

Hostility Mounts Kelusultiek - We Have Spoken

Hostillity mounted between the Mount Saint Vincent Association of Non-Traditional University Students' (M.A.N.U.S.) and the Student Union, in a private meeting September 12.

M.A.N.U.S. submitted a budget to the Student Union of \$6,025 for the 1994-95 academic year. A total of \$4,000 from the funds are allotted for entertainment and social functions.

Herein lies the core of the conflict.

Melanie MacDonald, treasurer for M.A.N.U.S. says the Student Union is only an agent responsible for allocating funds to the association.

"You don't have any control over M.A.N.U.S." she said, "and you have no say in how to run it."

The Student Union disagrees.

"It would be financially irresponsible of me to give \$4,000 for parties, " says Joe Strolz, President of the Student Union, "and only give \$150 total to each of the other societies on campus."

M.A.N.U.S. represents more than 60 percent of the student body at the Mount. MacDonald argues their numbers are justification for their budget.

"The (M.A.N.U.S.) population has certain needs that outreach the traditional students' needs....The M.A.N.U.S. executive knows what our students need and want."

Strolz asked how many actual active M.A.N.U.S. members there were on campus. "Active membership," he feels, is one way of measuring how much need their is within a certain group.

It would be too difficult to consider M.A.N.U.S. as a society with active membership says MacDonald.

"First of all, societies do not have resource persons there, available to counsel women who have been beaten by their husbands. Societies don't give away money to people who can't afford milk and bread, or school supplies for thier children. Societies don't throw free parties, you have to pay for it."

The M.A.N.U.S. association has allocated \$400 in this year's budget for any of these emergencies. The Student Union does not consider this a sufficient contribution.

"The Student Union is in a tight situation as far as money goes; everybody is feeling the axe." Strolz said. "What I want to make sure of, is that no essential services student's need are cut. I suggest maybe we have another look at spending \$4,000 on free parties, and only \$400 for school supplies and groceries for people who need them."

Strolz proposed changes to Student Union's funding of M.A.N.U.S.; primarily, the money normally used for parties would be spent on the Parent Care Lounge and an Emergency Fund.

Elaine MacDonald is the second vice president of M.A.N.U.S.. "I'm a single mother and I recognize all the problems," she says. "...And I agree we do need more subsidized seats at the Parent Care Lounge."

Melanie MacDonald adds, "But we are much more...We are trying to bring people together."

The Student Union is adament something must go. The executive says it does not make good sense to allocate \$4,000 for food and parties.

Vice President of Finance, Steve Brown says, "Where are the priorities when you are putting 10 times the amount towards parties as you are towards helping out your own members."

Adding to the grief between M.A.N.U.S. and Student Union is Strolz's motion that an autonomous Emergency Fund Committee be established, to govern and distribute financial assistance fairly and in confidentiality.

M.A.N.U.S. opposes strongly. "When you have to come face to face asking for money, your pride goes out the door," MacDonald said. "They don't want younger students to know they are in trouble."

Strolz warned M.A.N.U.S. executive not to make generalizations that all M.A.N.U.S. members were poor.

M.A.N.U.S. and the Student Union did agree that fundraising was an "untapped resource." M.A.N.U.S. says they are working on new fundraising ideas. Brown suggest fundraising would bring them together faster than any party could.

Aboriginal women's voices in Atlantic Canada are finally being heard. Kelusultiek -Original Women's Voices of Atlantic Canada is a unique anthology that tells these women's stories for the first time. The book was launched during a special ceremony at the Mount's Art Gallery on Friday September 16.

Women and men stood together in a circle in the lobby of Seton Academic Centre as Moonstream Eagle, a contributor to the book, circulated the sacred herb sweet grass as it smoldered in a sea shell to cleanse and purify everyone's soul and to bring in the love.

After the traditional native ritual the University's President Elizabeth Parr-Johnston commended the book for enabling these very special women to speak out in their own voice and the Institute for the Study of Women for publishing Kelusultiek. Speaking about the Mounts participation she said, "It is in the Mount's tradition to be non-traditional."

Rita Joe, a contributor and a published poet from Eskasoni First Nation in Cape Breton who began writing in 1974, was honoured in Native tradition as an elder. She said, "Usually I'm alone in my writing, but this time I had all this support from all these women." Joe talked about her career and said she started writing to change the image of her people. "I tell the truth. I tell it like it is, our way."

An educator as well as a contributor, Helen Sylliboy spoke about the women's stories. "It's

hard to speak out in English since for so long we have not been able to."

