Students Erupt Over Dal-Mount Bus Scandal

It seems the Mount has always taken a back seat to Dalhousie. But recent events have left some Mount students wondering whether they'll get a seat at all - on the Dal/Mount bus, that is.

Last week the bus didn't stop at some of its usual stops, angering student riders. "Students have been phoning me complaining (about the bus)," said student union president, Paul Card.

Until recently, drivers on the Dal/Mount route commonly made 'courtesy stops' - stops at in-between, unofficial bus stops. But because of this extra stopping, students taking classes at Dalhousie were arriving late.

To speed up service, Paul Reyno, Mount physical plant director told Metro Transit to cease making courtesy stops. "He (Reyno) said his intentions were to speed it up, because students taking courses at Dalhousie... werent making their classes," said Card. "They were five minutes late."

But administration made no announcement of the change. The only notice came from a bus driver, who last week announced

it to a busload of confused students. "It was quite vague," said student Maurice Michaud, "There was no way of figuring out exactly what he meant."

And some students resent having the bus schedule changed to accommodate students going to Dalhousie, especially since it is the Mount, not Dal, which funds the bus. "If the Mount is funding it, and Dal is convenienced by it," said student Karen Hatfield, "then that sucks!"

To further confuse the issue, the daytime driver isn't follow-

ing the new rules, claimed Card, but the night time driver is.

"Theres a communication problem between the university and Metro Transit, and Metro Transit and its bus drivers," said Card. "I think this change was badly implemented."

So while students wait for a seat on the bus, they also wait for a clear explanation of the new schedule. "If they're going to implement something like this," said Card, "perhaps they should tell the students beforehand."

Chaos In Mount Parking Lots

Fresh Start at Vinnie's

On August 9, 1988, an agreement was signed between the student union and administration. This agreement gives the student union complete control over Vinnie's Pub from Labour Day until the end of April of each school year. This is great, but what does it really mean for the students?

"Well, for one thing, it means longer open hours," states Student Union President Paul Card. The pub will now be open at 11:00AM every day of the week. "From 11:00 AM until 3:30 PM we want to turn the pub into a student lounge, a place where students can study, have group meetings, eat a light lunch, or just relax with a good drink," explains Card. "At 3:30, the pub changes from a student lounge to a student pub. On Monday, Tuesday, and Thursday, the pub will close at 11:00, but on Wednesday and Friday it's open until

Since Vinnie's opened in 1981, it has been controlled by the university through Versa Services. Versa did all of the ordering, stored all of the inventory, set up the cash float, paid all of the expenses, took its 15% service charge and gave the rest of the money to the student union. With the signing of the agreement, all this changes. "We now have a lot more responsibility and a lot more work to do," stated assistant bar manager Keith Davis. "It also means that we can do a lot more with the pub."

It is evident that the student union is trying to increase Vinnie's profitability by increasing attendance at the pub. There has been a slight increase in the prices this year, but the amount of money being spent far outweighs the price increases. New at the pub this year are the following:

- two new high quality power amps
 - six new two-way speakers
 - a new Stereo Hi-Fi VCR
- four new 27-inch colour monitors, bringing the total of monitors to five
- a new dispenser rack for pouring shots that should eliminate wastage and make inven-

tory 10 times easier than before

- Pay TV including TSN and MuchMusic (coming soon)
- lights for the dart board and shuffle board
- a feature board announcing specials and upcoming events at Vinnie's

If you are under 19 and you are wondering if you can go into the pub, the answer is yes and no. During the study lounge hours of 11:00 - 3:30 the pub is wet/dry as well as Friday afternoons when there is entertainment. Other than these instances, the pub is restricted to people 19 years of age and older. The only other exception is Monday Movie Night, which is also wet/dry.

Student union hopes that with the expanded hours, the new equipment, and the increased entertainment planned for this year, Vinnie's will have its most successful year ever. Vinnie's has been open for two weeks now, and judging by the response so far, it appears that Vinnie's may indeed have its best year ever.

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Chaos cont'd

Last year, 690 parking spaces were available to students, staff and faculty. It has not been estimated how many lots are available this year, yet over one thousand permits have been sold: 834 for students and general parking, 20 for car pool, 100 for staff, 14 for resident parking and 123 for faculty.

Eade could not say exactly how many parking spaces will be made available once the communications centre is finished. "Parking spaces will become available whenever the paving is done," she said.

