
#### **Breast Cancer** Awareness Week






# KETT'S CUP



Patrick was highly regarded not only as a teacher and researcher, but also as a cherished colleague at Mount Saint Vincent University for more than 30 years. He was recognized for his excellence in scholarship and, in particular, his outstanding contribution to preserving Canadian theatre history, having published extensively in the area. In 2004, he was awarded a prestigious Fulbright Fellowship in acknowledgement of his stature as a leading scholar on Canadian theatre. His outstanding research contributions were recognized by Mount Saint Vincent University by awarding him the Award for Research Excellence in 2002.

He will be remembered as well for the many years he involved his students and other members of the community in highly successful and entertaining drama presentations on campus, such as Getting Out, Swingtime Canteen, Nunsense II, The Compleat Wrks of Wlm Shkspr (Abridged) and Little Shop of Horrors.

Patrick's dedication to Mount Saint Vincent University is evident in his extensive involvement in University service. He was Director of Research and International Liaison Officer for 2002-05. He served on many of Mount Saint Vincent University's major committees, giving his many talents to the fullest. Patrick touched the lives of all those who knew him. He will be sorely missed.

Between Mr. Loan and Me.





#### Walking the Walk: MSVU Students Want Action on Busy Crosswalk

past Janie Whyte as she stands on the sidewalk across from Mount Saint Vincent University, waiting for the No. 18 bus to pick her up. She has had several close calls while using the crosswalk that leads from the bus stop to the university's main en-

"Vehicles speed along the highway," says Whyte, who commutes every day by bus from her parent's home in Halifax. She uses the crosswalk because it is next to the main bus stop for the university. "Drivers don't expect that a crosswalk is coming up, so they don't slow down," she says. "Several cars have screeched their tires in order to slow down fast enough while I've been crossing. It's really scary."

Whyte is one of many students who regularly use the crosswalk, and their concerns have prompted the university's student union to lobby Halifax Regional Municipality for more than six months to install a stoplight.

Student Union President Chantal Brushett says students are at risk and cites two separate incidents since January in which students have been struck at the crosswalk. Neither student was seriously injured, says Const. Mark Hobeck, public information officer with Halifax Regional Police.

"Paramedics with Emergency Medical Services examined them at the scene



and released them," he says.

The student union began its crusade for a stoplight in February with a letter to ars on the Bedford Highway zip Mayor Peter Kelly. Brushett says the mayor "assured her in writing" a review would take place. The student union has not been told of any progress, even though they have made several more attempts to contact the mayor.

"It's frustrating," she says. "We have students who are getting hit. We will have students that, one of these days, are going to get injured badly or going to get killed. I don't think we should have to come to that."

It turns out the city has decided not to grant the student union's request. Alan Taylor, transportation planner with the city, sent a letter to Dr. Sheila Brown, president of the Mount, on Aug. 25 informing her of that decision.

The letter says traffic count data shows there to be no need for a stoplight and that prior to the two pedestrian accidents at the crosswalk this year, there had been no reported pedestrian collisions there in at least the previous five years. It also pointed out that on busy roads like the Bedford Highway, too many traffic signals can disrupt vehicles and pedestrian flow, and may also create a false sense of security for pedestrians. The student union was not notified of The student union will continue lobbythis decision.

John O'Brien, spokesperson for HRM says the city monitored the crosswalk on Mar. 30 and 31, recording the number of vehicles passing by and how many pedestrians use the crosswalk at 15-minute intervals. It was decided the flashing amber above the crosswalk is an effective way to caution motorists. The two accidents would not have been prevented if a stoplight had been there, says O'Brien.

"One was caused by an impaired driver and the other was caused by a driver who had failed to clear the frost off the windshield," he says. "Whether there were traffic lights or crosswalks or any-



thing else, these accidents would have occurred."

O'Brien advises the student union to launch an education campaign on how to use the crosswalk safely.

"Putting up a light is not going to protect the students," he says. "A light is simply a signal. A light can't stop a car. At every intersection, whether it's marked or not, there is a crosswalk Obviously, we want motorists to be aware of that, but by the same token. when a man and a machine meet, who's going to win? So the pedestrians have to exercise caution as well."

Brushett says the student union is already educating students about crosswalk safety through a poster campaign

ing city council until they get a stoplight, she says.

A petition is being circulated among students and the student union is also seeking support from community members in Bedford. Brushett says members of the student union are considering attending an upcoming council meeting to further press the issue.

"This is something that's extremely important to us," she says. "All departments of the university are highly supportive and the students are too. As long as the students are behind us, we're not going to stop fighting for the stoplight."

#### MSVU Students' Union Wins Crusade to Ban the Use of Turnitin.com at MSVU

March 6, 2006, Halifax – The Mount Saint Vincent University Students' Union (MSVU SU) is elated to announce the successful end of their crusade to ban the use of Turnitin.com at MSVU, the first ban of its kind in Canada.


At a University Senate meeting on Monday, March 6, 2006 Senators voted to ban "the use of Turnitin.com and any other plagiarism detection software that requires that students' work become part of an external database where other parties might have access to it."

MSVU SU President, Chantal Brushett is one of four students who sit on the University Senate. "I am ecstatic with the results of Monday's vote" she says. "Plagiarism detection software, such as Turnitin.com com, raises an array of litigious, human rights, and intellectual property issues and I am thrilled that the Senate of Mount Saint Vincent University recognizes these issues and is willing to guard their students against them".

