-secondary institution some 68 years ago.

While studies on this subject have been carried out in the past (one in the mid 70's by a major consulting firm), little is known of the results. The *ad hoc* committee, which won approval from the Senate at its last meeting, will be expected to report back to that body come September 1982.

Mount President Dr. E. Margaret Fulton appointed the committee in October, following a request from Dulcie Conrad, ne university's director of public relations, alumnae and development. "With increasing numbers of part-time and mature students joining the ranks plus the introduction of a number of creative programs attracting more male students, it has become more difficult to produce promotional materials, including advertisements, for those who have varying perspectives on what the university is all about," says Conrad.

Apart from Flinn, White. Fulton and Conrad, others appointed to the expanded committee are: Dr. Erdener Kaynak, Dr. Susan Clark, Sr. Patricia Mullins, Assistant Professor Carole Hartzman, Admissions Officer Susan Tanner, Dr. Mairi Macdonald, Student Council president Karen Stone and a yet-to-be-named representative of the Campus Association of Part-time University Students.

The committee plans to meet on a regular basis. All comments and suggestions should be directed to either Flinn or White.





They say the way to a man's heart is through his stomach, and perhaps, without stretching the analogy too far, it could also be the means for creating a special kind of understanding between two countries thousands of miles apart.

Canada and Malawi have set up a link between the Mount and the University of Malawi in order to develop home economics and nutrition programs at several colleges in the African country.

It started back in 1979 when Dr. Marilyn McDowell, Chairman of the Mount's Home Economics Department, was invited by Dr. David Kimble, Vice-Chancellor of the University of Malawi, to visit his country. Professional Home Economics Associations in the two countries had already formed a link and it seemed logical to include the universities.

McDowell was impressed with the practical approach taken by the many home economics and health educators she met in Malawi, and by their energy, independence and eagerness to improve their own professional knowledge.

That visit will result in the establishment of a degree program in Home Economics at the University of Malawi under the guidance of Dr. Lila Engberg, as associate professor of Family and Consumer Studies on leave from the University of Guelph. She was appointed by the Mount in late 1981 to head the Home Economics Department at Chancellor College in Malawi for a period of two years and her prime responsibility will be to plan the degree program.

#### Malawians in Canada

Already installed at the Mount are three Malawian students, here to take their degrees in Home Economics so that they can carry their knowledge and expertise back to their own country in three years time.

Lucy Mwaisango has been here for almost a year and was so motivated to advance the profession of Home Economics, and ultimately the standard of living in her own country, that she left two small daughters in the care of her family in order to come to Canada. She faces the three-year separation knowing that in the long run, only good can result from her difficult decision.

In the Fall of 1981 Elsie Kukada and Margaret Mamba of Mangochi, southern Malawi, arrived at the Mount to begin their three-year program in Home Economics.

Both will be returning to Malawi to teach, Elsie to go to the Natural Resources Colleges in Lilongwe and Margaret to work on community development in rural areas. Neither had ever been outside her own country before and each has reacted differently.

"I think it's wonderful to travel and see other countries," Elsie says, but Margaret looks a little sad and says she is homesick. Both feel they have made the right decision in coming to the Mount and are fast getting used to Canadian ways, including our food! "We eat more vegetables in Malawi," Elsie says. The first smattering of snow this winter had them excited, for although the Malawian winter can be cold, they haven't seen snow before. *continued on page 2*





Mount Saint Vincent University public relations student Jim Wentzell, who won the public speaking event at the Dålhousie Debating Tournament recently, thinks debating can be fun. "You don't have to be a stuffed shirt to be a debater," he says. "I tend to rely on humour and dramatics and I hammer on the podium."

Together with Wendy Lillico, Wentzell formed a two-person debating team at the Mount last Fall and has been proving ever since that they're as good as anyone else. In their first major tournament, the Canadian Championships, they came away with three wins and two losses, with one of their wins being against the top-ranking University of Western Ontario.

Then in the second tournament Wentzell was given 10 seconds to prepare a talk on the topic "The Fat Lady is Christ" and won the event!

He's had eight years experience in debating, since he was in high school, while Lillico is new to debating but obviously doing well. They are both hoping to see the Mount team grow from two to match the 25 debaters in the Dalhousie team.

"We're always interested in new people," Wentzell says, "and it would be nice to have some members who have high school debating experience. But anyone is welcome to come along who is interested enough to learn. We can coach them." In the past, the Mount had some outstanding debating teams. However, this team is the first in several years. Student Council and the University have given full support to the team which will represent the Mount at the World's Debating Championships to be held in Toronto this month.