In the meantime, many drivers are losing their patience while driving around campus hopelessly looking for a place to park.

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

N.S. Tories Win - SUNS Disappointed

HALIFAX (CUP) -- Nova Scotia Conservative leader John Buchanan remains in power after an election in which few students were given the opportunity to vote, charge critics.

The province's post-secondary education lobbyist, the Students' Union of Nova Scotia -- representing 20,000 of Nova Scotia's 28,000 students -- thinks Buchanan planned it that way. SUNS representatives say the timing reflects the Tories' attitude towards education -- and the fear of concentrated student power.

The election was held Sept 6, a week before university classes resumed.

"We have no way of gauging what voter turnout for students was," said Sue Drapeau, SUNS executive officer. She believes polling results in at least two ridings would have been different had the election been called during the school year.

Drapeau points to the riding of King's South, a seat held by the New Democrats until last week, as an example of the Tories intentionally sidestepping student clout. The 2,000-strong student population at Acadia University was scattered throughout the province.

"If there had been more Acadia students out voting," Drapeau says, "Steve Mattson (the NDP candidate) would have taken the seat. There was a difference of less than 500 voters between him and Derrick Kimmball (the Progressive Conservative victor)."

Another close race was between NDP candidate Eileen O'Connell and House Speaker Art Donahoe, in a Halifax riding heavily populated by students during the school year. O'Connell lost the riding by about 200 votes.

The Tories went from 40 to 28 seats, a bare majority in Nova Scotia's 52-seat legislature. The win makes Buchanan the country's longest-serving premier, heading his fourth consecutive government.

"The Buchanan government has consistently given post-secondary education short shrift," Drapeau said. The Tories have ignored the recommendations of the Maritime Provinces Higher Education Commission, which proposes provincial funding levels for universities in the region.

"It seems like they began taking the recommendations the
MPHEC makes every year for
maintenance and shaving a bit
off every year," Drapeau said.
"It's eroding the quality of our
education because universities
have to find ways to do without."

The government last approved the full recommended increase in 1984 -- an election year in Nova Scotia.

Says Drapeau, "I think we're probably in for four more years of the same."

To SUNS, that's bad news. When Drapeau invited the three party leaders to attend a forum on post secondary education held two weeks before the election, students had to settle for cardboard.

A dual stage was set up for the debate. At one table, there were the usual microphones and water glasses, but propped up in the chairs were cardboard caricatures of the party leaders, all sporting SUNS "Vote for Education" buttons. At the other table were seated the representatives the leaders had sent in their absence.

The NDP and Liberal leaders had sent candidates representing areas with high student representation. The PCs didn't even bother going that far.

Instead, Buchanan sent a recent university graduate who was working on the PC election campaign.

"If people were upset at not having the leaders there," said Royden Trainor, a Dalhousie law student who moderated the event, "they were absolutely mystified that the Tories didn't even send a candidate."

And they were probably disgusted when Trainor read off the whereabouts of the campaigning politicians. Premier Buchanan was attending the opening of a hockey arena. Liberal leader Vince MacLean was mainstreeting and playing bingo at a hall a few blocks away. NDP leader Alexa McDonough was attending a coffee party at a Canadian Union of Public Employees Local.

Both Drapeau and Trainor attribute the failure of the forum to John Buchanan, who ironically, has held the portfolio for Higher Education and Training since mid-August. McDonough and MacLean agreed to take part in the forum back in March, on the condition that Buchanan attend as well.

"There could have been two reasons for his (Buchanan's) refusal to participate," says Trainor. "Either education just isnt an important issue to the premier, or else he doesn't know enough about education issues to debate them."

Buchanan took over the ministry after Edmund Morris resigned from cabinet in anticipation of an election call. Morris had been shuffled from the social services portfolio in January after being convicted of releasing confidential information from the file of a welfare recipient.

Trainor sums up the debate as "disappointing", and adds, "I hope it's not telling of the degree of support the government wants to give higher education in the future."

HALIFAX (CUP) -- A practical joke forced the evacuation of 1700 Dalhousie University students from a five-floor party Saturday, prompting drunken students to throw rocks at pas-

Two fire alarms pulled as a gag brought the Halifax fire department to the building-wide bash, billed as the grand finale to Dalhousie's orientation week. Firefighters escorted drunken students out of the Student Union Building and asked the crowds to stay put until an electrician reset the alarms.