The current Students' Union first brought their concerns regarding Turnitin.com forward to university administration in September of 2005. The plagiarism detection software ban will become effective when summer session one commences in May.

■ MONSTER STORMS, Hurricane Katrina. killed more than 1,300 and caused US\$70 billion in damages along the U.S. Gulf Coast. Mississippi took the brunt of it: in Gulfport, for instance, the storm surge tossed giant shipping containers inland. In Louisiana, New Orleans was spared the highest winds-but then the levees broke. submerging 80 per cent of the city, including Canal Street, under oily, fetid water. In all, some 1.3 million people from the region, were evacuated, including 7,000 who were sheltered in the Astrodome in Houston, A scathing congressional report criticized government officials at all levels-city, state and federal—for the fumbled response to the emergency. Then, while Americans were still dealing with Katrina's messy aftermath, hurricanes Rita and Wilma wreaked even more havoc before the longest and most expensive tropical storm season on record was finally over.



Even after he was rescued and back home on Canadian soil, James Loney (right) said he could hardly believe everything that had happened. Four months earlier, he and three other members of an international Christian aid organization had been kidnapped in Baghdad and held by a group that threatened to kill them unless Iraqi prisoners were freed. The body of one of the hostages, American Tom Fox, was later found, but the fate of the other three was unknown until a tip led a team of British and U.S. soldiers, RCMP officers and members of a Canadian special forces unit to an unguarded house. There they found Loney, fellow Canadian Harmeet Singh Sooden (left) and Briton Norman Kember, who were in chains, but otherwise okay.



A BLACK AND BLUE. Conrad Black found himself under siege on yet another front when prosecutors in the United States charged him with 12 criminal offences, including fraud, money laundering and obstructing justice, that could net him 95 years in jail. This is on top of civil fraud charges, and a Canadian class action suit, in connection with the unraveling of Hollinger International Inc., once one of the world's leading newspaper publishers, after Black and other high-ranking officials allegedly siphoned off millions. Black pleaded not guilty in a Chicago court and vowed to fight all charges.




▲ HONOURING A HERO. To mark the 25th anniversary of the Marathon of Hope, more than 3.3 million students at 10,000 schools from coast to coast participated in the Terry Fox National School Run Day. The largest student event in Canadian history was in honour of a young man who died before they were born. In 1980, Fox, who had lost a leg to the disease, planned to run from the Atlantic Ocean to the Pacific to raise \$1 million for cancer research, but had to abandon his journey in Northern Ontario. The cancer had spread to his lungs and he died 10 months later at the age of 22. Since then, nearly \$400 million has been raised in his name for cancer research. (CP Photo)









The free concerts, held in 10 cities the week before a G8 summit in Scotland, were designed to pressure leaders from the world's richest nations to not only give humanitarian aid to Africa, but to establish concrete methods for tackling its poverty. More than one million attended the free events, while an estimated two billion watched on TV. They sent some 26.4 million text messages to help drive home the Live 8 message delivered by the star-studded lineup of performers. among them Paul McCartney and Coldplay in London, Bon Jovi and Destiny's Child in Philadelphia, and Neil Young and Mötley Crije (below) in Barrie, Ont., near Toronto, Perhaps it worked: the G8 promised to increase aid to Africa by US\$25 billion and to cancel the debts of the continent's 18 poorest countries.











## Science

A BLAST FROM THE PAST. The space shuttle Discovery landed safely after astronauts conducted in-flight repairs to the shuttle's external heat shield. Still, the end may be in sight for the problem-plagued space shuttle program. NASA plans to finish building the International Space Station and then retire Discovery and the two remaining shuttles by 2010. Soon after, astronauts will be launched into space aboard NASA's new Crew Exploration Vehicle—essentially a souped-up version of the rockets used in the original Apollo moon-landing missions



THE GREENER WAY. Hybrid vehicles that use both gas and electric motors to double their fuel efficiency and halve their emissions have gone almost mainstream as they capture a growing share of the North American new-car market. So early adopters have moved on to the next big thing: biodiesel. Made from renewable energy sources like corn, soy or animal fats, the fuel can be used in any standard diesel engine and doesn't create greenhouse gases. Meanwhile


create greenhouse gases. Meanwhile, automakers are working on prototypes of hydrogen-powered vehicles. Still, problems associated with hydrogen fuel cells mean it could be some time yet before they make today's cars as obsolete as the horse and buggy. (Carl Wagner-Chicago Tribuna/NTT)



AND THEN THERE WERE TEN. Astronomers announced that they had discovered a new planet in the outer reaches of our solar system. Nicknamed Xena—at least until the international body that vets . names comes up with something official—it looks a lot like its nearest planetary neighbour, Pluto. But it is almost three times farther from the sun-nearly 10 billion miles—and its 560-year orbit takes twice the time of Pluto's. But Xena is not alone out there; the astronomers also found a moon orbiting the planet and nicknamed it Gabrielle. (NASA/JPL-Caltech)



▼ WINDS OF CHANGE. Does global warming cause hurricanes? That seems a reasonable question following a tropical storm season that was the longest on record and wreaked unprecedented damage. Some data indicates that global climate change does not increase the number of hurricanes, but it does cause those that do occur to be much more ferocious. Not all scientists agree, and the research—and the debate—continue.