The unique book launching ceremony went on for more than two hours with full audience participation. Karen Martin, another contributor to *Kelusultiek* sang and played the drums with her young daughter, while the audience joined hands and danced around the Art Gallery to the beat of the music.

After the dancing, Joe and the other contributors present, autographed copies of the anthology. At age 62, Joe spoke softly. While signing books she welcomed people to come to Eskasoni and visit. "My house is the one covered with vines, stop by," she said.

Mount Student Runs For Halifax City Council

Twenty-three-year-old Charles Crosby is running in the Halifax municipal election for alderman in ward one. Crosby a second year public relations student at Mount Saint Vincent University encourages more young people to get involved in politics. He says they have an important role to play.

"City politics is dying and the downtown is falling apart." Crosby says the present city council needs someone to shake them up and he feels its time for older politicians to pass on the torch.

First approached three years ago to run in the last election, Crosby wanted to finish his political science degree, do some more volunteering, and think about his future before he ran for office.

His campaign for the October 15 election started in March. A team came together who call themselves the Committee to Elect Charles A. Crosby. They started early because they planned to encounter prejudices about Crosby's young age.

"We've been pleasantly surprised. If I had a nickel for every time some one had old me that we need new blood, I would be able to afford an expensive advertising campaign like the other candidates."

Crosby urges younger people to run for public office. "Many politicians were elected when they were young; John Kennedy, Jean Chretien, Svend Robinson. They all made a difference, but people forget that so easily," says Crosby. "There's a fixation with electing people between the ages of 35 and 50." Crosby says all these politicians are the same and there's a real need for more women, seniors and young people in government.

"A young person will only win if they play the game the older politicians play, but play it better," says Crosby.

Raised in a political family, his uncle Howard Crosby was an MP for 14 years and his great grandfather was the Mayor of Halifax, an MP and went on to become a senator.

Crosby has been politically active for many years with two different political parties and says his own campaign is the 13th he has worked on.

Public service has been in the back of his mind all his life.



"Every decision I've ever made has some how been related to politics."

Crosby finds municipal politics refreshing because instead of party ties, people start talking about real issues. After working on his campaign with people from all political persuasions, he doesn't think he'll ever go back to partisan politics.

One of his campaign promises is that he will only reoffer for one term. He says he won't become a permanent civic politician only interested in reelection, but boasts to serve his constituents. "My priorities are going to be different than those of the present council," says Crosby.

Having lived in Ward one for 16 years, Crosby adores Halifax. "I can't imagine ever wanting to leave, there's something special about this city."

He is a worrier who gets stressed out. Crosby admits he's had six ulcers and he's only 23.

One of the benefits of being young is freedom from the commitments of a family and children. When Crosby finishes his public relations degree at The Mount he has pledged to be a full time Alderman representing the needs of his constituents.

Crosby is running against four other candidates in Ward one including the incumbent Loni Holland.

"He has been a terrible alderman or I wouldn't be running. The mood in the ward is also similar," says Charles.

The three others include Dorothy Francis, Larry Utek and Beverly Miller. Francis' campaign manager Cindy Sullivan, says Crosby is certainly a contender because his signs and brochures are visible in the ward. "It's not really his age we are worried about," she says. "But from a constituent's point of view, he lacks the life time experience of working and paying taxes."

When Crosby is asked about losing the election, he says it's hard to think about because he knows in his mind he's the best candidate.

"Even if I lose this election I hope young people have realized what they can do and how they can make a difference."

Stacks of Discs

Sloan -- Twice Removed (Geffen) by David Pound

Sloan is a Halifax band comprised of Chris Murphy, Patrick Pentland, Jay Ferguson and Andrew Scott. They are signed to Geffen Records, the same label that is home to bands such as Guns N' Roses, Nirvana, and Sonic Youth. They are said to hold the honor of being the band that will make or break our "Halifax Scene". If this album does well in the United States, you might see label interest move swiftly towards Halifax. You might think Sloan would be under a lot of pressure because of this, but you can't tell from their new album, Twice Removed.

If you were a fan of Sloan's first release, Smeared, you may be surprised at the sound of Twice Removed. Gone are the distortion peddles and the grunge sound that was so popular the last couple of years. The new album uses a more stripped down pop sound, but don't let that scare you off. This is music the way it should be, with intelligent lyrics, good song structure and songs that really set a mood. It is one of those albums you find you can't get the songs out of your head, but they are not disposable pop songs you are sick of in two weeks.

