



To the Graduating Class of 1982:

Each year at Mount Saint Vincent University, the graduation ceremonies see an ever wider segment of our human society completing degrees. While the Mount remains firm in its commitment to the special educational needs of women, and while the majority of our graduates remain women between the age groups of 20-25, a growing number of traditional male students, many married couples and many mature persons are completing degrees at Mount Saint Vincent University.

The Graduating Class is representative of a varied group of students. My congratulations are extended to each one of you. The uniqueness of each graduate gives evidence of the uniqueness of the Mount as an institution of higher education not only in Nova Scotia but also in Canada.

The reason the Mount attracts such a wide variety of students is partly because of its tradition and history and partly because of the wide variety of academic programs. At Convocation in May, 1981, twenty-four students graduated with a Bachelor of Public Relations degree. This was the first class to graduate in Public Relations and Mount Saint Vincent University is the only English-speaking university in Canada offering such a program.





In 1873, the Sisters of Charity established Mount Saint Vincent University, providing elementary and secondary schooling.

By 1914, the need for post-secondary education was becoming increasingly evident; a 25 year agreement with Dalhousie University was signed. This allowed the Mount to give the first two years bachelor programs, the final two years and degree to be given by Dalhousie.

In 1925, Mount Saint Vincent College was awarded the right to grant its own degrees in the arts, science and music.

The entire plant of Mount Saint Vincent Motherhouse and College was laid waste by fire in January 1951. By September of the same year, the new college building, Evaristus Hall, was ready to receive students.



The Mount continues to grow.

The Mount continued to grow. In 1966, two new buildings were added to the campus: a 12 storey residence, Assisi Hall, and student centre, Rosaria Hall. Through a revision of the college charter, the College became Mount Saint Vincent University.

In 1971, a new building, Seton Academic Centre, provided classrooms, faculty offices, a first-rate Art Gallery, and a theatre in the round to seat 1000. MSVU entered into a new five-year agreement with Dalhousie on an association-asequals basis.

The Birches, five new townhouse residences, were built in 1972.

Rosaria Centre was officially opened on March 14, 1981.








Coat of Arms Insignia

The University motto is "Veritus ad deum ducit" which is translated as "truth leads to God." The motto asserts the religious concerns which inspired the foundation of the University.



Based on the coat of arms of Venerable Elizabeth Seton, Foundress of the Congregation of the Sisters of Charity, the University seal bears three crescents within a "tressure". The same "tressure" is found on the coat of arms granted to Nova Scotia in 1625 so that the Community Foundress and the Province of Nova Scotia are represented. The book, symbol of learning, stands between two maple leaves, emblem of Canada. Above the book stands a dove, symbolizing the Holy Spirit, indicating that Knowledge is only a means to Wisdom, the highest gift of God.

The colors of the shield are blue and gold-gold symbolizing the divinity of our Lord and blue for our Blessed Lady. The periphery of the coat of arms is royal blue and azure, the dual blues of Mount Saint Vincent University.


University Logo



In January 1971, the Board of Governors approved the design of a new symbol for Mount Saint Vincent University that would replace the Heraldic Crest previously used to represent the University.

The design was the culmination of five months work by Eagles and Radcliffe Ltd., of Dartmouth, Nova Scotia. The symbol skillfully combines the letters "M" and "V" and "U" to provide a distinctive pattern that is visually appealing and easily remembered. The addition of two circles above this pattern immediately adds warmth and the awareness that the symbol portrays people as well.

This, it was felt, was the essence of a university; young people, alert people who are working together towards common objectives.


Grand Opening

A double decker held in honour of the grand opening saw Razor Boy playing in the Multipurpose Room and the Berri Hill band on stage in the Pub. Christened VINNIE'S PUB with a ribbon cutting the ceremony. A 26" color TV, \$100 worth of games, and an initial \$200 worth of albums unveiled that evening.





Already used during Orientation, Vinnie's Pub had become a regular spot for some students. Vinnie's represented many things other than the more obvious. It represented several long hours of hard work during the Summer of '82 by Karen Stone and Sue Drapeau. The Administration supplied the initial funding while the task of spending a sum of \$20,000 had to be carefully planned by these two individuals. It was not as easy as it may appear. Priorities had to be set, cost estimates had to be made and deadlines had to be set in order to have Rosaria Lounge remodeled before September when the students arrived. 



On April 1, 1981, the Council of 81/82 took office, all six elected and two appointed members. The new Council faced student unrest, severed relations with Administration and a deficit in excess of \$15,000. Despite these problems, the new Council had several things going their way. The elections had produced the highest voter turnout ever, 48% of the full-time student body voted and a referendum to raise Student Union fees from \$44.50 to \$65.00 had passed.

An inexperienced but enthusiastic group of people took on this challenge. So what did they do during their 13 month term of office? (Council changed term of office from April 1 to March 31 to make the transitions between councils easier.)

Here are some of the highlights and/or accomplishments from 81/82. During the summer months, the budget was set. The aim was to erase as much of the deficit as possible and still offer sufficient services. Orientation was planned in conjunction with Student Services. The pub was proposed, planned, and all renovations to Rosaria Lounge were completed by the time students arrived on campus in September. Vinnie's Pub, a welcome addition, was a co-operative effort between the Student Union and Administration.

The 81/82 edition of the Student Union Handbook was on "news stands" when the students arrived; however, due to computer problems, the directory was a little late coming out, and due to other problems as you know by now the yearbook was somewhat late. To quote an old cliche, "Better late than never."

Also during the summer, meetings were held with the Presidents of the Student Unions in the Halifax area. These meetings, initiated by M.S.V.U., resulted in an open door policy among the institutions. A valid university I.D. will admit you to any university function in Halifax. The M.S.V.U. Council members also achieved the dissolution of the financial side of the Dal-Mount Agreement, retaining the good relationship between councils.

September was the grand opening of Vinnie's Pub and the anti-cutbacks march-over 500 M.S.V.U. students participated in the march. A good showing indeed. The Fall elections were held in October. Voter turnout was not great but now we were operating with almost a full slate of Councillors.

Karen Stone, President, and Alice MacKichan, Executive Vice-President, attended the Canadian Federation of Students (CFS) Conference in Ottawa in October. The extent of our participation in this organization was a topic of discussion for most of the year.

The entertainment was mostly kept to one large function a month and a weekly Wednesday night pub at Vinnie's. While many thought \$1.50 door charge outrageous it contributed to the cost of a DJ and increased the record collection. As a result of carefully monitored entertainment functions, no losses were incurred. Open forums were held every two months but the attendance was always low.

The Spring term highlights, over and above the regular activities and events included the M.S.V.U. Student Union hosting its 1st Annual Leadership Conference with over 80 participants from universities around the province; a successful constitution referendum, which provided the first official one since incorporation in 1971; elections for Council of 82/83 which filled more positions than had been filled the year before; and the Project One referendum which passed in favor of full-time students contributing \$10/year until a \$300,000 committment was fulfilled.

An active year which 81/82 councillors will remember for some time to come. Its success is hard to determine; however, in terms of dollars, in April we were \$15,000 plus in the red and at the end of the year we were \$20,000 plus in the black. If nothing else was accomplished, financial stability was achieved for the M.S.V.U. Student Union.

Volleyball



Most Reverend Chancellor, Madam President, Representative of the Government, Distinguished Guests, Parents, Friends. Fellow Graduates ...
