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Admissions applications up slightly from last year

Mount admissions of ficer Susan Tanner reports that admissions applications are up slightly this year. "The statistics we have to date show that we're holding our own," she says, noting that 3270 applications were received by July 15 compared to 3027 by the same date last year. "In several programs, particularly limited enrolment programs, we've already had to turn away

people whose marks well exceed the required minimum average."

Tanner says that applicants accepted by Aug. 15 can be assured that all their registration material will be ready by the time they arrive in September. She notes that the admissions and registration offices are gearing up for orientation week, Sept. 4 to 10. Registration is Sept. 7 and 8.

Mount art gallery hosts major quilt exhibition

Fifty-three traditional and contemporary Nova Scotia quilts and quilted items will be highlighted in Quilt '89, a juried exhibition at the Mount art gallery, Aug. 11 to Sept. 17. The exhibition is organized with the Mayflower Handquilters of Nova Scotia and funded by a grant from the Nova Scotia Department of Tourism and Culture.

"The gallery places special emphasis on work by women and on media traditionally associated with women, particularly fibre," comments art gallery director Mary Sparling. "To have an exhibition of recent Nova Scotia quilts is especially important for us."

Some of the works represent contemporary interpretations of traditional ideas, designs and motifs, while others are purely innovative. "This exhibition includes work by women who have been involved in quiltmaking for a number of years, as well as by women new to quiltmaking who are approaching it as another way of making art," explains Sparling, adding, "the art of traditional quiltmaking and the making of art are both enriched by bringing together the craftsperson and the artist."

Individually and together, the quilts are a convincing statement that quiltmaking is alive and well in Nova Scotia, and that the quilting medium is a viable one for contemporary artistic expression.

The Honourable Roland Thornhill, Nova Scotia Minister of Tourism and Culture, will officially open Quilts '89 at the Mount art gallery, Sunday, Aug. 13, at 3 p.m. The Minister's Special Award fo Quilt Design will be presented then, in recognition of his department's declaration of 1989 as The Year of the Quilt.

Former Mount president back to teach summer school

Dr. E. Margaret Fulton, Mount president from 1978 to 1986, has returned to familiar turf to teach a Women in Literature course in the second summer session.

Being back at the Mount "feels very much like coming home. It's so good to see this wonderful new communications centre, and to see the Mount continue to provide the leadership to women which was the original goal of the Sisters of Charity."

Since retiring from the Mount, Dr.

Fulton has been busy. She serves as an adjunct professor with the University of British Columbia, and an educational consultant with clients as far afield as Norway. She also serves on the national boards of Elderhostel in Canada and the United States.

She will return to the Mount in October to officially open the new communications centre named in her honor.