The album's influences lean more to early British pop bands than today's grunge bands, which is a nice change in today's grunge saturated music scene. The Beatles come to mind when listening to this release, in that they all sing and contribute to the album and they make use of vocal narmonies. These factors make for a very diverse album in a tradition of the great Beatles albums, such as the White Album.

Sloan took a chance making an album like this and I hope music fans are as open minded as they say they are and accept this album as a truly great release.

The Glory of Gershwin (Polygram) by Alana Wiens

Picture Sting, Cher, Kate Bush, Peter Gabriel, Chris DeBurg, and a few of their closest friends all on stage in sequins, feather, etc... belting out old show tunes. Add this a vision of the show being a tribute to the harmonica.

Given this rather shaky premise, I am amazed that I enjoyed the <u>Glory of Gershwin</u> as much as I did. The cd was recorded in honour of the 80th birthday of Larry Adler, a legendary harmonica player, and features: great contemporary artists performing their own versions of Gershwin tunes.

Some of the highlights of the CD were Peter Gabriel's "Summertime", Kate Bush's "The Man I Love" and Oleta Adams "Embracable You". These versions bring out the best in the songs and are enjoyable to listen to.

On the flip side, there is Sting "Nice Work If You Can Get It", which border on ludicrous. While all of the artists pushed themselves beyond the boundaries of their usual material, some do it with more success than others.

Though there have been many tribute albums released in the last few years, this one does not so much update the material as take the singers back in time.

Overall, this eclectic mix of artists and material is quite good. The slower, mellower songs are relaxing. However, the use of harmonica throughout can be very grating.

Orbital --Snivilisation (ffrr) by Andrew Duke

After two eponymous albums, the third full-length release from England's Orbital (brothers Phil and Paul Hartnoll) gets a title, Snivilisation. Orbital continue in their traditions of wacky packaging (little info and odd paintings) and song titles (I Wish I Had Duck Feet and Science Friction on this recording), but instead of improving on their own musical formula or trying something new, they have become content to wallow and are found here spinning in circles. Much more is expected from the band that debuted in 1990 with the dubby Chime, and went on to produce

"Halycon", a song inspired by their mother's addiction to this drug. "Halcyon" employed a backwards loop of the female scatting from *Opus III*'s cover of It's A Fine Day to hypnotic effect, and appeared first on the <u>Raddiccio</u> EP and later on their second album.

The majority of <u>Snivilisation</u> has Orbital again pairing surreal vocal snippets with trippy electronic grooves. Some tracks, such as Attached, drag on far too long, while others smack of laziness; "Sad But True" is built on a rhythm taken from an accessible British sample CD--anyone could have done this.

The main problem with this release is the unnecessary bandwagon jumping on display. "Quality Seconds" is annoyingly heavy and fast, similar to Dutch gabber music, while the first single, "Are We Here?", is a tedious breakbeat track. With breakbeat and jungle music all the rage in England right now among the youth, it's sad to see the Hartnolls (aged 28 and 30) taking a go at something being recorded primarily by those ten years their junior. In 1988, when acid house was the soundtrack for Britain's Summer Of Love, Paul Hartnoil recorded a few tracks under the guise of D.S. Building Contractors. The disastrous results should have shown them that their talents lie in their originality, not in their ability to copy. Snivilisation is a step sideways, not a progression forward. Objectively, this a good album. But is it a good Orbital album? Unfortunately not.



Organ Donation

ver the years, medical technology has increased the ability and the resources to inprove quality of life -- and to save lives-- by giving donated organs to those who need them. But the problem is that

the need for organs far exceeds their availability. A m o n g N o v a Scotians, 75 per cent are willing to donate their own organs. However,

this willingness is hindered by the fact that only 20 per cent actually discuss organ donation with their families and only around 31 per cent sign organ donor cards.

The startling reality of this issue is if only 50 per cent of potential donors gave organs, there would be enough for everyone who needed a transplant. But for most people, taking the step of signing an or-

gan donor card is a difficult one.

The reason for this is plain and

simple -- people are scared and unaware of the entire process of organ donation. Many people believe that if they are dying and someone down the hall needs a heart or kidney transplant urgently, then this will somehow influence the decision to pull the plug or affect the care they receive.

This could not be further from the truth. If you are brought to the hospital needing emergency treatment, you will receive the best possible care whether or not you have signed a donor card. If there is even a slight chance that you can make a recovery, organ donation will not be considered. The donation process begins af-

Another fear for most of us is that signing an organ donor card forces us to think about death. And who wants to think about that, especially when we're young and our biggest worry seems to be what we are going to do on the week-end.