"While waiting, some people in the crowd got violent, and the odd few got out of control and started throwing rocks and bottles," said security officer Doug Stewart, who was on duty that night.

The alarms weren't reset until 1 AM, the hour the dance was scheduled to end, and the restless crowd was told to go home.

"An employee was briefly hospitalized after an unidentified student greeted the announcement by tossing a rock through a window," said building manager Steve Gaetz.

No charges have been laid.

Its midnight and I have nothing intelligent to say to our captive readers out there.





Screamin' With The Trees

What did you do last weekend? Go home? Downtown? Do homework? You could have been at the Mount witnessing local talent on the rise -- that's right, here in your own backyard.

Last Friday's performance of The Trees, the Halifax electro pop trio who won Best Band Award in an international music festival, packed the dance floor the entire night. They also gave us some insight as to what to expect on their upcoming album.

The energetic stage presence of lead vocalist Dave Roberts, guitarist Bruce Nelson, and Steve Coady on drums rubbed off on the crowd of 300 resulting in an extremely enthusiastic lot the whole night.

Over 50 per cent of the music was their own material which is unusual for most Top 40 bar bands. However, The Trees have always incorporated original songs into stage shows and -- unlike most other bands -- don't

clear the dance floor when doing so. J.D. Roberts of MuchMusic has described The Trees as "an anomaly in the East Coast scene; a breath of fresh air in the Top 40 mentality of the Maritimes."

Judging by positive response, the band didn't suffer from any Top 40 mental blocks in the crowd when playing Give It Up, Wherever the Wind Blows, Wrong Side of Town, and opening number Land of Mystery. These songs, plus a few others we heard are featured on their self-titled debut album to be released later this fall.

Originally the Screaming Trees, they changed the name just before heading for Tokyo last fall to compete in the Yamaha International Popular Music Festival. Beating out a total of over 10,000 entries worldwide during preliminary competitions and the final selection process in Japan, they won Best Band Award.

Avideo for Give It Up, one of the two songs performed at Budokan in Tokyo, will be filmed in Halifax next month. It carries an anti-drug message and will be shot by a Toronto production crew. Keep your eyes open for it on MuchMusic.

Oh, and about the Terry Fox Run collection at the dance -feel proud of yourselves. With \$66 raised, they received more donations from the Mount than other local universities.

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


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Seven Mental Mistakes of Fitness

When beginning a new fitness program, many participants often have expectations and preconceived notions which are unreasonable and, in many cases, completely false. These can greatly reduce the effectiveness and overall enjoyment of fitness activities. The following is a list of the most common mistakes or misconceptions of beginners concerning fitness exercises. I call them the "Seven Mental Mistakes of Fitness."

1. Many people simply expect too much too soon. It may take as long as eight to 12 weeks before you experience additional energy, any weight loss, or improved muscle tone. In the beginning you will likely feel tired after a workout.

2. Most people simply hate the first few minutes of the workout. Remember that it takes your heart and lungs three to six minutes to catch up to the initial demand for oxygen during the early stages of your workout. You should therefore ease into your warm-up.

3. Often, exercises are not done properly. To strengthen and tone muscle, you must continually work it up and down against resistance. Doing so and stopping one repetition after the exercise becomes uncomfortable will gradually increase muscle strength.

4. Participants often think the harder they work, the more fat they will burn off. However, it is not the intensity of the workout but its duration that is important in reducing fat. Exercising in the lower range of your target heart zone will facilitate fat metabolism.

5. Some people will wrongly concentrate their exercises to a specific part of their bodies. Performing an exercise targeted at a specific muscle group will not eliminate the fat that lies between the muscle and the skin. This will only tone the muscle. To reduce fat you must first reduce your calorie intake and then increase aerobic activity.

6. Often, beginners push themselves too hard. The American College of Sports Medicine recommends aerobic activity three to four times per week. A study on the matter was done, using two groups; one which exercised three times a week, and a second which exercised daily. The results showed that the reduction in blood pressure and risk of cardio-vascular disease

was equal for both groups.

7. Many participants will stay at home to nurse pain. There are different types of pain. If your muscles are sore from being under-prepared or over-used, don't rest them too long; keep at it. However, do not force yourself to "work out" sharp pain. It should be taken seriously; you may want to consult a physician.

With this advice in mind, set realistic goals for yourself and have a great workout!












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