This attitude is perfectly reasonable. However, if we thought of the possi-

> bility that we may be saving a f a m i l y member's life or our own lives may be s a v e d

through organ donation, our attitude may change.

Organ transplantation is becoming routine across the country and there are no restrictions on who can become organ donors. Anyone can sign an organ donor card, regardless of their age or medical history. Those under 18 years of age must have consent from a parent or legal guardian. Extra copies of these consent forms can be made by photocopying them, and all provinces include organ donor forms with drivers' licences.

Even a simple statement on a plain sheet of paper stating your wishes to become an organ donor is acceptable. But this statement must be signed by you and someone from your family. And make sure that you keep this piece of paper with you at all times, either in your purse or wallet.

Although an organ donor card is a legal document, your family is always asked for consent before any action is taken. That's why it's crucial for you to let your friends and family know if you wish to be a donor.

Many families who have donated a loved one's organs upon their death believe it has helped themto know that their decision could meananother birthday for one grateful recipient? So please consider organ donation. People waiting for transplants can't live without you.

Campus Security

Security staff are on duty 24 hours per day, 7 days per week. They offer many services to the university community, including: **Emergency Phones** - Emergency phones are the yellow phones located across campus. They connect automatically to the Assisi Desk, 24 hours per day, 7 days per week. You can obtain a wallet size campus map which shows all emergency phones, from the Security Office. Security can also be reached by dialing 111 on any internal office telephone. Or you can use one of the intercoms located in Assisi Hall, Evaristus Hall, Rosaria Centre, or the Birches.

Reporting Events - Please contact security to report any unusual occurences or suspicious persons on campus.

Escorts - If you are alone on campus after dark, security will escort you to your car, or the bus stop. Just contact the Assisi information desk, and they will contact security. If you are calling for an escort to the bus stop, please ensure that you leave a little extra time, as it often takes a few minutes for a security officer to meet you, particularly if they are doing rounds.

Security staff try to ensure that the University is a safe learn-

ing environment for everyone. Please remember to take precautions in potentially dangerous situations.

Practice the Buddy System:

Never travel alone on campus after dark. Bring a friend along, and stick to well lit areas, and main roads. Be aware of your surroundings, and of any suspicious individuals.

Students living off-campus, particularly in the Clayton Park area, are encouraged to avoid the path near the Motherhouse. If you do choose to take this path, only use it in the daytime, and travel in groups.

One note to remember, however, is that security are not permitted to do mechanical work on your vehicle. But, depending on circumstances, they may be able to boost your car if your battery is dead, or unlock your vehicle.

It was his intervention in a male's assault of a female at, or around, the fraternity party that provoked his cwn beating. Though it is reported that hundreds of people witnessed the event, the police are having great difficulty soliciting the views of eye witnesses. Rumour has it that Darren's assaulters were high school students who are now bragging about their exploits.

Darren was most definitely on a path to becoming a community leader. Beyond just the political standing which many who aspire to political office strive for, Darren gave a great deal back to his community. He really cared about people. I got a chance to see this when we were working on organizing a provincial model parliament and he was unable to attend the event, because he was going to an underdeveloped African nation to help those less fortunate than himself. Darren was part of the future of this country and for his efforts is now in a coma.

The situation that he intervened in, is also something which bears looking at. A young man beating his girlfriend. In fact, it has been reported that the young woman bore the man's baby just five days before. Certainly a sign that campaigns against violence against women still have considerable ground to cover. As long as these types of situations continue to happen there can be no equality for women in this country.

Following Darren's intervention it seems like the young man returned with a group of friends for his revenge. Though no one has been charged, many of those who have been questioned are teenagers. To me this is another example of youth crime. It disheartens me to think of living in a country where the youth run wild and are a law unto themselves. How can we commend our education system and society's method of child rearing when it produces such disastrous results?

Though this may seem overstated, moving into the next twist in the tale it seems more than justified. Police say that hundreds of people watched this beating. Beyond the question of why people did not come to Darren and his two fraternity brothers' defense or call the police is a very upsetting reality; few will come forward to police and describe the events that happened. For someone who desped o that proceed will help him.

This whole event to me is a modern tragedy. Because I do know the victim the whole situation is all too real to me and my time thinking about the situation in the last week has dimmed my view of my fellow human beings. In regards to the fature of Canada. when we punish good with evil we certainly will not go far as a country or as a race. I see Darren as a part of the future of this country with his selfiess devotion to others balancing his own political goals. He is the type of leader we should be looking for in our young people. Now, his story is one which reminds us of the darker side of the world. I can only hope that people, including myself, will be inspired by Darren and be a part of the solution, not the problem.


We marched for an hour before ending with a reception at the Atlantic Arts Alliance Coopertive on Barrington St. where an all female blues band sang songs of inspiration.

Opinion/Editorial Proportional Representation

The Quebec provincial election is over and me PQ wer. The final results were the PQ with 45% of the vote and 77 seats in the National Assembly, the Liberals with 44% of the vote and 47 seats, the category of other received 11% of the vote and 1 seat, which went to the Parti Action Democratique du Quebec. With only 45% of the vote, the PQ took 62% of the seats! What is wrong with this picture?

The first past-the-post system of voting in Canada is very flawed. With this system, whoever receives the most votes wins the riding. For example if three candidates receive 33%, 33% and 34% of the vote respectively, then the third candidate would be the winner. Most of the voters may hate the third candidate but too bad, because that is how the system works. The usual result of this method of voting is a distorted proportion of seats allocated to the different parties and a government that has a majority of the seats but does not have the support of a majority of Canadians. This leads to many unpopular measures being rammed through parliament against the

wishes of the majoricy of Canadian voters. It also leads to re sults like the Bloc Quebecois being the opposition with only the support of about 12% of the population.

How can this problem be solved? Proportional representation .s an idea widely used in Europe. This system of voting would see the percentage of seats allocated strictly along the lines of the percentage of voter support. The parties make up a list of candidates and fill the number of seats that they win from the list. Some people say that this would let Nazis into the House of Commons, but it would also let the Green Party in. If aboriginal Canadians formed and voted for their own federal party, they would not have to wait for the "generosity" of other parties to include them. The same goes for women, and other minority groups. Besides, who really thinks that there are no racists in the House of Commons already?

Perhaps a threshold percentage could be established to keep out every splinter party under the sun. A party would have to receive at least five percent of the vote before it could claim a seat in Parliament, It would make sure that possible coalitions would not be held hostage by every issue interest group which received a percentage of the vote.

Another argument people may have is that they trust their local candidate and not a list of names. Maybe voting could incorporate the two systems with local candidates being elected by the first past-the-post system. Members of parties could then top off the election results with additional seats in the House of Commons being filled from the party lists. No need for renovations to add seats, just axe the Senate. It is pretty useless anyway, and has 104 seats that could be put to better use.

The proportional system of voting has some flaws, but it is better than what we have now. It is an idea that should be discussed and seriously taken into consideration for the next federal election. A democratic government, no matter how good their intentions are should have the support of its citizens!

The Way I See it

In the wake of the Quebec provincial election on September 12 there has been much speculation over the importance of the votes

Much has been said about the fact that though the Liberals received almost half of the popular vote (44% of those who voted, voted Liberal) they won only 47 seats.

This has been a problem for many years and is just another example of the failing of the firstpast-the-post electoral system. (In the 1993 election the PC party received only 2% less of the popular vote and yet won only 2 seats).

A more important aspect to look at is the falling support for separatism.

Jacques Parize au has used the metaphor of the hockey game. The first period was the vast support for the Bloc Quebecois in the federal election. The second period was the election of the Parti Quebecois government. The third period is to be the promised referendum on separation.

So what does the provincial election have to do with separatism? During the election campaign public opinion polls said that public support for separation fell to around 30%.

Separation?

With the federalist Liberals receiving 44% of the popular vote and the support for separation at such a low level, the outlook for Canada is much better than it could be.

It may seem strange that Daniel Johnson, the Liberal leader, and Jean Chretien are pushing for a referendum as soon as possible, but they are trying to catch this wave of opposition to separatism.

Parizeau, who during the election campaign promised a referendum within the year, is trying to rebuild support for separation.

The support for separation in recent years has been strongest following the failure of the Meech Lake Accord. The feeling of rejection by English Canada and Quebec nationalism ran high.

Watch for Parizeau to try to produce another backlash against Quebec with outrageous claims and demands. Another important factor is the actual wording of the referendum question, which could have a strong influence over the outcome.

So, this is why the Prime Minister and Premiers have been saying "Don't panic". This response will prevent serious problems in the economic world and will hopefully keep the backlash against Quebec, which the PQ are looking for, from happening.
